Man Struck At Glen Street Station

On Sunday February 10th at 8:39PM Glen Cove EMS was dispatched to the Long Island Rail Road-Glen Street train station for a pedestrian struck by a train. A LIRR train had struck a person walking across the rail road crossing on Cedar Swamp Road near Burger King. The 21 year old male was treated for a pelvic injury and transported to the trauma center at Nassau University Medical Center in stable condition. Glen Cove Police, MTA Police and LIRR officials responded to investigate the incident. The area surrounding the train station and the LIRR-Oyster Bay branch were shutdown for 2 hours for the accident investigation.

Two More Wins for the Vikings Women's Basketball Team

Two games last week and two more wins for the North Shore Vikings women's varsity basketball team! In the first game, the girls traveled to Lynbrook and put on a clinic in the first quarter as they shredded the Lynbrook defense to take a 26-4 lead, with all 26 points coming on lay-ups. With junior Caroline Robertson (10 points in the quarter), sophomore Alexandra Cantwell (8 in the quarter) and 7th grader Gabrielle Zaffiro (6 points in the quarter), doing the vast majority of the first quarter scoring, the girls looked unstoppable.

Despite the fact that the Vikings stopped pressing at halftime, it was more of the same the next two quarters, as they built a 58-26 lead going into the fourth quarter and cruised for a 64-47 victory. The Vikings received a boost in the game from 8th grader Jessica Scuderi, making her varsity debut, with 5 points, 5 rebounds and 2 steals.

The next game was a home contest against Lawrence High School and their high-scoring team. In this game, the relentless defense of senior Tara Feehan, junior Meaghan Brennan, sophomore Samantha Capobianco and freshman Kelly Johansen frustrated the opposing team

and led to easy baskets as the Viking offense really began to click. Behind the 16 first half points of senior Erin Sheerin, the girls raced out to 45-26 halftime lead and continued to build their lead with a huge quarter before pulling off the press en route to a 90-46 victory.

The girls were led by Caroline Robertson's 22 points, 8 rebounds, 6 steals and 5 assists, Gabrielle Zaffiro's 11 points and the first career triple-double of Erin Sheerin (19 points, 12 rebounds, 11 steals and 3 assists). Despite the offensive surge, what really brought down the house was the first career three-pointer of junior Kathleen O'Brien (7 points, 5 rebounds), whose three-pointer in fourth quarter brought the whole crowd and team to their feet!

The Vikings are now 14-1 on the season and 8-0 in their conference. The girls have currently won 37 conference games in a row, dating to January 16, 2010. The next home game for the girls will be the first round of the playoffs on Thursday, February 14th with an opponent and time to be determined. Come out and support the Vikings in the playoffs!



EMS participating in program to combat drug overdoses

Glen Cove EMS will be participating in a new Nassau County initiative to combat drug overdoses. EMTs in the City of Glen Cove will now be allowed to administer the medication Naloxone to people who have taken large amounts of narcotics and are in life-threatening emergencies.

Naloxone, known by its brand name Narcan, is a commonly used medication to reverse the harmful effects of narcotic overdoses. Narcotics includes both prescription and illegal drugs such as morphine, heroin, codeine, oxycodone and fentanyl. The Narcan medication has always been carried on our ambulances however only Advanced EMTs (EMT-Critical Care and Paramedics) were allowed to administer the powerful drug. Through the NYS Dept of Health pilot program approved for EMS agencies in Nassau County, EMTs will now be allowed to administer the medication via a nasal spray. This would greatly increase

the number of medical technicians that can administer this medication. We have 15 Advanced-EMTs and 35 EMTs in the City of Glen Cove.

Suffolk County Police Department and EMS agencies have participated in the pilot program since May 2012. According to Suffolk County officials, the use of Naloxone by trained EMTs and Police Officers have prevented 42 life-threatening drug overdoses county-wide since the start of the program.

This is a significant and welcoming development for EMTs given the rise in prescription and illegal drug abuse throughout Long Island. If this could save just one life from a drug overdose then its well worth the effort. The pilot program in Glen Cove will be operational by March.

