79 Year Old Tries To Lure 15 year Old

A 79-year-old Glen Cove Man was arrested last week for an incident that occurred on September 23, at 5:30pm, on School Street. The person tried to lure a 15 year old female into his vehicle while she was walking home from school. The female told him that she didn't need a ride but he continued to follow her.

According to Lt. John Nagle, the individual was persistent, backing up on School Street and then offering the young girl money if she got into the truck.

The subject's vehicle and the incident was caught on the Cities recently installed surveillance cameras. The defendant's vehicle was later located by Glen Cove Patrol Officer McDonnell in a local neighborhood within the City of Glen Cove. The 79 year old Glen Cove resident, was arrested and charged with Endangering the Welfare of a Child and Harassment 2nd degree. The defendant will be arraigned in Glen Cove Court tomorrow.

Lt John Nagle said, "The surveillance cameras in the downtown area played a major role in bringing a quick arrest to this case." The downtown camera's were installed through a Federal Grant at no cost to the city's tax payers. The cameras went online last April and they feed directly into the Glen Cove police Department.

Residents Encouraged to Be Aware of Phone Scam

There have been a rash of telephone scams occurring in the Glen Cove area. According to Det. Lt. John Nagle, The scam starts with a phone call from a person stating that he is from the Nassau County Sheriff's Office. The caller goes on to say that they have an arrest warrant pending because you have failed to answer Jury duty. This person goes on to tell the victim that he/she can avoid arrest if they pay a fine. The caller requests that you buy Money Pak cards from any local pharmacies like Walgreens, Rite Aid, CVS. These "Money Pak" cards can be used for cash to purchase other items. The caller will request that you then scratch off the pin number on the card and furnish that number to the caller. The caller will then give you a phony confirma-

tion number. Once the caller receives the cards pin number he then uses whatever amount of money is on that card and uses it. The caller is very convincing, one local resident was scammed for over \$3,500. Please do not give out any information over the phone to callers who state they represent the Nassau County Sheriff's Office. The Nassau County Sheriff's Office will not contact you over the phone for Jury Duty, and they will absolutely not solicit money from you for failure to appear for Jury Duty. If you should receive one of these calls contact the Glen Cove Police Department at 676-1000. If you have questions regarding Jury Duty you can call the Commissioner of Jurors at 516-493-3334.

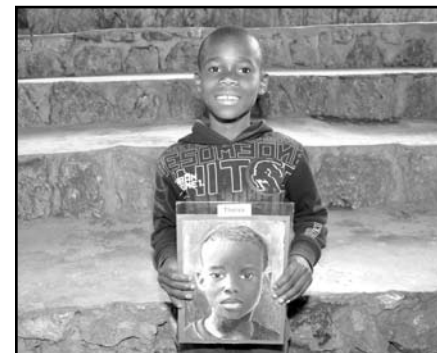
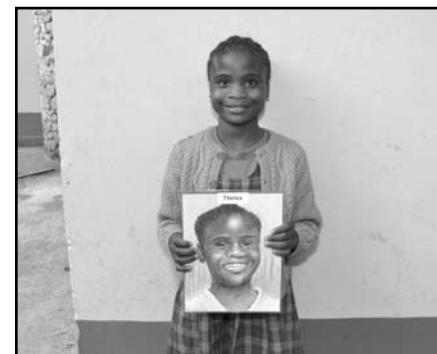

Playing by the Rules

To the Editor,

Since 2005, Village officials, via their considerable regulatory and police powers, have assumed absolute authority over the use of our property. Since first submitting our modest code- and law-compliant subdivision proposal in 2010—after 22 hearings in three years; after a favorable Supreme Court ruling; after numerous Planning Board hearings in the course of the past year; after repeated meetings with Village officials to develop a subdivision plan best suited for our property, after receiving PB approval and being referred to the ZBA for a ruling on required variances—the ZBA again denied our application on September 17, 2013, by a vote of three to two, and relegated us, yet again, to the proverbial “square one.”

