Bussing Issues For Private Schools

Busing became an issue for Glen Cove and North Shore residents after Super Storm Sandy hit the area this last week. Glen Head resident Dave Whitting said, "On Monday morning my wife received a call on her cell phone at 6:15am to inform us that the North Shore School District was not going to provide busing to out of district schools." Whitting's children, who go to St. Peter's School in Port Washington, were to go back to school on Tuesday. North Shore School public schools opened on Monday. On Tuesday, they didn't receive another call but no service was provided ei-

When contacted by the Gazette on Tuesday, Superintendent of Schools Dr. Ed Melnick said, "We will be busing to private and parochial starting tomorrow. We did not bus on Monday or Tuesday for three reasons

- 1. Safety concerns we needed time to survey the routes to the schools and make sure they were safe and the buses could pass through
- 2. Gas-- we were concerned about gas--we expect a delivery this afternoon.
- 3. Only 11 public school districts in Nassau were open yesterday with fewer open Today [Tuesday] due to election day. Most will open tomorrow. Therefore we will begin full transportation tomorrow." As of this writing transportation in the North Shore District was provided to students on Wednesday.

Whitting said he went down later Monday morning to the bus depot to see what was going on. He said he asked a woman in the office what the status of bus to St. Peters. "She said that the Port Washington School District was closed and that they were not providing bus transportation... So I asked what that had to do with our district?" He said he had been in touch with friends of theres that live in Port Washington and they said that

Gold Coast After Sandy

The North Shore of Long Island was pounded by Super Storm Sandy last week and in her wake she left power lines down and gas lines at the pumps. According to Glen Cove Police Sgt. John Nagel.

During Hurricane Sandy the Glen Cove Police department was inundated with calls for service. During the storm Officers responded to 70 calls for service including 19 calls for wires down and 33 calls for trees down. Due to the large amount of trees and wires down most of Glen Cove found itself without power. With the power outages most of the traffic lights were out requiring Police to erect barricades to facilitate the safe flow of traffic. During and after the storm the police department conducted many wellness checks on residents as well as assisted Public Works in their effort to clear roads and sidewalks of downed trees and debris.

Gas Situation

After the storm gasoline was in short supply throughout the island. Motorists

Mayor Aids In House Fire Rescue

Shortly after the Super Storm Sandy created havoc through the area Glen Cove Mayor Ralph V. Suozzi found himself in the position of attempting to save the life of resident in a working house fire at 23 Whitney Circle on November 4.

A visually shaken Mayor Suozzi said after, "I was in the neighborhood trying to figure out why the lights went out when they were re-powered two hours earlier. I was driving slowly with my passenger window open listening for generators and I smelled smoke. I knew that smell was not a fireplace and thought

that maybe a garage housing a generator had caught fire. I backed my vehicle up to the southern mouth of Whitney Circle and heard in the darkness a faint voice shouting, 'Help! Fire! Help!'

"I turned onto the street and saw a woman, who was a dear family friend, and I saw flames and thick black smoke pouring out of the front door. I radioed the police about the house fire and location."

The Mayor, who had years ago been a Glen Cove Volunteer Firefighter, then attempted to enter the home through the front door but it was too hot. A neighbor joined him and they ran around through the rear of the dwelling and tried to force open a rear door after the Mayor broke the glass with his elbow." Neither of them were able to enter as the fire was extremely hot and fast having been fueled by kerosene.

Firefighters were able to enter and found the body of 87-year-old Lewis Bodi. Glen Cove Police Sgt. John Nagel said, At this time it appears that

the victim accidentally knocked over a kerosene lamp tragically causing him to ignite himself in flames. Mayor Suozzi said it was, "A very sad day. He was a personal friend, a good man and a WWII US Navy Veteran." The victim's wife was taken to the Glen Cove hospital. Glen Cove Mayor Suozzi was treated for carbon monoxide inhalation.

The Glen Cove Police Department, Fire Department, and EMS responded to a working house fire at 23 Whitney Circle. The Police and Fire responders were able to make entry into the residence via a rear door. Upon entering the residence they found the 87 year old homeowner deceased in the rear room of the residence. The 85 year old victim's wife was also in the home during the fire and she was transported to the hospital by Glen Cove EMS suffering from smoke inhalation. the problem is not so much the roads but all the power outages. Whitting said, "She then stated, 'That the OEM office had 'SUGGESTED' that school districts do not provide transportation to schools outside their districts'... So I countered with that this only a suggestion and not a mandate and that we should reconsider our options. I was then told that Port Washington SD will probably be closed tomorrow and I agreed and said that there is no reason to get into it here because it could be a mute-point."

Glen Cove Transportation

Glen Cove school district also did not provide transportation to the area open schools including St. Peter's and All Saints Regional Catholic School in Glen Cove, which opened on Wednesday after Sandy. Glen Cove School district had remained closed Monday through Wednesday. When contacted by the Gazette on Wednesday in a statement the Glen Cove School District said, "You are correct. We did not run our busses on those days. If a public school district is not dispatching buses and providing transportation to children attending its public schools because those public schools are not in a position to open, it is not obligated to provide transportation to the private and parochial schools, as per New York State Eduction law. The Glen Cove School District was unable to open for more than a week due to power outages in the aftermath of the storm, and as a result we were not running busses to any schools within our district during this time."