Portledge Squash Team Goes To National Tournament

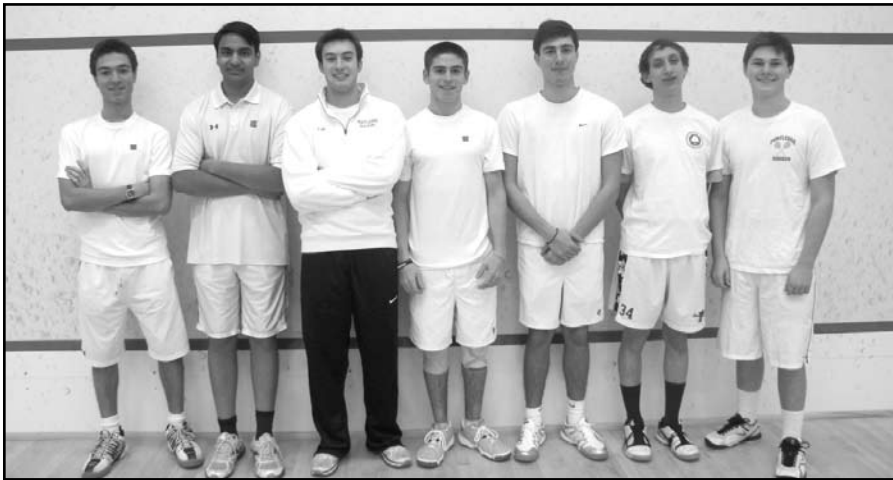

SC Museum Opens Exhibit on Architectural Details

On January 13, Sea Cliff Village Museum opened with its new exhibit, Architectural Details, Ceilings, Floors, Windows and Doors. First to speak was Sea Cliff Trustee Carol Vogt, liaison to the museum, who gave high praise to the Museum Director Sara Reres for the inspirational job she does setting up the exhibits. Vogt also thanked the museum Board of Directors saying everyone is enriched by their efforts.

Museum Director Sara Reres said the day marked the grand reopening of the museum after several renovations were completed in the space. She thanked Mayor Bruce Kennedy for his support, thanked Village Historians Jean Davies and Priscilla Waltz for their work and Donna Barrett who recently sorted historical documents and stored the contents in acid free folders and boxes to preserve them.

The present exhibit features an assortment of architectural details of moldings, doors, windows, and floors, photos of some of the grand homes that are gone but not forgotten and two hand built models of Sea Cliff homes, Connor Cottage and a more modern home at 120 8th Avenue. The entire exhibit is very interesting and can be viewed on Sunday afternoons from 2 to 5 p.m.

Also noted was the work of diver Glenn Williams who recently donated parts found on the Rye Cliff ferry destroyed by fire off the shore in the early part of the 20th Century. The parts that were scientifically preserved are now on display as part of the permanent exhibit at the museum.

Director Reres then introduced the

speaker James Baughton of Sea Cliff Artisans who is in the restoration business and has worked on the restoration of many old homes in Sea Cliff. Baughton has replaced the vintage exterior doors on Village Hall and in the library. He explained the work he does on restoration of old homes as taking apart and putting together the homes to maintain their ar-

chitectural integrity. He had many good tips for homeowners on approaching such a project of restoration vs. renovation. He said that people need to be educated and encouraged to do the right thing for their vintage home especially the exterior if they want to have it landmarked.

North Shore Girls Varsity Basketball Team - Two Impressive Wins!

The North Shore Girls Varsity Basketball Team finished up the first half of conference play with two impressive wins. The first game was a trip to Valley Stream South.

Long bus rides tend to slow down teams, but it had no such effect on the Vikings, especially junior Caroline Robertson, who scored the first 9 points of the game and 14 in the first quarter as the girls built a 24-8 advantage in the first frame. In the second quarter, the girls were sparked by the sharpshooting of senior Tara Feehan (8 points), 8th-grader Ashleigh Sheerin (8 points), and the defensive intensity of Kelly Johansen, Kathleen O'Brien and Danielle Inzerillo as they built a 50-14 halftime lead. The girls pulled off the press in the second half, as they cruised to a 77-43 victory. In the game the girls were led by Caroline Robertson, who set a school record of 32 points, breaking the 31 points of Kristen Reynolds, set in December of 2007.

