Volunteers Battle Multiple Fires In Week

The Glen Cove Fire Department, aided by neighboring departments and Glen Cove EMS had a very active week battling large fires, burning cars, and building fires.

On Saturday March 30 at 1:45am the Glen Cove Volunteers were alerted to a "signal 8," an unknown type of fire at Ellwood Street and Valentine Street. According to second assistant Chief Philip Grella Jr, Tom Kenary, Glen Cove Fire Dispatcher #4 received multiple calls for a big fire on Valentine Street so he upgraded the alarm to a General Alarm, "Possible house fire," at 26 Coles Street.

Firefighter and next door neighbor Robert "Rabbit" Budzenski saw that the rear of the next door neighbor's house was on fire and two occupants were on the porch roof. He asked if anyone else was in the house and they stated no.

Budzenski then got a ladder from his garage as 3rd assistant Chief Robert Marino arrived a the scene and declared the fire a "Signal 10," a working house fire. Firefighter Budzenski put his ladder up and escorted the homeowners down unhurt and safe.

Chief Joseph Solomito arrived right behind Chief Marino and set up com-



mand while Chief of Department Rodni Leftwich took up operations in front and Chief Marino took up operations in the rear of the building.

Engine 525, according to Grella, was first due. They were ordered to lay in a 4 inch supply line and stretch two 1 3/4 hand lines to the rear of the building. Ladder 5211 was 2nd due. They started the truck operations while engine 528 was ordered to lay in another 4 inch supply line front the fire hydrant and stretch a 1 3/4 hand line to the front door.

Mutual aid was provided by Sea Cliff Fire Department for a Fast Team to the scene while Glenwood Landing Fire Co. was dispatched for one ambulance to Glen EMS Headquarters to take in all other alarms while Glen Cove EMS assisted at the scene.

The GCVFD had four engines, one ladder, 1 rescue, 1 fire police unit and four chiefs on the scene with approximately 175 members. The Nassau County Fire Marshall was called in and the fire is under investigation.

24 Ravine Avenue

On Wednesday April 3 at 7:44pm the GCVFD was alerted to a possible house fire at 24 Ravine Avenue in Glen Cove. Dispatcher #1 and Chief of Department Rodni Leftwich received multiple calls for a house fire and possible car burning next to the house.

1st Assistant Chief Joseph Solomito was on scene first and right behind him was 3rd assistant Chief Marino, and 2nd Assistant Chief Philip Grella. Chief Solomito transmitted a "signal 10" with heavy fire coming out of the attic windows. Chief Grella went inside and conducted a search for victims on the first, second and third floors. Chief Marino was outside running operations while Chief Solomito set up command.

Chief Grella radioed that no victims were found in the primary search of the

first and second floor but he couldn't make it to the attic due to the heavy volume of smoke. Chief Grella ordered two 1 ¾ hand lines to the rear of the house up to the second floor so they could make it to the third floor. First due 525 stretched the lines to the rear of the building, ladder 5211 set up on the side of the building with hose lines in place. The truck company was hitting the fire with water.

Sea Cliff Fire Department was called for a Fast Team, Glenwood Fire Co. Was called for a tower ladder to the scene which wet up in front of the fire building and Roslyn Rescue was called for an engine to stand by at GC head-quarters. Locust Valley was called for an ambulance at Glen Cove EMS head-quarters. The GCVFD had five engines, 1 ladder, 1 rescue truck, 1 fire police unit and three chiefs at the scene. About 100 volunteers battled the blaze.

The Nassau County Fire Marshall was called in and the fire is under investiga-

69 Clement Street

On Sunday April 7, at 1:54pm the GCVFD was alerted to a possible building fire at 69 Clement Street. Glen Cove Dispatcher Marvin Tate stated it was a possible garage fire but it was on Valentine Street. Chief Rodni Leftwich who was first due on the scene. Chiefs Solomito, Grella, and Marino all went to Valentine and Engine 528 first due provided a line to the rear garage. Ladder 5211 set up in front of the building and the fire was knocked down in about 16 minutes.

The GCVFD had two engines, 1 ladder, 1 rescue, 1 fire police unit ant four chiefs on the scene.

The Chiefs' office of the GCVFD would like to thank all the officers and members from Glen Cove, Sea Cliff, Glenwood, Roslyn, Locust Valley, Glen Cove EMS and GCPD for their assistance at all the fires.



Discoll compared the lifestyles of Downton Abbey's ficticious Lord and Lady Grantham and their servants; albeit based on the real English aristocracy, to the wealthy estate owners and their staff in the era of the Gold Coast in Locust Valley, Glen Cove and beyond.

