North Shore Schools Kindergarten Registration Begins for the Kindergarten Class of 2013-2014

In September 2013, your child will enter Kindergarten and start an exciting journey. The first step into school is one of the passages in life that marks the beginning of new experiences and relationships. It begins an educational experience that will serve as a foundation for their future. This is for children in the North Shore School District born between December 1, 2007 and December 1, 2008

During the Kindergarten Registration Week and Orientation Week, you will learn more about North Shore Schools and the Kindergarten program. First you must complete a registration process that provides assurance of your residency in the North Shore School District and the necessary demographic information on your child. Parents enrolling their child(ren) in non-public (private and parochial) schools must also prove residency and meet eligibility requirements in order to qualify for transportation.

The first step in this process is to complete a residency packet. You may obtain this packet in person at the main office at any of the three elementary schools including Sea Cliff Elementary School, Glen Head Elementary School or Glenwood Landing Elementary School. Upon completing the required documents, please call Mrs. Katherine Miller, Registrar for the North Shore Schools, at 277-7824 to schedule an appointment to review your completed documents. Appointments will be available beginning

January 2, 2013. This meeting should take no more than ten or fifteen minutes. At this meeting you will receive a second packet of information pertaining to the second step in the process, which is to register your child at the appropriate elementary school.

Please note the following registration dates for the Elementary Schools:

Glen Head Elementary Monday, March 4th through March 8th

Sea Cliff Elementary Monday, March 4th through March 8th

Glenwood Landing Elementary Monday, March 18th through March 22nd

The third step in preparation for Kindergarten will be orientation. Your school will contact you with the dates and details regarding the orientation program during which you will have an opportunity to become better acquainted with the school, the principal and some of the people who your child will work with beginning in September 2013.



The group also recorded what they should Vanessa Broglia's and Amanda Barchi's classes also contributed non-perishable items to donate to families in need. During their Thanksgiving celebration, the

community members reached out to local businesses to organize generous food baskets consisting of a variety of foods for families in need. Despite the strained

resources as a result of the storm, the school was able to surpass last year's effort by providing 13 families with a turkey, complete with all of the trimmings while touching more than 70 people overall. Connolly School psychologist Dr. Seele coordinated the effort and the Glen Cove Youth Bureau contributed some turkeys as well.

At Deasy Elementary School, students, their families and a nearby Greek Orthodox Church organized 40 large Home Goods shopping bags stuffed with food, which they donated to local families in need. First-grade teacher Karen Gordon helped to coordinate the effort.

Overall, the tragedy of the storm combined with the giving spirit of the season provided students with an additional inspiration to show


- Keeping our hands to ourselves and respecting each other's space.

Under his guidance and leadership, he led his fellow troop members through the process of re-furbishing and repairing over 92 bicycles.

During the planning phase of his eagle project, Joey selected and coordinated with the Interfaith Nutritional Network (INN) to accept the repaired bicycles.

The INN (Interfaith Nutrition Network) addresses the issues of hunger and homelessness on Long Island by providing food, shelter, long-term housing, and supportive services in a dignified and respectful manner for those who seek help. They are a not-for-profit, volunteer-based organization with a dedicated staff, a

broad base of community support and a commitment to educate the public about these issues. They have 22 locations on Long Island with the closest being in Glen Cove. They will distribute the bicycles to people who need transportation to the Inn, work school, etc.

Joey's original plan was to donate the bicycles in the spring, after working on the collection and repair phase throughout the winter. However, with the communities generous response, Joey was able to collect a lot more bicycles then he had originally planned. That, along

with the effectiveness of his guidance and leadership, and the outstanding repair skills of his fellow troop members, arrangements are now being discussed about the possibility of donating the 92 repaired bicycles in time for Christmas.


North Shore Inn Food Drive 201

SAFE makes further plans to prevent sale of alcohol to minors

SAFE Pride Project Community Committee is continuing their efforts to prevent the sales of alcohol to minors in Glen Cove. When the committee met at the end of Nov. they decided to revamp SAFE Downtown, an initiative where businesses display stickers in their windows showing their support for the enforcement of underage drinking laws in Glen Cove.

SAFE Downtown was created by the Community Committee of SAFE's Coalition of which the Downtown Business Improvement District is an active member, funded by the Drug Free Communities Support Grant and the Office of Alcohol and Substance Abuse Services Enforcement of Underage Drinking Laws. When business owners and vendors signed a pledge to refuse sales of alcohol to minors they receive a sticker to put in their windows.

The committee is considering several ideas for the implementation of SAFEGLENCOVE however nothing definitive has been decided at this time Glen Cove Police have indicated that there are businesses not participating in SAFE Downtown and selling alcohol to minors on the outskirts of town. A decision was made to change the name of SAFE Downtown to SAFEGLENCOVE since the Coalition will be reaching out to vendors outside the downtown area in an effort to prevent the sale of alcohol to minors in Glen Cove.

District Attorney Kathleen Rice Speaks to Sea Cliff Elementary Students

On November 28th, Sea Cliff fourth and fifth graders had the opportunity to listen to a very special assembly given by Nassau County District Attorney Kathleen Rice. The personable D.A. spoke candidly to the students about a number of important topics including bullying, cyber-bullying, cell phone safety, and pay equity for women. This assembly coincided with the school-wide "Cool K.I.D.S" philosophy recently initiated by Principal Chris Zublionis which emphasizes "Building A Better World" at Sea Cliff Elementary.

District Attorney Rice engaged the students early on as she discussed some of the differences between growing up now and years ago (e.g., when she was their age). She mentioned that phones weren't carried around in purses or pockets but attached to the wall with curly cords that limited how far you could walk and talk! To the student's surprise, no one had computers, iPads, or iPods; and televisions only had a few stations!