Ranging well beyond the ZBA’s purview and appropriating to herself the Planning Board’s purview and N.Y. State’s authority regarding street requirements, the newly appointed ZBA chair argued relentlessly to persuade the other ZBA members to deny our application on the basis of her desire to have us radically reconfigure and resize our access road and lots. In her words: “they can do better,” “many possibilities,” “there are other ways to do the application,” “do it differently,” “put the road elsewhere,” “bring in a road,” “make a cul de sac,” “take away from Parcel B.”

The various Village boards and we have spent many years, and exhausted every possibility and alternative, to arrive at our present subdivision proposal. The ZBA chair seemed to be unaware of this fact when she exceeded the ZBA’s authority and purview to impose her subjective opinions on her fellow ZBA members and on us—ultimately, forcing us and Village taxpayers to pay the costs of yet another Article 78 appeal.

We’ve always played by the rules. We, together with our attorney, have always meticulously researched, documented and complied with all codes and laws germane to our applications—for our driveway, in 2007, and for our modest subdivision, in 2010. What purpose would it serve to not comply fully with all codes and laws? Does anyone actually believe that we and our subdivision application did not, and do not, comply with codes and laws?

We have lived in Sea Cliff and served our Village and community for 45 years. For 45 years, we’ve obeyed code and law; all our applications have complied fully with and exceeded code and law requirements. In just three years, Village officials have stripped us of our financial security, of our quality of life and of our rights and dignity as individuals, property owners, residents and citizens.

The long-term loss of the use of our property plus our extraordinary legal expenses have already cost us well over one

million dollars. We are currently awaiting the Village response to our FOILED request for Village records to determine how much the Village’s opposition to our applications for the past six years has cost Sea Cliff’s taxpayers.

“Private Road”

To The Editor,

On September 17, 2013 Sea Cliff Zoning Board turned down a developer’s application to create a subdivision. The developer required several variances, but as a Village resident, what most concerned me was the “private” road issue.

Several examples exist in Sea Cliff where substandard “private” roads built by developers to access their subdivisions later became Village roads. When this happens, the roads must be brought up to legal standards, and the Village taxpayers have to foot the bill. Recently the Village expended a considerable sum of taxpayer money to repair Florence Avenue - originally a “private” road that became a Village road. Long after the developer disappeared and when residents demanded services, Florence Avenue required expensive maintenance to rectify poor drainage and engineering issues. Historically developers have skimmed by building narrow, poorly graded, poorly drained and under-engineered “private” roads that do not have to comply with the legal requirements of a standard roadway. History need not repeat itself, and it is in this regard that I would like to thank the due diligence of the Village Zoning board.

In my opinion, if the developer spent less time on dragging our Village through the courts and put more effort into listening to legitimate concerns of the village residents when designing and developing a sensible subdivision on Willow Shore, his development may have already been built by now.

It is devastating news for all of us that there will be downsizing at Glen Cove Hospital, but those who are blaming this downsizing on the lawsuit filed by our city that alleges the dumping of Freon by the hospital, are misinformed and incorrect with their accusations.

There is absolutely no correlation between the litigation claiming contamination of the Seaman Road well and the service changes at Glen Cove Hospital.

That is the word directly from NS-LIJ COO Mark Solazzo who wrote the following in a recent letter to Mayor Ralph Suozzi, as reported by media outlets: “I would like to confirm that our plans for the future of Glen Cove hospital have been established solely on the

basis of ensuring the hospital’s viability into the future...Our planning is in no way related to the City’s Freon litigation.”

As a resident of this community, I am pleased and relieved that Mayor Suozzi and other elected officials understood the urgency of this serious environmental and public health issue and took action. First, they conducted research and then they approached the hospital to request that the hospital remedy the situation. The hospital had a year to do so, but did not act.

Mayor Suozzi and the city of Glen Cove had no other choice but to file suit against NS-LIJ. Our mayor and elected officials have an obligation to protect the citizens of Glen Cove. Financially, it would have been too costly to do otherwise, and from a health standpoint, there was no other choice.

The possibility of having even a tiny trace of Freon in our water system is terrible. If I thought for one moment that my community and my family might be drinking toxic water, I would certainly work day and night to get to the bottom of the issue and would not sleep until I was assured that the pollution was cleaned up.

