NS World Language Program

To The Editor,

At its meeting on December 13, 2012, the North Shore Board of Education (“BOE”) voted to implement a new foreign language program, the World Language Program (“WLP”). The WLP is an expansive foreign language program that implements Mandarin Chinese in grades K-2, a choice of Mandarin Chinese or Spanish in grades 3-5 and adds Chinese as a language choice in the middle and high schools. It also initially called for the elimination of Italian as an accredited language in the middle school and high school which sparked community outrage. As a result, the BOE was forced to reconsider its position and reinstate Italian.

Although the elimination of Italian was the impetus behind the community’s opposition to the new WLP, the adoption of this program raises a whole host of issues that need to be seriously considered by the BOE, the Administration and this community. We need to look at how our tax dollars are being spent, the choices that are being made for our children and the responsiveness of the BOE to the community’s concerns and desires.

The newly revised WLP calls for the addition of 5 foreign language teachers. While the Administration and the BOE

claim that these additional teaching positions will be paid for by the projected reduction in enrollment at the elementary and middle school level with the consequent reduction in the number of classroom teachers, no hard numbers have been provided nor have we seen any projections as to how this program will impact the budget as a whole. It is difficult to understand how we can suddenly afford 5 new teaching positions when the following events have occurred: (1) the teachers were asked to and did renegotiate their contract in order to save 15 teaching positions; (2) parents of students enrolled in the district received a letter asking for a donation of \$150 per student to the Viking Foundation; (3) the BOE and Administration are currently in the process of doing a ten year plan for capital improvements and developing a bond issue to be floated in January 2014 to pay for those capital improvements, and; (4) according to Dr. Melnick, we are facing a \$2 million bill for teachers’ benefits. In light of the foregoing, rather than looking at how we can spend the alleged savings from declining enrollment, shouldn’t we be thinking of where we may need those savings to meet our ever increasing costs without exceeding the 2% budget cap?

The second issue is the choice of language. Dr. Melnick stated that one of the

goals in changing our foreign language program was to increase fluency. If fluency is the goal, Italian or Spanish would seem to be the better choice where there is some possibility of parental involvement or of it being heard or spoken at home or on other media outlets. Chinese is a difficult language to master. In fact, this district previously offered Chinese at the high school and it was dropped due to a lack of interest. Moreover, as we focus on Chinese, we face the possibility of the elimination of French, Latin and Italian as language choices. It is hard to imagine how a small district such as ours can sustain a choice of five foreign languages.

The third issue is the responsiveness of the BOE to the concerns raised by the community. At the December 13 BOE meeting, the public spoke for two hours against the elimination of Italian. Yet, the BOE unanimously voted to implement the WLP and eliminate Italian without any discussion or even announcement. While the BOE claimed to “hear” what the community was saying, it obviously failed to consider the community’s sentiment.

A new group of concerned citizens was born from the BOE’s poor handling of this situation, the North Shore District

Reform Group. It is seeking to have an active voice in the budget process and to find and support candidates on the board of education who are sensitive to the needs of the entire community. You can contact the group at nseducationreform@gmail.com.

The next BOE meetings will begin the process of formulating the budget. I encourage all members of the community to attend these meetings.

It’s high tide now. I peer out my kitchen window to the north. I see huge waves surging high over my seawall, leaping to the sky, drawn by the moon, flooding my backyard. I rush downstairs to move things off the floor.

I learn firsthand the significance of Newton’s Second Law of Motion: force equals mass times acceleration. The mass of these waves is great, as is their acceleration. Their product -- the force -- is even greater. It strikes the foundation of my house like a powerful battering ram.

My house is dancing to the beat of the waves. I’m scared. I picture the crumbled heaps of homes in Howard Beach and Breezy Point.

Suppose my house collapses and is whisked off to Connecticut – with Trixie and me inside. I have to get out of here. Now!

I look out my living room window to examine the road. But there is no road. Instead, there is a river flowing fast from the east to the west.

Too late! Too bad!

In bed I can’t sleep. My bed and I are in perpetual motion, moving to the beat of the waves. I can’t take this anymore. I’ll put my house on the market tomorrow. I simply have to leave.

