TREES

Look for two informative articles in the upcoming March Village Bulletin. One

announces a Nassau County Conservation District sale of trees and shrubs to help homeowners replace what they might have lost during Hurricane Sandy. The prices are very reasonable (from \$12 - \$22 for a bundle of 10 plants!) and there is a wide selection of trees that are native species that will hold up to storms and not interfere with power lines. You may order online with a deadline of March 10 and orders must be picked up on April 19 and 20 at the District Office at 5 Old Jericho Turnpike in Jericho. The other article is about how to deal with the ivy that is choking so many trees in Sea Cliff and making them more vulnerable to storm damage.

Legislative Action Committee On LIPA Plant

The legislative Action Committee has been working closely with the North Shore Board of Education to continue its efforts of last year in seeking fiscal relief for the residents that would be negatively affected by the decommissioning of the LIPA/NATIONAL GRID power plant in Glenwood Landing.

At a recent meeting held at the Sea Cliff School, the Board presented to the community an update of the LIPA status,

followed by an opportunity to ask and clarify the known facts regarding the past and present LIPA situation. Even though LIPA and National Grid announced in June of 2011 that they had reached an agreement to ramp-down the Glenwood Landing power plant, there remains many unanswered questions, the most critical being that of a loss of revenue that would have to be made up by the residents of the school district.

In early March, a group headed by the School Board President, along with locally elected officials from our district and representation from the Legislative Action Committee, will be travelling to Albany to meet with our legislators, Senators Marcellino and Martins, as well as Assemblymen Lavine, Montesano, and Ra. The aim will be to reinforce the pressing needs of our community in getting legislative action to address the impending tax burden our residents will suffer as a result of the LIPA decommissioning of the Glenwood Landing power plant.

Many of you participated last year in sending letters to our legislators outlining our community concern over this is-

sue. Those efforts were very evident in their numbers and their result. The time is now to begin another letter writing campaign and we ask you to join us in this effort to let our leaders in Albany hear the voice of the North Shore community. The "W" Connection-Widows Helping Widows Rebuild Their Lives

The W Connection is an organization to help women who have lost their spouses to rebuild their lives. It was started locally by Ellen Kamp in 2009, who lost her husband Eric suddenly in 2006, and was trying to restart her life without him.

Ellen said at the time she was working at Morgan Stanley where she had a colleague, who had also lost her husband suddenly. Both women realized that they needed to start an organization to address their dilemma because it was very difficult to locate the support services they needed to help them deal with their loss. They also realized that best support comes from other widows. It's a process that takes years, and that widows have no choice but to rebuild their lives. As a result the organization was born in 2009.

The organization provides basically three services: Information resources for widows on their web site www.wconnection.org. It's a peer mentor program, where more the experienced widows pair up with new widows one on one, and each month there is a chapter meeting which is dedicated to a topic relevant to help a widow move forward and rebuild her life.

There are five chapters, three on Long Island in Sea Cliff, Riverhead, and Sag Harbor, one in New York City, and one in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. They are all run by widows who have a passion about their mission, and leadership skills to run a global organization. The idea is growing and the organization is hoping to add three or four chapters this year. All chap-



ters and peer mentors receive training.

Ellen said that a lot of people think when you get past the initial bereavement period, you're ready to move on, but in reality it's a process that takes years. Statistics show, there are 11,000,000 widows in the United States. Close to 1,000,000 women become widows each year and the average widow is 55 years old. Based on all projections 75% of all married women will be widowed at least once.

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Do You Know Who Your Parents Really Are?

Five years have gone by since I lost my Dad. Who was my Father?
His name was Ralph Parnese, who was one of fourteen children born into a family of poor Italian immigrants, who settled in Ozone Park, Queens, New York.
Did I really know my Father? I thought I did. What I did know was that he was the best Dad any young girl could have. He was full of love, adventure, lots of fun and, laughter, and was my very first dance partner.

However it wasn't until last year when my Mom passed away that I found out who my Dad really was. This occurred when I found a tattered brown manila envelope and opened it.

The contents of this envelope revealed the true essence on the man. There were numerous military documents, papers, photos, and newspaper articles which described the history,

and actions of my father's Unit during World War II. In sum and substance, they told the story of his Unit leading the first convoy over the Burma Road. This operation and battle succeeded in "breaking the blockade" in China.

I always knew that he had served his country—for which I had taken great pride in, but I never was aware of the daunting and enormous task he and his fellow soldiers had accomplished. Then I saw a newspaper article from 1945 and there he was sitting in his truck—right behind Lt. General Dan I. Sultan and Brig. General Louis A. Pick at Ledo, India, leading the first convoy over the Burma Road. The article further describes,

the hardships that they had endured, and how grateful our country was for their heroic efforts.