The next game was against cross-town rival Manhasset as part of a home-and-home with the boys' varsity. In this game, the girls put together their most complete defensive game, as they swarmed the ball and forced Manhasset

to scramble to keep up. Led by Meaghan Brennan, Chelsea Turner and Samantha Capobianco (who had a career-high 5 steals), the girls stymied the Manhasset offense as they forced a school record 74 turnovers (despite not pressing in the 4th quarter). The offense was led by senior Erin Sheerin (8 points, 12 rebounds, 4 assists and 3 steals), 7th-grader Gabrielle Zaffiro, who just missed her first career triple-double (10 points, 9 rebounds, 9 steals) and the fourth triple-double of sophomore Alexandra Cantwell's season (16 points, 14 rebounds, 12 steals and 8 assists). Who, despite how much effort she put forth on the court, still had time to dazzle during her interview on MSG-Varsity!

The Vikings finished the first half of Conference play in first place with a 5-0 record (11-1 overall) and are currently ranked #6 in New York State Class A Public Schools and #10 on Long Island for all schools, regardless of size, classification or whether they are public or private by Newsday and Gold Star Elite (a website dedicated to Long Island Girls Basketball). The girls only have 3 more home games before the playoffs begin, please get out and support the Vikings!

Name the Celebrity



Rudolph Valentino. He starred in several well-known silent films including "The Four Horsemen of the Apocalypse", "The Sheik", "Blood and Sand", "The Eagle" and "The Son of the Sheik". Valentino was one of the first in Hollywood to offer an award for artistic accomplishments in films. The Academy Awards would later follow suit. In 1925, he gave out his one and only medal to John Barrymore, for his performance in "Beau Brummel". The award, named "The Rudolph Valentino Medal", required agreement of Valentino, two judges and the votes of 75 critics. Everyone other than Valentino himself, was eligible.

This week's celebrity was born in Guelph, Ontario, Canada on Nov. 19, 1883. He left home at the age of 16 where he attempted to work as a gold prospector on the Klondike Gold Rush. After running out of money, he won a spot as a singer on a traveling musical company's tour. At age 19, he returned to Canada where he briefly attended a Toronto seminary. After leaving the seminary, he worked for the railroad and worked in theater in Toronto. In 1907, he left Toronto to try his hand in the NYC Broadway theater. While working on Broadway, he developed his trademark deadpan expression while portraying the role of a desk clerk in the play "Little Miss Brown". His success on the stage soon caught the attention of MGM's Louis B. Mayer, who signed him to a six picture deal. He began appearing in numerous silent films before finally making his "talkie" debut in the 1928 film "The Big Noise". He also appeared in "The Canary Murder Case" (1929) with William Powell as "Philo Vance", "42nd Street" (1933) with Warner Baxter and Ruby Keeler and "Imitation of Life" (1934) with Claudette Colbert, Warren William and Louis Beavers.

Last week's celebrity, an early pop icon and known as the "Latin Lover", was

On Aug. 15, 1926, Valentino collapsed at the Hotel Ambassador in NYC. He was hospitalized at the NY Polyclinic Hospital (West 50th St.) and an examination showed him to be suffering from appendicitis and gastric ulcers which required immediate surgery. Despite the desperate attempt to save his life, he developed peritonitis. During the early hours of Aug. 23, he briefly chatted with doctors and then lapsed into a coma and died a few hours later, at the age of 31. An estimated 100,000 people lined the streets of NYC to pay their respects. Suicides of despondent fans were reported. In Italy, in his honor, beginning in 1972, an Italian acting award, "The Rudolph Valentino Award" was handed out every year. Several actors from all over the world received it including Elizabeth Taylor, Leonardo DiCaprio, Sean Connery, Bette Davis and Helen Mirren, to name a few.