Today is another day. The sun is out. The waters are calm. Today Long Island Sound is a She, mild-mannered, nurturing me.

I think I’ll stay.



Movie Review



Gangster Squad

iting. To compensate, there is a well shot car chase that makes great use of some WWII grenades. Director Ruben Fleischer, whose previous film credit was the disastrous 30 Minutes or

Less, does show more competence here, but may not have been the best man for the job. This movie needs someone who can fully embrace the stylish violence that makes it so entertaining.

Ryan Gosling, who added a higher tone to his voice, easily emerges as the standout, not holding back on his slick charm. It would have been great if he and Emma Stone were given more scenes together given their natural chemistry, which is heightened since having previously starred together in Crazy, Stupid, Love. Sean Penn on the other hand, falls short. Everything he says is spoken either in a low growl or bellowed, though never really coming across as terrifying. He has the intimidating stare, just no flair. Josh Brolin picks up the slack as the fiercely determined sergeant, ready to put his life on the line in order to protect the city he loves.

A few of the movie's missteps can be found within the screenplay, which is based on Tales from the Gangster Squad by Paul Lieberman. Penned by Will Beall, a writer on the television show Castle, the script is brimming with smooth noir-style dialog, though it is in serious need of character development. For a long while, Gracie is given little to do other than dutifully follow Cohen around, and her backstory is summed up in a sentence later in the movie. Cohen's callousness is apparent, yet his sadistic tactics don't make much sense. His means of dispatching those he no longer needs are torturous, yet he does not appear to do this for his amusement. Cohen has his lackeys snuff them out, and does not even stick around to watch. If Cohen does not enjoy the bloodbath, nor does he seem concerned with sending any kind of message to others, surely a bullet to the head would be much more efficient.

Nevertheless this movie is sleek fun with a high body count. It is nothing revolutionary or cutting edge, just solid entertainment that is a decent start to the year. If this is any indication of the magnitude 2013's films will provide, then we have a lot to look forward to.

Grade: B

Originally slated for a September 2012 release, Gangster Squad was pushed to January 2013 after the movie theater shooting in Aurora, CO. The fact that the film contained a shootout taking place in a theater added to the poor timing which was felt by many. Now about four months later with the scene in question removed, this gritty crime actioner is finally available.

Set in 1949 Los Angeles, brutal crime boss Mickey Cohen (Sean Penn) enjoys unchallenged control and aims to spread his influence. With a large portion of the LA Police Department either bought off or lacking the nerve to take him down, Cohen's status seems destined to only rise. That is until LAPD Chief Bill Parker (Nick Nolte) creates a secret outfit of men whose only job is to rid Los Angeles of Cohen.

At the head of this unit is World War II vet Sergeant John O'Mara (Josh Brolin), one of the few honest cops left in the city. This comes to the displeasure of his wife Connie (Mireille Enos), who would rather look the other way when it comes to Cohen in order to ensure her husband's safety. When she sees this is a mission his conscience would not let him dismiss, Connie assists her husband in selecting other men fit for the job.

The team, who eventually takes to calling themselves The Gangster Squad, comprises of those who are not only skilled but who also were not likely to be approached and bribed by Cohen. This includes capable gunman Officer Max Kennard and his pal Navidad Ramirez (Robert Patrick and Michael Peña, respectively). Conway Keeler (Giovanni Ribisi), a military intelligence expert with a history of ignoring pesky protocol details such as warrants is recruited, as well as Detective Coleman Harris (Anthony Mackie). O'Mara also turns to Sergeant Jerry Wooters (Ryan Gosling), another cop and veteran who is not owned by Cohen. Jerry has his eyes on Cohen's gorgeous girlfriend Grace Faraday (Emma Stone), which puts them both in danger should anyone find out.