Fuel Issue

Whitting said, "If it's a fuel issue, [as stated by North Shore] then there should be other options instead of shutting down transportation to parochial schools... You

can't just say yes to public schools and no to ALL Catholic School busing... If it's strictly a fuel issue why can't we revamp the bus routes during emergencies i.e. provide transportation to all middle school and elementary schools and do something different for the high schools. They are older and have more options i.e. public transportation, car pool, or... God-for-bid have the North Shore kids walk to school... I find it hard to believe that they didn't have enough gas for one small bus for one day to make 2 trips to Port Washington. If the gas shortage was that severe what routes are being cancelled for the public schools?"

Whitting said he feels, "The school district's only option, when it comes to transportation issues, is to cut busing to Catholic Schools. They cannot just cut busing to our students 100% and provide busing to public schools 100%. That is, in my opinion, discriminating against Catholic Schools. I totally understand their issue of gas shortages. But if cuts are made they should be made across the board, not just to our students.

"If they get away with doing this, where will it end? If we don't voice our opposition now then they will assume that they can do it when ever if fits their needs. With possible cuts coming up in the next budget this would be an easy cut for them to propose. Silence from us tells them that what they are doing is acceptable."

Note: As of press time on Thursday, the area was hit with a Nor-easter dumping snow throughout the area. Both school districts were closed. All Saints Regional Catholic School remained open but students were not provided transportation from either district.

waited on long lines to get gasoline with lines running nearly a mile long. The Mobil line from Glen Cove Road daily ran up to 8th Avenue in Sea Cliff.

Glen Cove Police assigned officers at the various gas stations when those stations received a gas shipment and where prepared to pump gas. The officers set up car lines for the stations while attempting to keep the flow of traffic moving. Many of the motorist expressed relief at seeing the officers at the pumps and order was maintained despite the frustration many felt at the time.

Due to the mandatory evacuation order for the Morgan Island residents the Police department set up a temporary command post at the Moran Island bridge. The command post was set up to protect the homes and property of those that were evacuated. The High School was used as a shelter for those who needed some help during the storm.

"As a result of the storm the Glen Cove residents pulled together helping each other during and after the storm," said Nagel.

Burglaries

"Unfortunately some people used the storm as an opportunity," said Nagel. There was three reported generators stolen and one home was burglarized. "Glen Cove lost one of it's residents as a result of the storm when a kerosene lamp was knocked over causing a tragic house fire that claimed the life of the 87 year old home owner [See separate story].


Judge McCord Wins Again



- · Not having the money to buy


nutritious food and sufficient foods · The challenges of having to deal with social service agencies

a touch of tomato sauce. Baked or fried, your friends and family will love them.




Ingredients

- 2 Pound(s) Pork, Veal and Beef Mix, ground
- 1 Cup(s) Italian Style Bread Crumbs
- 3/4 Cup(s) Cold Pomodoro Sauce, or store bought
- 3/4 Cup(s) Pecorino Romano Cheese, grated
- 2 Each Egg, beaten
- 1/4 Cup(s) Fresh Italian Parsley, rough chop
- 1/4 Cup(s) Fresh Basil, rough chop
- 1 To Taste Salt
- 1 To Taste Pepper
- 1/2 Cup(s) Olive Oil, for frying

Directions

- 1. Mix pork veal and beef mixture in large bowl with bread crumbs, cheese and pomodoro sauce
- 2. Add eggs, salt & pepper, parsley and basil and Mix together
- 3. Roll meatball mixture into balls (size of your liking) and place to the side
- 4. Heat 1/2 cup of oil in a large sauté pan on med high flame
- 5. Fry meatballs in oil, once brown check the middle of a meatball to ensure they are fully cooked
- 6. They can be finished in the oven


as the distinction between soft and hard edges. However, the most important aspect to painting is to begin with a scene, or a subject, that moves you. Her phi-





Lewis Joseph Bodi

Lewis Joseph Bodi:Glen Cove resident Provost and Vice President of Academic Affairs, York College CUNY

Lewis J. Bodi, who helped to shape a fledgling York College CUNY as Dean of Academic Affairs and Provost, died Sunday, November 4th. He died in a fire in his house in Glen Cove. He was 87. The first American-born child of Hungarian immigrant parents, Bodi was born in 1924 in Racine, Wisconsin. Originally named Lazlo, he was given the name Lewis by his kindergarten teacher, which he kept for life. He served in the Navy in World War II, and attended De Pauw University on the GI Bill where he met his wife of 62 years, Sara Frances Lord. From Lithuania to Denmark to Somalia, we meet women of all ages and classes, fighting oppression - all involved in a fascinating mystery which keeps the reader attention throughout. 
Restaurant & Wine Tasting Event Benefits New Traumatic Brain Injury Unit At Glen Cove Hospital