I would expect my elected officials would do exactly what our mayor did, and endeavored to get the hospital to do. The City of Glen Cove was acting in the best interest of its residents, which is its duty.

The mayor’s political opponents are trying to smear him by placing blame for the hospital downsizing directly on him.

They should be praising Mayor Suozzi for acting judiciously on our behalf. The position his opponents are taking suggest that if they were making this decision, they would NOT have pursued the hospital to clean up the pollution. Would that have been right? Would that have been responsible? It is my opinion that Mayor Suozzi and his team did the right thing.

Sea Cliff Community Gets To The Root of The Tree Ordinance

In a village as old as the trees that take root in it, many citizens of Sea Cliff have distinct differences in opinion concerning the trees that dot their community. The volunteer-run Tree Committee led by Carol Vogt and Russell Gorog, along with the mayor and the Board of Trustees, met in an informal discussion Monday night to discuss as well as review the current tree ordinances in place and open the floor to community opinion.

The committee's main objective is ultimately to be able to protect the trees of Sea Cliff from being excessively cut down while trying to educate the public about the importance of trees and the purposes of specific ones. The current ordinances mandate a permit be approved by the committee to allow homeowners a removal of any tree 8 inches and over. Most of the time, the committee states, approval for the removal of trees goes through due to the sickly, dead, or dangerous nature of the tree.

Many approve and applaud the efforts of the Tree Committee, highlighting the importance of trees to the community

of Sea Cliff. Some believe in having no tree be taken down without a permit, and others pitched the idea of preparing a booklet to provide residents with information on what trees would be best to plant in the community and various other arbor information. They expressed their support in the articles by Russell Gorog about trees in the newsletters sent to villagers in the mail. Overall, everyone could agree to the good trees bring to the community.

With having a Tree Committee also comes the question of free will for property owners and tax payers. While trees are important to the community, they also belong to the owner of the property the tree is located on. Some feel opposed toward enforcing legislation on this aspect of their rights as a property owner. Consideration for the owner and their aesthetic whistles is something many feel is important to take into account.

Ultimately, the Village of Sea Cliff and the Tree Committee want to do what's best for the community. In doing so, they need to hear all opinions about the Ordinance and what people would like to see done about it.

Last Week's Celebrity

Last week's celebrity was Alma Reville a.k.a. Lady Alfred Hitchcock. She was a collaborator on her husband's suspense films. She had a keen ear for dialogue and an editor's sharp eye for scrutinizing a film's final version for continuity flaws so minor they escaped Hitchcock's own notice and that of his crew. It was Reville who noticed Janet Leigh inadvertently swallowing after her character's fatal encounter with Norman Bates' mother in "Psycho"(1960), necessitating an alteration to the film's negative. She was particularly good at revising dialogue and spotting inconsistencies in his plots. She died of natural causes, at the age of 82, on July 6, 1982, two years after Hitchcock's death. She had suffered from breast cancer many years before her death and was in remission for so many years, she was considered fully recovered from the illness. In 2003, her daughter, Patricia Hitchcock O'Connell and Laura Bouzereau wrote a book about Lady Hitchcock entitles "Alma Hitchcock: The Woman Behind the Man."

In 1922, at age 20, while carousing in a beer garden, he was spotted by director Michael Curtiz and offered a film role. He accepted and soon he was playing romantic leads on the stage and in German films. His penchant for gaining weight forced him to character roles. In 1930, he won a part on Broadway in an operetta titled "Meet My Sister". He was a matinee idol in German plays and movies in the 1920's and '30's which sparked such Broadway musicals such as "Music in the Air", "May Wine", and "I Married an Angel." In many movies, he had recurrent roles as Nazi soldiers. His