English teapots were displayed in the showcase on loan from NSHM vice president, British born, Victoria Crosby. Several board members wore traditional costume in keeping with the event, historian Monica Randall, videographer Barry Rivadue and Eve Califano, who displayed a copy of the deed of her home which is the original Latting House for which Lattingtown was named.

Friends Academy Middle School jazz band swings into FL 21 student musicians accepted, perform at Disney Magic Music Days

In mid-March, the Friends Academy Middle School jazz band traded a few blistery days in New York for the hot sounds of Disney Magic Music Days, as they performed for the first time on a Disney stage and participated in a special Jazz workshop.

"This is the first time we have been accepted and played at Disney Magic Music Days," said Jazz teacher Jesse Tennyson. The students were required to record two songs and submit each to Disney for approval.

The FA jazz band was the first ensemble to perform for Disney's new spring season and students (or cast members, as Disney organizers referred to them as), were also able to tour the backstage inner workings of Disney World.

"Our students played a 25-minute set of music and sounded amazing," said Tennyson. "There was a professional sound crew helping us with an introduction by a live MC," he added. The students ultimately drew quite a crowd of listeners as more people began to walk over to hear the band's five-song set, including Duke Ellington's "It Don't Mean a Thing," Neil Hefti's "Cherry Point," Duke Ellington's "Satin Doll," Tito Puente's "Oye Como Va" and Neil Diamond's "Sweet Caroline."

During their second day, students headed

to a recording studio to participate in the "Jazz It Up!" workshop, in which the band members sight read five Disney classics such as "Kiss the Girl," "It's a Small World," and "Reflection."



For seventh grader Andrew Becker (Old Brookville), who plays the drums, the opportunity to record was the highlight. "My favorite part about the trip was working in a professional workshop," said Becker. "We got a chance to try something new by recording our songs and it sounded great. And I was surprised by how fun it was to play in front of a crowd," he added.

An on-site clinician and professional jazz trumpeter taught the student musi-

cians everything from sight reading to improvisation to how to record in a studio. A sound engineer helped create a CD of all of the songs the students had worked on, as well as syncing their se-

lection, "Kiss the Girl" with the original animated film. "I was so impressed with our students' professionalism," remarked Tennyson. "And the clinician and sound engineer were too... saying that our middle school students sight read the music better than most high school groups."



This week's celebrity was born Feb.16, 1909 in Lawrence, Kansas. He began his career in show business by performing in theaters, night clubs and on the radio in 1931. He attended the University of Chattanooga in Tennessee, but left when his position on the football team was changed. He later attended the University of Southern California, and graduated with a Master in Theology degree in 1946. He began acting in motion pictures in 1940, appearing in over three dozen films. Many of these roles were not credited. He worked along with another future TV dad, William Bendix, in the 1946 film, "The Blue Dahlia" along with Alan Ladd. In 1946-47, he starred in five films as private detective "Michael Shayne" taking over the role from Lloyd Nolan. Later, he acquired his best-known role as the archetypal philosophy-dispensing father in a well-known 1950's sitcom. His Theology degree came in handy for that

Last Week's Celebrity

Last week's celebrity was Will Sampson. He appeared in the production of "Black Elk Speaks" with the American Indian Theater Co. in Tulsa, Oklahoma, where David Carradine and other Native American actors like Wes Studi ("Dances with Wolves", "The Last of the Mohicans") and Randolph Mantooth ("JAG" "Battlestar Galactica", "Baywatch") starred in stage productions. He was also an artist. His large painting depicting the "Ribbon Dance" of his Muscogee people is in the collection of the Creek Council House Museum in Okmulgee, Oklahoma. His artwork is currently displayed online by The Kvskvnv ("kuskuna") Association. In an interview in TV Ontario's series Film 101, "Hollywood Asylum, Explored or Exploited?", film actor Brad Dourif, who played "Billy Bibbit" in "One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest", stated that Sampson had been imprisoned for a crime he did not commit. After he was pardoned, after serving ten years, his release came without apology or compensation. Sampson reportedly observed the cast on set and noted, based on behavior, that he and Dourif truly understood what it meant to be institutionalized. After undergoing a heart and lung transplant, he died on June 3, 1987, of post-operative kidney failure. He was 53 years old.



He and a young idealistic reporter and a world weary photographer revisit fourteen sites that played pivotal roles in Sutton's life. We travel through time and place from his childhood in the early 1900's in downtown Brooklyn to all the boroughs of New York City in 1969. The anger felt by so many (including Moehringer himself) towards the banking industry permeates this book . Throughout time there has been a fascination with the "good crook" - think Robin Hood- and Willie Sutton certainly qualifies as such. A fascinating read!