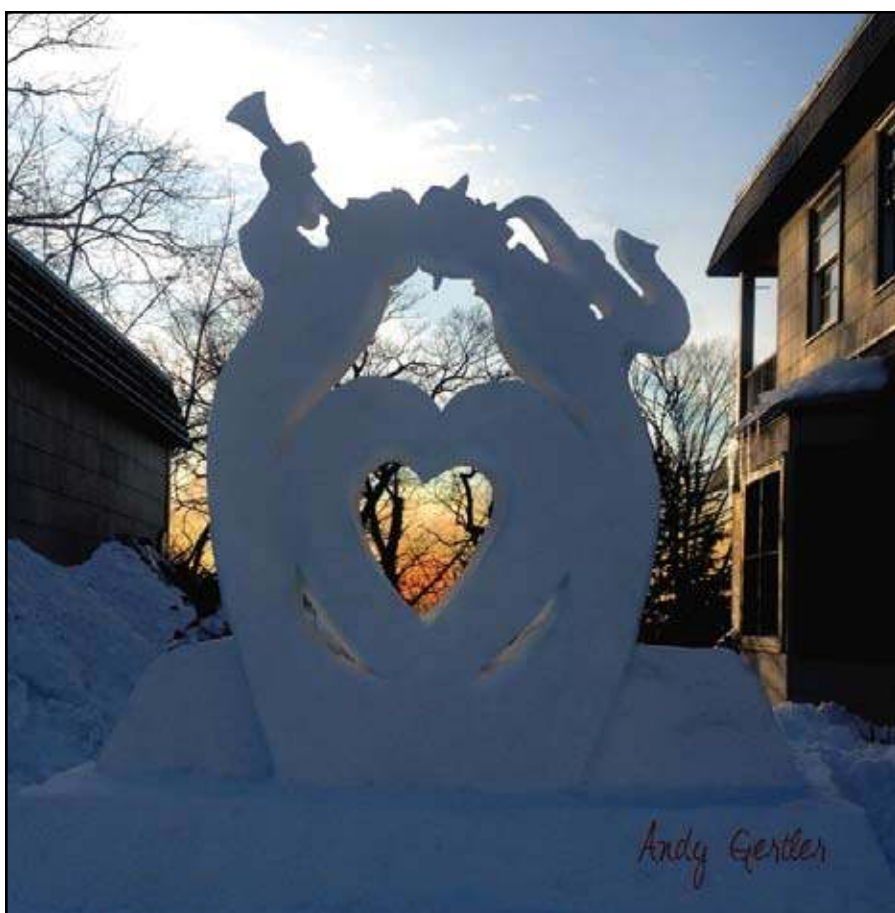

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that, pursuant to Article 2 of the New York State Eminent Domain Procedure Law, the City Council of the City of Glen Cove, by Resolution adopted December 27, 2012, issued its Determination and Findings for the acquisition of fee title and/or permanent easements in portions of certain parcels of land located immediately adjacent to Garvies Point Road, Dickson Street and Herb Hill Road (the "Acquisitions") for repaving, grading, drainage and/or landscaping purposes in connection with the Herb Hill Road/Garvies Point Road Reconstruction Project.