What ensues is flashy entertainment. A number of pulse raising shootouts and close combat scenes bring vicious excitement, however they are marred slightly by some clumsy camera work and sloppy ed-

A Seal On Sunday

Out for a sail last week local resident Drew Lawrence spotted this little guy off the shores of Sea Cliff and Glen Cove beach and snapped a picture. It is probably a harbor seal. According to Wikipedia, The harbor seal (*Phoca vitulina*), also known as the common seal, is a true seal found along temperate and Arctic marine coastlines of the Northern Hemisphere. The most widely distributed of pinniped (walruses, eared seals, and true seals), they are found in coastal waters of the northern Atlantic and Pacific oceans, the Baltic and North Seas.

ago (emphasis ours), with the expectation that local governments and the school district would have *ample time to plan* (emphasis ours) for any reduction in the property tax payments”.

So this is the question we pose to the School Board:

Why do you say you were surprised by LIPA's decision and that they shouldn't shock the community; and LIPA says that their plans have been part of the public record for years? How could there be such different versions of the facts surrounding the GWL plant shutdown? LIPA says they told you the plant was downsizing and the school board says they were surprised.

In an attempt to answer this question, we spoke with LIPA's Government and Community Affairs Department and National Grid and LIPA management (“LIPA”). The following is a summary of what we were told:

On April 2, 2009, LIPA published their draft plan assessing the electrical needs of Long Island for the next ten years and the means by which they would satisfy those needs. It was within this draft plan that the future of the GWL plant was proposed to be decommissioned.

This 10 year plan, called Draft LIPA Electric Resource Plan, took LIPA management approximately 18-24 months to formulate (Analysis and Formulation Phase). One of the questions that LIPA management was to determine during this Analysis and Formulation Phase was the future viability of the GWL plant given its age, low utilization rate and the limits of the physical layout.

LIPA informed us that, at some point during

the Analysis and Formulation Phase, LIPA management met with the Superintendent and Igor Webb as President of the School Board. The purpose of the meeting was to inform the school district that the future viability of the GWL plant was in question. At the time, the GWL plant was considered one of LIPA's older plants providing less and less of the electric power needs of Long Island.

LIPA management told us that they knew that a decision to decommission the GWL plant would have tax and economic consequences for the community, which is why they wanted to let decision makers (the Superintendent and Igor Webb - President of the School Board) know as early in the analysis as possible that the future viability of the plant was in question. To paraphrase using the words of the school board – this was the “glide path” that LIPA was trying to give the community.

If the aforementioned account of events by LIPA management is true, and we have no reason to believe it isn't, then why did the school board say they were surprised or that this was a shock?

We raise this issue because there are people in the community that are at a tipping point. The decommissioning of the GWL plant and the transfer of the tax burden, means that they can no longer afford to stay here. This past December will have been the last holiday and New Year celebrated before they put their house on the market this spring. Others will follow over the next few years. And for those that stay, our quality of life will be different.

Name the Celebrity



This week's celebrity, an American stage, film and TV actor, starred with Clark Gable and Charles Laughton in "Mutiny on the Bounty" (1935). He was born in Niagra Falls, New York, on Feb. 27, 1905. After graduating Cornell University, where he was President of the Drama Club, he moved to Greenwich Village, NY and got his first major Broadway role in the 1929 Katharine Cornell production of "The Age of Innocence". The following year, he joined the Theatre Guild and played "Curly" in their production of "Green Grow the Lilacs", later to become the famous musical, "Oklahoma!". He later became a founding member of the famed Group Theatre, together with Harold Clurman, Cheryl Crawford, Lee Strasberg, Clifford Odets, and others. Strasberg had been in the cast of "Green Grow the Lilacs" with our celebrity. In 1932, he had his Hollywood screen debut in "The Wisest Sex" with Claudette Colbert and Melvyn Douglas. He achieved fame in 1933, when he made seven movies that year, including "Today We Live" written by William Faulkner, "Bombshell" with Jean Harlow and the smash hit "Dancing Lady" with then-wife Joan Crawford and Clark Gable.

