Legendary Songwriter Jimmy Webb Performs at Glen Cove Village Square Plaza


Legendary songwriter Jimmy Webb will perform with special guest Peter Calo when week two of the 2013 Downtown Sounds Concert Series takes place at the Glen Cove Village Square Plaza on July 12 at 7:30 pm. During this unique show, Webb will sing many of the charttopping songs he has written for other artists and also tell stories about the inspiration behind those songs and the performers who brought them to life.

Webb received his first gold record at the age of 18 and went on to become the youngest inductee into the Songwriters Hall of Fame. He is also the only artist to ever receive Grammy Awards for music, lyrics and orchestration. During a career that has spanned six decades, he has written hits for Donna Summer ("MacArthur Park"), Glen Campbell ("By the Time I Get to Phoenix" and "Galveston"), Linda Ronstadt ("Adios"), Joe Cocker ("The Moon is a Harsh Mistress"), Barbra Streisand ("Didn't We") and Frank Sinatra, who also performed "Didn't We" and other Webb compositions. He has also released 10 solo albums and his latest, Just Across the River, features duets with Billy Joel, Jackson Browne and Willie Nelson. A follow-up CD that features Brian Wilson, Art Garfunkel, David Crosby and Graham Nash is scheduled for a September 2013 release.

Peter Calo is a guitarist, producer, composer and recording artist who has been hailed as a master musician by The Boston Globe. During his career, he has performed/recorded with an all-star cast including Carly Simon, Queen Latifah, Willie Nelson, Hall and Oates, Phil Ramone, Kris Kristofferson and Leonard Bernstein. He has also released five CDs and is currently working on a sixth.

Every Friday night during July and August, the Downtown BID and the City of Glen Cove join forces to bring Downtown Sounds to the Village Square at the intersection of Glen and Bridge Streets. This annual outdoor concert series, which is free to the public, is designed to use music as a promotional tool to boost the local economy. For example, the weekly concerts typically bring 600-1,000 people to the city's streets, which increases patronage of local businesses including many area restaurants. The event has grown substantially since its debut in 1997 and the city now closes School Street due to the overflow crowds. A new feature this year is a second stage upon which alternative acts perform. For example, on July 12, while Webb and Calo are playing on the main stage, Lee Knight will present a Books Alive Interactive Concert for kids. Knight has written over 100 children's songs and her show, which is appropriate for kids of all ages, provides an opportunity for youngsters to be active participants by singing, dancing and acting on stage with costumes, props and puppets.

Downtown Sounds 2013 is presented by Bethpage Federal Credit Union with additional sponsorship by National Grid, American Community Bank and Men on the Move Moving & Self Storage. The SUNY College at Old Westbury, OWWR Old Westbury Web Radio and OWTV Old Westbury Television, Sahn Ward Coschignano & Baker PLLC, The Glen Cove Printery, Linchitz Medical Wellness and AvalonBay Communities have also provided support for this year's events. Free parking is available at the nearby municipal garage and in the case of rain, the advertised acts will perform at the Wunsch Arts Center at R.M. Finley Middle School on Forest Avenue. Chaminade Graduate Leaves Behind Legacy Of Leadership, Excellence And Character Old Brookville's Rocco Signore honored during Graduation Ceremony at the Tilles Center

Graced in a classic white tuxedo and red bow tie, Rocco Signore, a resident of Old Brookville, stood proud under a bright spotlight on the Tilles Center stage -- before 400 classmates and 2,500 guests -- as some of his outstanding high school achievements were announced during the 82nd Annual Chaminade Commencement on June 2.

As a four-year member of the Chaminade honor roll, Signore accepted a special award from Chaminade High School Principal, Brother Joseph Bellizzi, along with the President's Award for Educational Excellence. Signore's list of academic and athletic accomplishments, however, was far too comprehensive to address during this brief, but memorable moment on stage.

"Rocco is one of those young men who stands out among his peers: selfless, charitable, sincere, disciplined," said Brother Thomas Cleary, President, Chaminade High School. "During his four years at Chaminade, he had gained the respect of both the faculty and his peers. Not only an Honor Roll student, Rocco also excelled in athletics and in his activity involvement. He's a great young man who will continue to make us proud!"

A member of the National Honor Society with a four-year GPA of 3.65, Signore also was a top-ranked New York State sprinter who earned multiple CHSAA individual and relay championships over the last four years. The Varsity Track and Field Co-Captain, who helped lead Chaminade to several team titles, ended his track career with seven (7) all-time Chaminade records in nearly every event from the 55 meter dash to the 4x400 relay.