As I continued reading the documents, I realized that my Father was awarded three medals, the Asiatic Pacific Campaign Medal, World War II Victory Medal, and Honorable Service Medal. As so common among these heroes, they came home and never bragged about their accomplishments.

I received his medals from the United States Department of Defense this year. These medals and all of the contents of the "manila envelope" will be passed on to his great-grandchildren.

My hope is that when you read this story that you take the time to look at your parents, grandparents, and great grandparents and talk to them, spend some time with them, listen to their stories and memories for they are the cornerstone of your future.

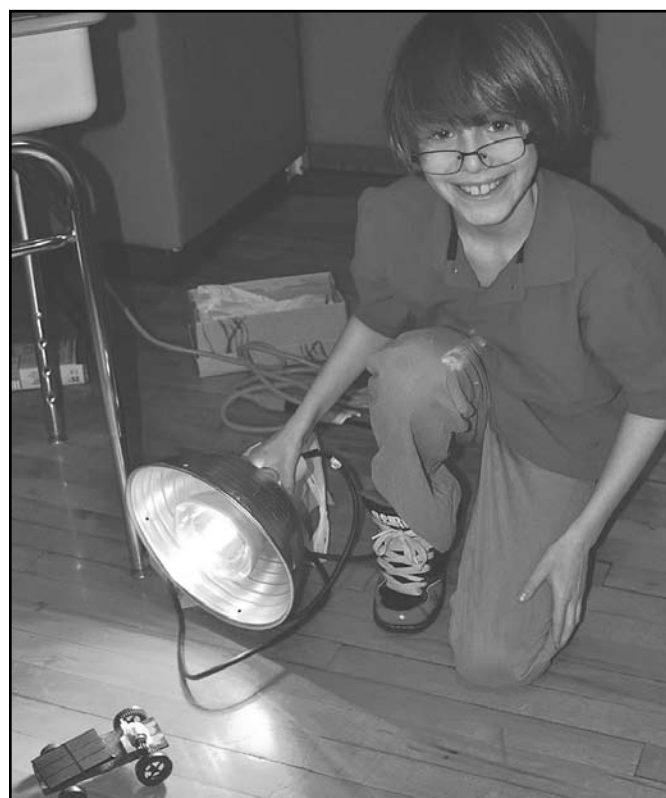
Connolly Students Showcase Their Science Knowledge

Projects covered a range of scientific disciplines, including engineering, environmental and chemistry, among many others. Every student is a participant in the activity, as there are no winners or losers, highlighting talents and unique scientific ability while enhancing the curriculum. Students, with the assistance

of their teacher, selected a topic that they were interested in and completed all of the work for the projects at home.

"It enhances the curriculum and is a wonderful opportunity for the students to showcase their research and scientific skills, sharing it with their peers and family members," Principal Rosemarie Sekelsky said.

Younger students were able to visit the fair to learn more about the exciting experiments. Additionally, fourth-graders will have a chance to present their projects at their own science fair on Feb. 28.

Name the Celebrity



Last Week's Celebrity

Last week's celebrity was born Edward Arthur Sparkman, but was professionally known as Ned Sparks. In the 1930's, Sparks became known for portraying dour-faced, cigar-chomping characters. He became so associated with the type that, in 1936, The New York Times reported that Sparks had his face insured for USD \$100,000 with Lloyd's of London. The market agreed to pay the sum to any photographer who could capture Sparks smiling. Sparks

later admitted that the story was a publicity stunt and he was only insured for \$10,000. Sparks was also caricatured in cartoons including the Jack-in-the-Box character in the Disney short "Broken Toys" (1935) and the jester in "Mother Goose Goes Hollywood" (1938). He appeared in "This Way Please" (1937) which was the introduction of Mary Livingston (Mrs. Jack Benny) and the first motion picture for Betty Grable under contract with Paramount Studios. He also had roles in "42nd Street" (1933) which was nominated for an Oscar for Best Picture in 1934 and "Gold Diggers of 1933 with Warren William, Ruby Keeler and Joan Blondell and the original "Pocketful of Miracles" that was titled "Lady for a Day" (1933) with Warren William and May Robson in the Bette Davis and Glenn Ford roles. This film was the first film for which Frank Capra received an Academy Award nomination for Best Director and the first film Columbia Pictures release to be nominated for Best Picture. For some, Sparks' most memorable role was as the "Caterpillar" in the 1933 "Alice in Wonderland" with Cary Grant as "the Mock Turtle". Sparks died of an intestinal blockage on April 3, 1957 at the age of 73.