As she summarized her journey to becoming the first woman district at-

torney in 2005 after defeating the male incumbent of 31 years and then was reelected in 2009, Ms. Rice communicated to the Sea Cliff audience two very important life lessons. She said, "Never let anyone tell you what you can or cannot be" and "Treat others the way you want to be treated."

While the district attorney discussed the different aspects of government, her various court cases, and answered important questions from the young crowd, she also reminded the students of the importance of internet and cell phone safety. She communicated the following:

Everything you type onto the computer or into a cell phone is public record

You have to be careful what you say to others as well as what you write in an email, text message, or on any social media website including Facebook, Twitter, MySpace, etc.

Additionally, you should not send any inappropriate messages or photos via the internet or via cell phone (i.e., Instagram)

Flu Season

To The Editor,

The 2012-2013 flu season is off to a strong start with cases starting earlier this season and sharply increasing. The Centers For Disease Control (CDC) is warning everyone to prepare for a severe flu season based on this early start and the strains of the virus being seen. Currently the NYS Health Department categorizes the flu activity level in New York State as widespread with 1,064 cases of the flu reported for the first week of December and 2,056 cases overall since November 1st. Based on these early indications of a more active flu season, it's important to know the facts about the flu and what steps you can do to protect yourself.

Influenza, commonly called the "flu", is a highly contagious respiratory illness caused by the influenza virus. The flu is usually prominent from November through May, the time of year typically known as flu season. According to the Centers For Disease Control (CDC), 200,000 people each year are hospitalized due to complications from the flu. Influenza is transmitted through the air by coughing or sneezing, or by direct contact with nasal secretions or contaminated surfaces. Symptoms of the flu include body aches, headaches, cough, sore throat, fatigue, fever, chills, vomiting and diarrhea. The most distinctive difference between the flu and the common cold is the flu causes a higher, longer lasting fever accompanied with severe body aches while with a cold the fever and aches are not as pronounced.

Ways to prevent transmission of the flu:

- -Wash your hands frequently using soap and water
- -Cover your cough or sneeze
- -Stay home from work or school if you are experiencing flu-like symptoms to prevent spreading to others

-Get vaccinated

Older adults, young children, and people with chronic health problems are at a higher risk for serious flu complications and should get vaccinated. Flu vaccines either by injection or nasal spray are available at your doctors office, health clinics and pharmacies. It takes

two weeks for the vaccine to become effective. If you have not yet received the flu vaccine for this season and are planning to, now would be the time to get vaccinated.

Keep Italian

To the Superintendent, Board of Education and members of the North Shore School District Community,

Allow me to provide a rebuttal to the North Shore School District's reasoning for dropping Italian. As a spokesman for Loggia Glen Cove #1016 Sons of Italy in America and an at large Italian-American spokesman, we are vehemently opposed to the dropping of Italian as a language of study from the curriculum. Education in this country is a state responsibility; New York State allows each school district a certain amount of autonomy as long as they provide a core curriculum and teach classes that are part of the N.Y.S. syllabus. This means that the district can teach N.Y.S. approved curriculum and they (the local board of education) can tailor their curriculum to reflect the needs and desires of the community they serve.

According to the 2010 U.S. Census statistics, the North Shore School District is comprised of 35% Italian Americans and as such it would not be unreasonable for the district to continue to teach Italian as a language. The Italian language represents the heritage of the largest ethnic group in the district. The only ethnic group to offer scholarships every year to NS graduates is the Italian American community. I know that in many districts other languages

are taught which reflect the make up of that community. For example, the Great Neck School District offers Hebrew as a language choice. Proof of the desire of the residents of North Shore to learn Italian is that the first year it was offered (2002) it became the second most popular enrollment (of four languages offered). Today, it still continues to be number two. Surely, parents and educators know that a student's motivation to learn is a priceless factor in the learning process. Therefore, it came as a shock to learn that the NSBOE wants to phase Italian out of the curriculum. The argument that Italian is less important than the other languages is specious and that offering Mandarin (Chinese) would better serve the students. Mandarin is only important for commercial reasons, not academic—if that were the case, why not replace Spanish with Portuguese? After all, Brazil's economy is larger than all the Spanish speaking countries economies combined and their economy is growing at a rate as fast as China's! (And Brazil is a democratic republic.)

When a national survey ranks a language, it does not take into consideration any regional differences. It is important that our students be allowed to, after their requirements are met, enrich their own heritage.

As for Italian's academic value, may I remind the board that the university system was developed in Italy. Most of the oldest universities are in Italy. The first medical school, law school, woman to earn a doctorate was in Italy (in the 16th century)! Today, many American students attend university in Italy. Italian was the first international language when musical notation (invented in Italy) spread around the world. Shakespeare

studied Italian and half his plays take place in Italy (and his sonnets were in the Italian style). The language of architecture is Italian. According to UNESCO, Italy, a country the size of New York State has the MOST world heritage sites. According to the New York Times, 80% of works of art were created in Italy.

If a student's own heritage is important to their education and their language is replaced with another for economic reasons, then the district should do away with art, history, world literature, and classical music and give the students magazines and Wall Street Journals to read!

We, in the Italian-American community, also see this issue as a civil rights issue. Political correctness allows the district to denigrate Italian and not consider dropping a less popular language (French or Latin) even though the Italian language is more popular. As soon as Italian was allowed on "the bus" it moved to the front. Now, they want to kick Italian off the bus and instead of the bus going to the museum and the opera, they want to commandeer the bus and take it to Chinatown!

I beseech the BOE to table this vote as the community has had little time to address this issue and we need more time to respond. We have just contacted the Italian Consulate, the National Sons of Italy and the Italian-American state legislators.