"He led the track team to multiple CHSAA titles and when I say 'led', I mean just that," said Pat Slevin, Signore's sophomore English teacher and Chaminade track coach who is now coaching at Manhattan College. "He led by example; working hard, sacrificing himself for the team, pushing and pulling his teammates along to team titles. He always put the team first and in this day and age, that's rare. For me, there has never been a student I've ever taught or coached at Chaminade who has just 'gotten it' like Rocco."

Earlier this year -- among more than 400 seniors -- Signore was selected as Chaminade's sole recipient of the New York State-sponsored Outstanding Physical Education Award based on achievement of excellence academically, athletically and through physical education testing; and demonstration of leadership, character and a high-level of community service.


"Rocco is talented, dedicated, determined, industrious, mature and responsible," said Lou Cosentino, Rocco's history teacher in both his sophomore and senior years. "He is held in high esteem by teachers and peers alike. The future is almost unlimited for Rocco," added Cosentino, who retired this June after 38 years teaching at Chaminade.

Throughout high school, Signore made a steadfast commitment to support the Boys and Girls Clubs of America through a program (championssprint. com) he developed to teach kids the proper mechanics of running, acceleration, speed and agility. Most of all, his "Winners Run, Champions Sprint" campaign – which he first implemented in 2010 at the North Shore Boys and Girls Club in Glen Head before taking it on the road to inner cities nationwide – helped at-risk kids understand the true meaning of becoming a student-athlete.

Boys and Girls Club Directors across the country recognized that the bond Signore forged with more than 500 kids throughout New York, Miami, Los Angeles, Boston, Chicago and Washington, DC was significant and impactful.

"Rocco exemplifies the mission of the Boys and Girls Club movement," said Mitchell Day, Program Director, Boys and Girls Clubs of Chicago. "The impact Rocco made on the youth he worked with is a tribute to his dedication, enthusiasm and tireless efforts. Rocco's character and leadership should serve as an inspiration to those whose passions are to make a difference in their communities."

On February 5, 2013, on the floor of the New York State Senate, Senator Jack Martins recognized Signore's academic and athletic achievements at Chaminade, as well as his positive contributions to communities nationwide through "Winners Run, Champions Sprint." Senator Martins requested that the Legislative Body pause in its deliberations and adopt a Legislative Resolution to honor Roc-



co and commend him for the enduring honor he has brought to his family, his school and his community. On the same day, the assembled members of the New York State Senate unanimously approved and adopted New York State Legislative Resolution 350-2013 on behalf of Rocco Signore.

Signore appears to be ready for the next chapter of his academic career at the collegiate level. He decided not to explore numerous athletic scholarship opportunities and instead focused his efforts on the pursuit of a top-10 nationally ranked institution based on academic rigor.

Signore informed the Gold Coast Gazette that while he visited some of the finest universities across the country and enjoyed many of his on-campus experiences, there were only two universities that made his final list. Ultimately, he decided to submit his

First Presbyterian Church Hosts Interagency Council

The Glen Cove Interagency Council recently held its monthly meeting at the First Presbyterian Church. Reverend Betsy Simpson warmly welcomed IAC members and provided an overview of the various ministries and programs offered at the church.

The First Presbyterian Church of Glen Cove was founded in 1869; the church's current building was built in 1905. It is a small congregation with a wide heart. The Church houses the Glen Cove homeless shelter for men each year from November through March. This year marked the shelter's 16th season. The men who come to the shelter are like a little community unto themselves. The church also supports the food pantry at the North Shore INN, collecting food from parishioners every week.

The First Presbyterian Church of Glen Cove is an open and affirming church – everyone is welcome regardless of race, nationality, sexual orientation or economic means. The 6th Annual Pride Service celebration took place on the first Sunday of June.

The church provides space to two Hispanic congregations, sponsors Glen Cove Boy Scout Troop 6, is home to the Gregarians (a gregarious social group) and hosts AA meetings five times a week. It sponsors Vacation Bible School for a week each summer and is a member of the Long Island Council of Churches and the North Shore Clergy.

IAC members also heard a presentation by Maria Caccavale, Assistant Director of FEGS, a nonprofit organization that assists unemployed individuals in finding work experiences with not-forprofits and government entities. Clients range from people who are in their midtwenties to 60 years old. Some are looking for their first job while others have earned their masters degrees. FEGS currently has people placed in approximately 168 sites throughout the five boroughs and Nassau and Suffolk Counties, including many sites in Glen Cove.