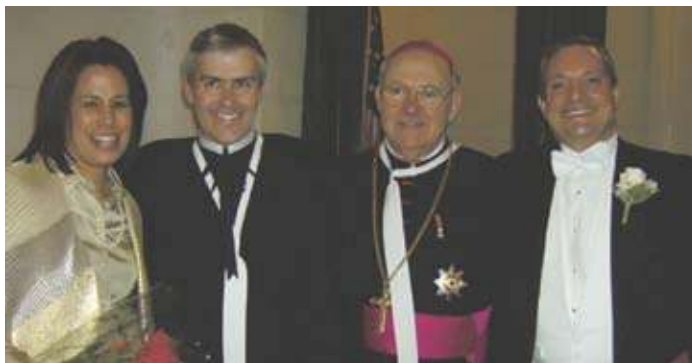

Movie Review

A Good Day to Die Hard

Rated R (Action violence and language)

Stars: Bruce Willis, Jai Courtney, Sebastian Koch

The action genre was never the same after 1988's *Die Hard*, a film so revolutionary it inspired countless others to either pay homage to its ingenuity, or attempt to syphon the prominence. The first in the enduring franchise is also what elevated Bruce Willis to the status of a fierce action star with the fearless character of John McClane, a New York cop whose wisecracks and signature catchphrase can be recognized by those who have not even seen a single entry in the series. More commendable is McClane's unfaltering valiance and resolve in the midst of peril, particularly when the fate of his family hangs in the balance. Only an average mortal man, he still has become the quintessential cinematic American hero. Thus when a new installment is added, the standards are set to near impossible heights. The fifth, *A Good Day to Die Hard*, undoubtedly meets those expectations.

Here we are formally introduced to John's son Jack, played by Australian actor Jai Courtney whom some may be familiar with from the television series *Spartacus: Blood and Sand*. Jack, like his sister Lucy at the start of *Live Free or Die Hard*, has not been on speaking terms with John, unwilling to acknowledge him as his father. When John gets word that Jack has been imprisoned in Russia, he wastes no time leaving the country to come to his aid. Soon after his arrival in Moscow, it becomes apparent to John that his son is in a far more complicated situation than he could have imagined.

It seems an informer named Yuri Komarov (Sebastian Koch) is being held as a political prisoner, while in possession of a file containing sensitive details about corrupt official Viktor Chagarin (Sergei Kolesnikov) who wishes to convict Yuri without a proper trial. Jack, looking at life in prison if he is lucky, offers to testify against Yuri for a more lenient sentence. Later at the courthouse, he does not get the chance to do so as an explosion planned by Chagarin and his recruits led by Alik (Radivoje Bukvi) sends them both fleeing the scene, together.

With impeccable timing John cuts them off, seeing his son for the first time in years. Although displeased, Jack does not have the time to argue. In a brilliant car chase the likes of which have never been seen before the three escape Chagarin's men, dodging rocket

propelled grenades and riddling most of Moscow in bullets in the process. Once in the security of a safe house, John

learns his son is actually an undercover officer for the CIA working to incriminate Chagarin. As John notes, Jack is "the 007 of Plainfield New Jersey."

What unfolds are the double-crosses and hidden agendas typical of a spy flick, but done with breathtaking, adrenaline pumping flare. Director John Moore (who directed one of very few decent videogame based movies, *Max Payne*) clearly put this film together with love for the franchise and not just out of hopes to cash in on its popularity. Included are frequent occasions for Jai

Courtney to prove he can hold his own co-starring with Willis, and a few nods to the '88 original for the diehard *Die Hard* fan. The filmmakers also learned from the misstep in *Die Hard 4* and went for the R rating, reveling in the unrestricted action.

Where the movie suffers is its lack of a memorable villain. Sure, Alik is the kind of guy who sees no issue in arriving to a showdown crunching on a carrot, yet

An Open Letter to the North Shore School Board

Dear President Genovesi

Thank you for your January 31st response to our letter of January 24th and clarifying the fact that no one from LIPA or National Grid management ever met with the school board, the Superintendent or President Igor Webb ahead of their final public announcement to decommission the GWL plant on June 16, 2011. It seems entirely logical that LIPA would publish a draft 10 year plan on April 9, 2009 (in the depth of the financial crisis); hold a series of public meetings for the following twelve months on that same plan (which no one from the Board or Administration apparently attended); and yet never have a phone call or meeting to discuss this issue with you ahead of time.

