Congratulations to Glen Cove High School varsity girls lacrosse coach Jacqueline Gow, who has been named the 2013 Coach of the Year from the Girls Lacrosse Coaches Association. Coach Gow is being honored for her outstanding body of work through the years and her team's hard work and persistence through a challenging year. Coach Gow has served as the Big Red girls lacrosse coach since 1999, when she won her first Nassau County Coach of the Year award, followed by honors in 2000, 2001 and 2011. ## Author, journalist Paul Cuadros visits Friends Academy

## Author of "Home on the Field" talks to Upper Schoolers about race, poverty and prejudice

LOCUST VALLEY — Award-winning investigative journalist and author Paul Cuadros transported nearly 400 Friends Academy Upper School students and faculty to the deep south with his remarkable account of how a small-town team of "underappreciated young Latino soccer players in an all-football town overcame poverty, prejudice, and the odds, to become champions."

Currently a professor of Journalism at University of North Carolina – Chapel Hill, Cuadros became interested in the changing demographics of the country back in 1998 when it was still "an underground story" and began studying worker safety issues, specifically at chicken processing plants.

After receiving an Alicia Patterson Fellowship, Cuadros moved to rural North Carolina to continue researching his book, "Home on the Field" and then took the unusual step of getting involved in the story. "I started coaching a boys soccer team, comprised of immigrant boys from Mexico. Many had crossed the border by themselves."

Facing racism and discrimination, Cuadros ultimately led the soccer team, Los Jets, to a championship title in only three years and eventually helped turn the tide of prejudice in a town whose Latino population had skyrocketed from 1.2% in 1990 to 50% in 2010.

Cuadros also addressed issues of driver's license laws in NC with regards to immigrants in a Q&A with students. Later on that afternoon, Cuadros visited the Upper School journalism class, as well as participating in an Upper School Lunch-and-Learn discussion, where he fielded questions from students on a range of immigration issues.

Enrolling 779 students from age 3 through Grade 12, Friends Academy is guided by its Quaker heritage and the principles of integrity, simplicity, patience, moderation and a peaceful resolution of conflict. The school is located on 65 acres at the intersection of Piping Rock and Duck Pond roads in Locust Valley/Glen Cove. As a 53 year member of the Sea Cliff Fire Department, Charlie has served as Chief of the Department, and several other offices in the department's Hook and Ladder Company as he moved up the ladder. He has also been the department's delegate to the 5th Battalion for more than 10 years. Charlie served as a Village Trustee for 2 years and as a member of the Sea Cliff Civic Association. For the past 34 years Charlie has been an active member of North Shore Kiwanis, during that time he served as president and was designated by Kiwanis as past distinguished president. For the past 10 years Charlie has chaired the Annual Kiwanis Pancake Breakfast, the organization's fund raiser for the children of the community. He has also been a Kiwanis volunteer for the Mini Mart and most recently for the "Relay for Life" race. During the past 5 years Charlie has volunteered his time as a P.U.P. 



## Name the Celebrity



If this week's celebrity was still with us, she would have been celebrating her 148th birthday on June 19th. Born in Liverpool, England in 1865, she was an English stage actress who appeared in numerous films in later life, achieving recognition in several character roles. She made her first major Hollywood film appearance, recreating her stage role in a film "Night Must Fall" (1937), which also starred Robert Montgomery and Rosalind Russell. She received a nomination for an Academy Award for Best Supporting Actress in that role. This led to several supporting roles in films including that of 'the vanishing lady', "Miss Froy", in Alfred Hitchcock's "The Lady Vanishes" (1938) with Margaret Lockwood, Michael Redgrave and Paul Lukas. Following three films that did not do well at the box office, the success of "The Lady Vanishes" confirmed the opinion of America producer David O. Selznick that Hitchcock had a future in making films in Hollywood.

#### Last Week's Celebrity

Last week's celebrity was Eddie Cantor. As a songwriter, some of his hits included "Makin' Whoopee", "Ida", "If You Knew Susie", "Ma! He's Makin' Eyes at Me", "How Ya Gonna Keep 'Em Down on the Farm (After They've Seen Paree?) and the "Merrie Melodies" Warner Bros. cartoon theme. Born in NYC to Russian-Jewish parents, Meta and Mechel Iskowitz, his mother died in childbirth one year after his birth. His father died of pneumonia when Eddie was two, leaving him to be raised by his beloved grandmother, Esther Kantrowitz. A misunderstanding when signing her grandson to school gave him her last name of Kantrowitz (shortened by the clerk to Kanter). Esther died on Jan.19, 1917, two days before he signed a long-term contract with Florenz Ziegfeld Jr. to appear in his follies. He adopted the first name "Eddie" when he met his future wife, Ida Tobias, in 1903, because she felt that "Izzy" wasn't the right name for an actor. They married in 1914 and "famously" had five daughters, who provided comic fodder for his longtime running gag about his five unmarriageable daughters. Years later, movie historians noted the girls were not necessarily happy about the gag.

Eddie was the second president of the Screen Actors Guild serving from 1933 to 1935. He invented the title "The March of Dimes" for the donation campaigns of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, which was organized to fight polio. It was a play on the "March of Time" newsreels popular at the time. He began the first campaign on his own radio show in Jan. 1938, asking people to mail a dime to the nation's most famous assumed polio victim, President Franklin D. Roosevelt. With the help of other radio personalities, The White House was deluged with over 2,680,000 dimes.

Following the death of his daughter, Marjorie, at the age of 44, both Ida's and Eddie's health rapidly declined. Ida passed in Aug. 1962 of cardiac insufficiency. On Oct. 10, 1964, Eddie suffered another heart attack at the age of 72 and died. In the same year of his death, he was awarded an honorary Academy Award for his distinguished service to the film industry.




#### Dear Great Book Guru,