Music of the Jazz Age at NSHM July 10



He welcomed a multitude of familiar faces, including fellow runners Tracy Crow, Ed O'Rourke and Carlos Vasquez, former Glen Cove Athletic Director Sal Travatello, and former assistant coaches Jim Peterson and Savy Gallo, among others. Glen Cove City Mayor Ralph Suozzi and Nassau County Legislator Delia De Riggi-Whitton were also on hand to present proclamations commemorating the district for the dedication and for memorializing Johnson for his work with local student-athletes through the years.

"AJ made running a team sport easy," said Sunshine, who shared interesting stories about his former coach, recalling "rabbit runs" to Garvies Point in which team members attempted to catch their coach. He also spoke of how Johnson was not just a coach, but also a mentor and friend. "He was always available to us. If you needed AJ, you called him."

Crow, an African-American who grew up in the Orchard section of Glen Cove but now resides in California, echoed these sentiments. He spoke of how Johnson made him feel welcome during a time when the city was still segregated.

Several family members, including grandchildren Josh and Rochelle Brown, also spoke fondly of the legendary coach, not only as a leader of athletes, but as a quality person. Joined by Johnson's daughters Viki Lynn Brown and Tami Basile, the family looked on as a plaque was unveiled at the entryway

leading to the athletic complex, alongside the plaque dedicated to J.C. Maiden, for whom the field is named.

Last Week's Celebrity

Last week's celebrity, born Audrey Johnston, was Brett Somers. She changed her first name to "Brett" after the lead female character in Ernest Hemingway's "The Sun Also Rises" and the surname "Somers" was her mother's maiden name. Born in Canada, she became a U.S. citizen later in life. After moving to NYC, she married and had a daughter, Leslie, before divorcing her first husband. In 1953, she married actor Jack Klugman. They had two sons, Adam and David. The couple separated in 1974 but never divorced.

On Broadway, she appeared in "Happy Ending", "The Seven Year Itch" and "The Country Girl" with her husband, Jack Klugman. She also held a number of film credits including "A Rage to Live" (1965) with Suzanne Pleshette, Ben Gazzara and Bradford Dillman and "Bus Riley's Back in Town" (1965) with Ann-Margaret. She made many appearances on episodic TV including "Love, American Style", The Defenders", "Have Gun Will Travel", "Ben Casey", "CHiPs", "The Love Boat", "Barney Miller", "The Mary Tyler Moore Show" and "The Fugitive". She had recurring roles as "Blanche", the ex-wife of "Oscar Madison", played by Jack Klugman on the ABC-TV Neil Simon series, "The Odd Couple". She was probably best known for her appearance as a regular panelist on "The Match Game". Even though she was on the show nine years, practically the entire run of the show, she was not one of the original panelists, which began the new format in 1973. Her husband, Jack, appeared on the first week of the show and suggested that producers bring her aboard. Her wit and dry humor proved extremely successful. She remained a regular panelist and became the foil to Charles Nelson-Reilly, Betty White, Richard Dawson, Flannie Flagg and host Gene Rayburn, among others. Because she and the show became know for somewhat outlandish and risqué dialogue, the show has been described as being a game at a cocktail party. Brett was diagnosed with cancer in 2004. Following long periods of remission, she died on the morning of Sept. 15, 2003 of stomach and colon cancer. Jack Klugman died Dec. 24, 2012.

Yes, I know the book: George Packer's THE UNWINDING: The Inner History of the New America. This is a very sad, very disturbing book, but worthwhile and beautifully written. In its essence, "unwinding" is the coming apart of all that has kept the country together: economically, politically, and morally. While America has undergone unwinding in the past and emerged stronger than

ever, this time he sees major differences that do not auger well for the future. He traces the lives of three citizens all born in the 1960's who are struggling to reinvent themselves in a changing America, a country he sees as Walmartized- cheap goods, low salaries, and huge profits for the very few- as an example, the six Walmart heirs have more money than the entire bottom 30% of the population.

Interspersed with the tales of these three, are ten short biographical sketches of modern day icons, some virtuous (Elizabeth Warren) but most - if not villainouscomplicit (Oprah Winfrey, Joe Biden, Colin Powell, Robert Rubin, Sam Walmart) in Packer's view. Certainly not light holiday reading, but highly recommended!