The LIPA manager that we met with seemed to be a man of honor, honesty and integrity who seemed genuinely concerned about the impact of this decision on the North Shore School District. For you see, he told us that he served as a school board trustee in his own community for 6 years, which is why he was so attuned to the issue. Perhaps he misspoke or we misheard him.

But he did say several things in our meeting that have been confirmed by your public statements. When he was a school board member, he made a practice of calling major businesses as part of the budget process so that the board understood the future plans of the largest contributors to the tax base of the community. This methodology appears to be a very basic tenet of management and budgeting.

The fact that you continue to say that you were surprised by LIPA's decision tells us that you never interacted with LIPA on an annual or regular basis. Who on the school board or within the administration is responsible for the LIPA relationship? How often over the past few years have you interacted with them? Why did no one from the Board or Administration attend any of the public meetings that LIPA held following the release of the draft plan? It would be a shame to think that a simple phone call once a year would have put us in a position to react earlier to LIPA's plans to decommission the plant.

In your most recent testimony to the NY State Legislature, you appear to have changed your testimony from earlier versions to introduce the fact that LIPA's April 9th 2009 plan was supposed to serve as notice to the school board. Why did you change your testimony on this issue?

You have also stated that even if the school board knew in April 2009, that you would have been incapable of making any changes to address this issue. Really? No changes were or are capable of being made?

No phone calls to LIPA... No attendance at any of the LIPA public meetings... No apologies...

We deserve better from our elected officials.

From ASR's Headmaster

Dear Parents/Guardians,

Next year our school day will start earlier with the drop off between 7:30am & 7:45am; class will start at 8 am, gaining for us valuable time for more instruction to form mind, body and soul. The current end of the day at 2:15pm remains unchanged, leaving ample time for after school programs, clubs, sports, drama and extra help.

Before turning to academics, I want to underscore the unparalleled deals on tuition for nursery/pre-K (the lowest in Glen Cove) and for the school (no increase from 2012-2013). The School Board is also considering a possible discount for families with children in the school and little ones in nursery/pre-K.

When one considers the terrible inflation on gas, food, energy and other necessities, our tuition obviously does not cover the cost of running the school. Every tuition already includes a sizable scholarship that is underwritten by the parishes and school benefactors. The actual cost of the education is therefore substantially higher than the actual tuition. Our students, therefore, receive an excellent academic education and an invaluable Catholic character formation, which together provide benefits here and hereafter.

Turning to the curriculum, as we implement the Common Core standards in all our classes, we are also developing our own internal emphasis on language with a grammar track for first-fourth grades to prepare for two years of Latin in fifth and sixth grades. In seventh and eighth grades, Spanish will be offered and for those who qualify, an honors course in Latin (with a limited enrollment of ten-twelve students foresee). We are also considering the introduction of Spanish and Italian for the lower grades.

I believe that this well designed sequence of languages as well as the strong emphasis on grammar will assist the children in the acquisition of an effective command of the English language, which lays the foundation for all other academic subjects, successful communication, and positive interpersonal relationships. Without competence in English in terms of reading, writing and speaking, the child suffers a diminution in opportunities to learn, to respond successfully to challenges, to grow and to mature into a free and responsible adult, capable of love, and faithful to the truth.

The strategic use of foreign languages helps to expand the child's grasp of language as a living organism that has both its own proper rules and boundaries (grammar and vocabulary) as well as its variety and fluidity (creativity and expression). Exposure to Italian and Spanish -- the two languages we are tentatively proposing for the children prior to the study of Latin -- will open their eyes to the broader world. The two year track in Latin not only aims to connect them to the cultural heritage of the West, thereby also familiarizing them with the official language of the Catholic Church (prayer, liturgy, theology and doctrine), but also to give them a conceptual understanding of inflected languages, thereby facilitating the study of foreign languages in Middle School, High School and beyond.

In the Middle School, the clergy of All Saints' supporting parish -- we already have commitments from Saint Boniface, Saint Patrick and Saint Rocco, and hope to have all five parishes participate come this autumn -- will assume responsibility for the religious instruction of seventh and eighth grades. This initiative seeks to integrate more coherently their preparation for confirmation into a broader framework that takes into account the individual parish programs and the fact that All Saints children are part of a Catholic educational environment that sustains and promotes a living relationship with God. With priests and deacons (and perhaps seminarians) teaching, the Middle School will enjoy unparalleled access to the clergy, therewith strengthening intergenerational bonds within our parishes and in the Church and giving a personal and human face to the clergy. Within this instruction, the students will attend their weekly Mass.