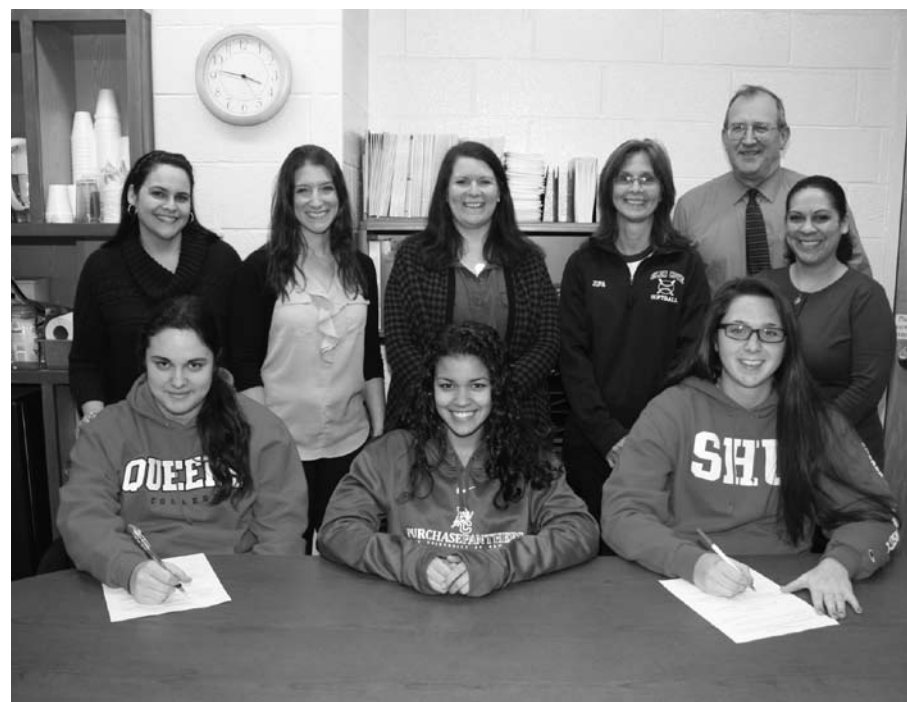

Please give my letter a few minutes of your time if you are concerned about 1.) Higher School Taxes, 2.) Quality of Education, 3.) Truth 4.) Transparency.

"Karen (Caryn?) Quinn, Glen Head asked if a program for performing arts can be added to the elementary enrichment program or after school program. She feels since the institution of state testing in the elementary schools, there is little focus on performing arts. She suggested a program similar to the Great Neck Arts Program which comes into the school and could be an after school program. She also asked what the difference is between the International Baccalaureate Program (IB) and the Advanced Placement Program (AP).

Kudos to Ms. Quinn. Ask questions, demand answers.

"Dr. Melnick responded the Board had an initial presentation by Principal Albert Cousins at their last meeting and at a meeting in February he will discuss the process further. He is also explained

it is a long process and this is in the initial stages with the hope of implementation in the 2015/2016 school year. He explained that an IB diploma is looked at more favorably by colleges and is more aligned with the Common Core Learning Standards recently adopted. He will notify the community prior to the next meeting when the IB program is discussed further. Trustee Beyer added, the IB program encourages creativity and is aligned with our mission. Trustee Genovesi responded the role of the Board is to let administrators explore programs first and there will be many other board meetings going forward to discuss it further. She explained it was a preliminary report and is a 3 year process. The report will be placed on our web site."

Were you the public, aware of this "process"? Were the teachers surveyed? Was the community surveyed before NS decided, (without a vote of the Board), to give the district a blank check for IB? Didn't you folks just have to cut 20+ teachers last year? Isn't LIPA closing the Glenwood Landing Plant which helped offset your school taxes? Do you regularly attend School Board meetings? How much has been spent so far on the IB "process", application and IB teacher training, by the North Shore District? Were you notified of the "next" meeting

where IB was to be discussed? Can you locate the "preliminary IB report" on the NS website? Should administrators be allowed to "explore" with your hard earned money this way?

Which begs the question-- Why is there no IB line item in the North Shore's very detailed 2013-14 budget?? http://www.northshoreschools.org/Board%20info/2013-2014-Budget_Draft_1.pdf

On average, IB costs \$200,000-250,000 more to run per year than AP. IBO requires (but never verifies) approval by the "governing body" (your school board) in order to go ahead with the IB application process. IBO also requires a five (5) year financial plan which guarantees that the district will be able to financially sustain the IB program. There is no evidence of a single U.S. school which has made application to IB being denied authorization, as long as the current checks are good.

"Mary Ann Russo, Glen Head, noted the IB program is more highly regarded than the AP program and is the next step in higher education. She has said this is most advantageous for our students and she supports the program."

Does Ms. Russo's pro-IB opinion carry more weight than Ms. Quinn's thoughtful question?

The "process" does NOT take three (3) years (36 months). The LEGAL PROCESS, (which will be bound by Swiss Law), is not being followed. Perhaps, Trustee Genovesi was misled or misinformed by the Superintendent or the IB Consultant. In communities where opposition is raised to IB, IBO steps up the authorization process and even states on its own website that:

"the period of time is Variations in school circumstances and regional factors mean the process can vary in length between 15-21 months for the Diploma Programme, " (www.ibo.org)

YOU'VE ALREADY BEEN LIED TO. Ozark High School in Ozark, MO, was authorized in 17 months.

North Shore 8th Graders Study the Circulatory System

Students in Mrs. Kelly's 8th Grade "Disease and the Human Body" class investigated the circulatory system and diseases associated with it. During the course of study, the class looked at human blood and human arteries, capillaries and veins using a compound microscope.