Last Week's Celebrity

Last week's celebrity was Marjorie Main. Not only did she repeat her stage role as a gangster's Ma in "Dead End" (1937), she again transferred a strong stage performance to film, as a dude ranch operator in "The Women" (1939), with Rosalind Russell, Joan Crawford and Norma Shearer. She was signed to a MGM contract in 1940, and stayed with the studio until the mid-1950's. She made six films with Wallace Beery in the 1940's including "Barnacle Bill" (1941), "Jackson Mail" (1942) and "Bad Bascomb" (1946). She played "Sonora Cassidy", chief cook, in "The Harvey Girls" (1945) with Judy Garland. By the 1950's, she had appeared in a majority of MGM musicals, including "Meet Me in St. Louis" (1944), again, with Judy Garland, "The Belle of New York" (1952)

with Fred Astaire and "It's a Big Country" (1951). In 1958, she appeared twice as the rugged frontierswoman "Cassie Tanner" on the NBC Wednesday night western TV series, "Wagon Train". She played the romantic interest of Ward Bond as "Major Adams", head the "Wagon Train". She also appeared on "Perry Mason" with Raymond Burr. In 1974, a year before her death, Main attended the Los Angeles premiere of the MGM compilation film, "That's Entertainment". It was her first public appearance since she retired from films in 1958. At the post-premiere party, she was greeted with cheers of enthusiasm from the crowd of spectators. She died of lung cancer on April 10, 1975 at St. Vincent's in L.A., at the age of 85.

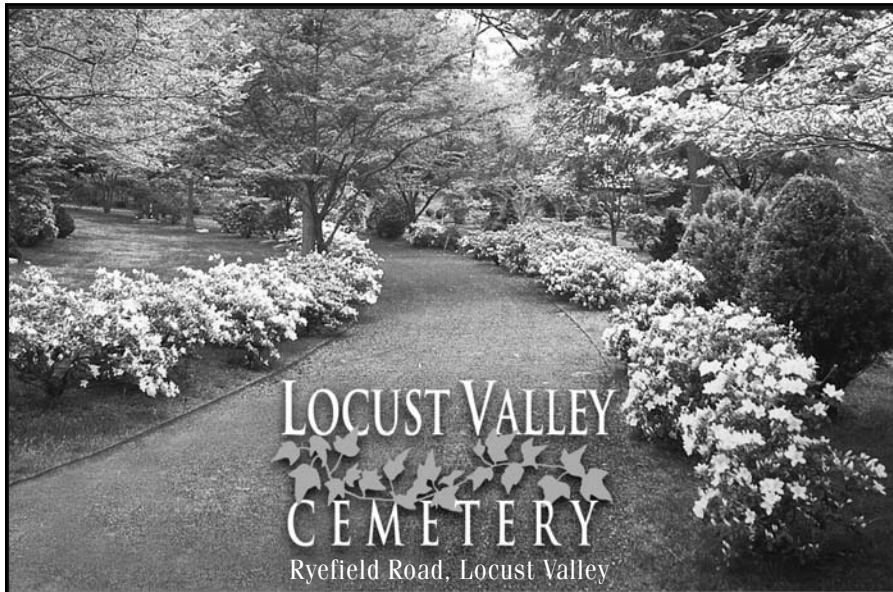

I was underwhelmed, and afterwards when I was discussing it with friends, someone suggested I read a novel (YELLOW BIRDS- was the title, I think) about our military involvement in the Arab wars for another perspective. Have you heard of it and, if so, would you recommend it?

Wanting to Understand

Dear Wanting to Understand, I saw "Zero Dark Thirty" with our Cinema Cliff Club and the reactions were mixed- some seeing it as a great artistic achievement and others bewildered by its popularity. But, yes, I have read YELLOW BIRDS by Kevin Powers and what a powerful book it is! Told in the voice of twenty-one year-old John Bartles, the novel spans five years: 2004 to 2009,

with chapters set in Al Tafari, Iraq; Richmond, Virginia; and Fort Knox, Kentucky. The daily lives of Iraqi civilians, Bartles, his fellow soldiers, their commanders and families back home are recounted. When eighteen year old Daniel Murphy's mother asks Bartles to bring her son safely home to her, he assumes what becomes an emotionally devastating burden. The horrors these two young men endure are recorded in a strangely dreamlike lyricism. An underlying mystery that is made clear only in the final chapters permeates our narrator's psyche and ours throughout. Recommended!