These are just a few examples of the innovations that start this autumn. I hope and pray that many new families will join us at All Saints. Should you wish to be a tour guide or assist with hospitality during the Open House, please, send me an email. I remain,

SYNOPSIS OF DETERMINATION AND FINDINGS PURSUANT TO THE EMINENT DOMAIN PROCEDURE LAW CITY OF GLEN COVE

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that, pursuant to Article 2 of the New York State Eminent Domain Procedure Law, the City Council of the City of Glen Cove, by Resolution adopted December 27, 2012, issued its Determination and Findings for the acquisition of fee title and/or permanent easements in portions of certain parcels of land located immediately adjacent to Garvies Point Road, Dickson Street and Herb Hill Road (the "Acquisitions") for repaving, grading, drainage and/or landscaping purposes in connection with the Herb Hill Road/Garvies Point Road Reconstruction Project.

The public use, benefit or purpose to be served by the Project includes: (i) establishing adequate safety and transportation conditions, capacity, and acceptable operational characteristics for Garvies Point Road and Herb Hill Road, including by providing curbs and sidewalks for pedestrians, which are presently lacking (the sidewalks would also comply with Americans with Disabilities Act guidelines); (ii) improving the existing drainage and stormwater management system along the roadway, including by providing stormwater pretreatment, which will enhance the quality of the water entering Hempstead Harbor and Glen Cove Creek; (iii) improving the mobility of people and goods between the Waterfront Area located along the north side of Glen Cove Creek and the City's downtown commercial area; and (iv) raising the elevation of the roadway to bring portions of the roadway out of the flood elevation based upon current Federal Emergency Management Agency maps, and to reduce or eliminate the need to trench for water, gas, electric and other utility line installation.

The approximate location of the Project is Garvies Point Road, Herb Hill Road, and Dickson Street, in Glen Cove, New York. The Project includes the reconstruction and repaving of portions of Garvies Point Road and Herb Hill Road from the terminus of Garvies Point Road to approximately 700 feet southwest of the intersection of Charles Street and Herb Hill Road (approximately 0.9 miles). The reason for the selection of the location of the Project is that it is the location of the existing subject roadways, and is therefore the only possible location for the implementation of the identified public use, benefit and purpose of the Project. his theatricality is not on display long enough to have an impact. This makes the finale slightly unsatisfying in that regard. We are not exactly in the presence of Hans Gruber here. Also, the movie has the very rare flaw of being a bit too short. A full two hours would not be objected to, though better too short than too long.

In all, A Good Day is a strong link in the chain that will not disappoint, especially if seen in stunning IMAX quality. Bruce Willis will be celebrating his 58th birthday next month, and he shows no sign of slowing down. He sends us the same message he did 25 years ago: When faced with death, you better die hard.

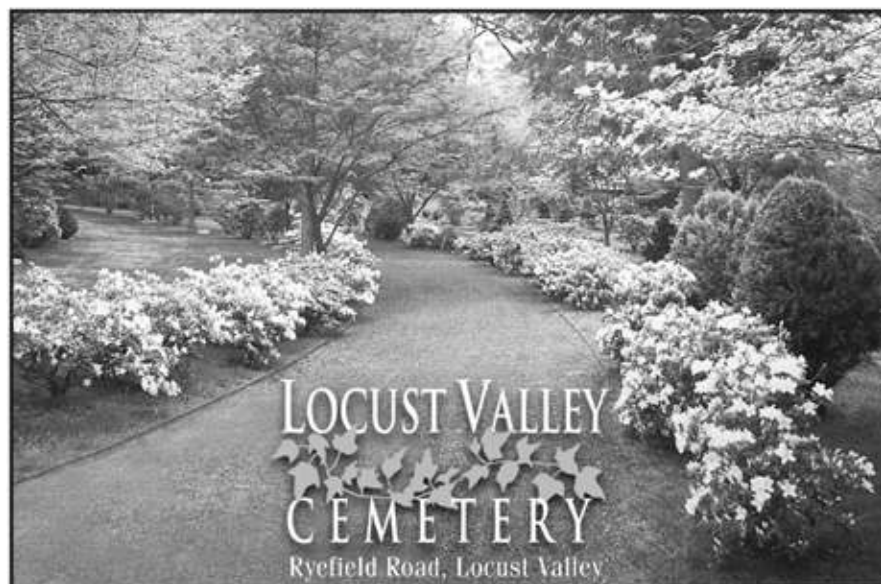