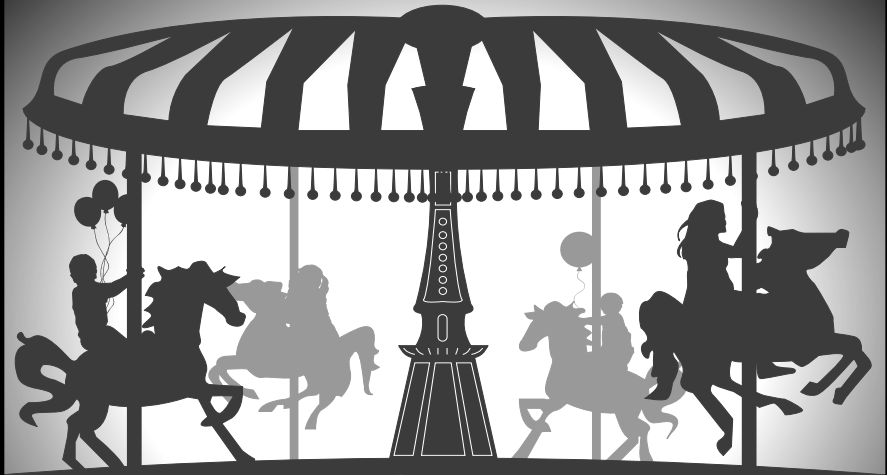

North Shore BOE Trustees Propose Infrastructure Bond Referendum Responsible Planning for Our Community's Future

The North Shore Schools, Glen Head, September 2013, - At the September 12, 2013 North Shore Board of Education meeting, Trustees approved unanimously a \$19.6 million Infrastructure Bond Referendum for the long-term financing of projects related to the health and safety of the students, faculty and staff. The average home owner will see NO INCREASE in their property taxes as a result of the proposed bond since payments of the 2013-14 Infrastructure Bond will be phased in as older bonds are phased out and paid off. Trustee Russo stated, "The bond will help keep the tax levy stable."

In an effort to be proactive and remain fiscally responsible in planning for the future of the North Shore Schools, BOE President Herman Berliner discussed that the funding of required infrastructure work through a bond at historically low interest rates will protect instructional programs and the community since it will result in the sharing of costs among current residents who own property and those moving into the district in the years to come.

Why Bond Now?

Financing through a bond now for infrastructure projects that must be completed within the next 5-10 years due to age, condition, and life expectancy will enable the district to complete this work at today's costs resulting in substantial savings to the community.

With the school district's excellent financial rating, we will be able to borrow money at today's favorable interest rate. Payments of this bond will begin to be phased in as older bonds are phased out and paid off.

A bond will enable the Board to prevent spikes in the capital portion of the year-to-year operating budget by allowing the district to proactively plan and schedule the required projects to avoid costly emergency repairs and disruption to our daily school routine.

What Are The Projects Included in the Proposed Bond Referendum?

The projects included in the Infrastructure Bond Referendum are for the health and safety of our students, faculty and staff. Non-essential projects were

deferred. The projects include the following (for a complete list of the proposed projects, please visit www.northshoreschools.org):

- HVAC (ventilation and air exchange)
- Roof Replacements
- Security Upgrades
- Electrical Repairs
- Window Replacements
- Masonry Work

Trustee Nightingale communicated, "The items in the bond are necessities not niceties that need to be completed whether placed in a bond referendum or not."

Superintendent Melnick further discussed how Trustees arrived at the project list which included utilizing the Annual Visual Inspections required by the NY State Education Department as well as the formulation of a Community-Wide Bond Committee consisting of taxpayers including parents, community residents without children attending the schools, alumni, faculty and administrators. Ultimately, all suggestions and comments were brought to the Board where trustees deferred all non-essential projects to arrive at the \$19.6 million bond.

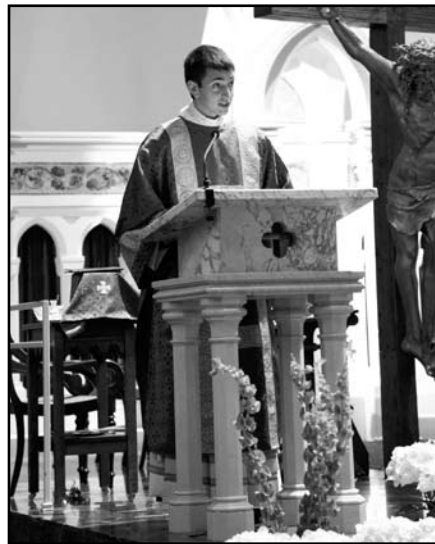