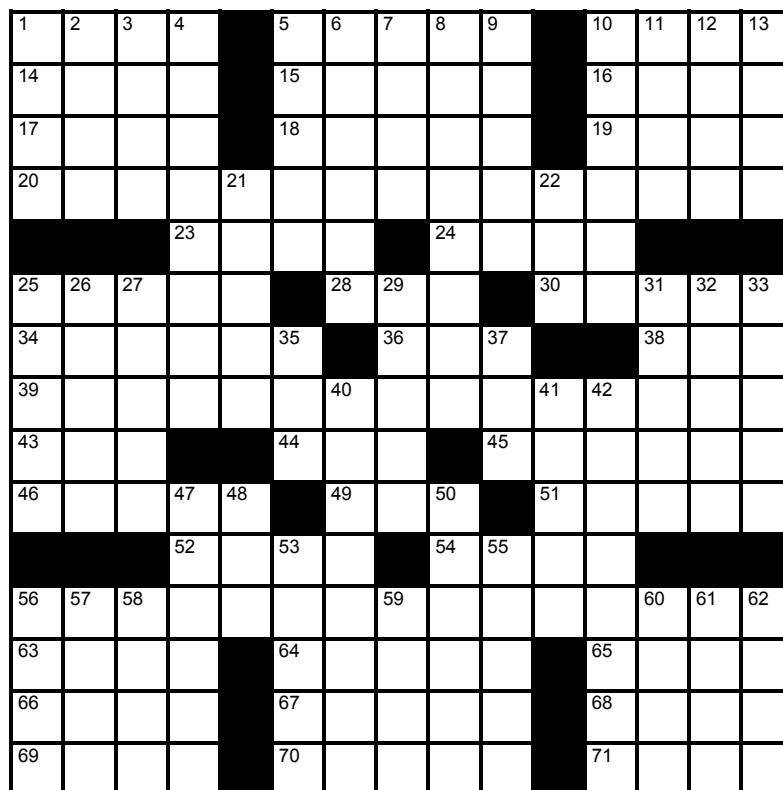

Landing Celebrates Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Day with 'Dreams for Peace' Balloon Launch

Students at Landing Elementary School in Glen Cove celebrated the life and work of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. on Jan. 18 with poetry, presentations and a special "Dreams for Peace" balloon launch. All activities emphasized Dr. King's message of equality and tolerance, with each grade level performing or presenting a unique and inspiring piece during the assembly.

Standing together, third-graders held up letters spelling out "Peace," made from decorated tracings of their handprints, while other presented a Power-Point on peace in everyday life. Several fourth-graders held both eggs and a sign that spelled out "We are all the same." Each egg represented a different ethnic, religious or social group that has been discriminated against, with all students dropping the eggs, smashing discrimination and hatred. Fifth-graders also recited poetry that fit in with the day's theme.

Superintendent of Schools Dr. Joseph A. Laria and Glen Cove City Mayor Ralph Suozzi addressed the students and spoke about diversity and acceptance in the world, as well as Dr. King's long-lasting impact.

The celebration commenced with the students heading outside to launch their class' "Dreams for Peace" balloons simultaneously. Prior to the assembly, students wrote their "dreams for peace" on a small piece of paper, along with

their first name and the school's contact information, which were inserted into 36-inch helium balloons, one balloon representing each class at Landing. When the balloons reached a certain altitude, they broke, sending all of the students' "dreams" back to the ground for people to find, read and experience their lasting impact, just as Dr. King's dreams did.

"Martin Luther King Jr. had a dream, and our dreams are important just like his," said Maxx Kern, a student at the school. "They will make the world a better place."

Interim Principal Martin Malone said that it is imperative to promote

peace, tolerance and understanding in Glen Cove and throughout the world. The balloon launch is a positive way for the school to share its students' dreams of peace for the world with everyone, he added.

"We are literally launching balloons filled with thoughts from the kids," Ma-

lone said. "I hope the students realize how they can personally contribute to world peace. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s speech began with the idea of a dream that he had. Obviously, he had a major effect on our world, and we think we can do the same thing."
