



Playstation 3 Burglarized by 16 Year Old Caught On Tape

On September 12th an apartment at 135 Glen Cove Ave in Glen Cove was burglarized. The suspects gained entry through a rear window and removed a Playstation 3 game console and games. The burglary was caught on buildings surveillance video. Detective Glennon of the Glen Cove Police obtained the surveillance video from the building as well as surveillance recordings from other buildings in the area. Once Detective Glennon reviewed the video recordings he quickly identified the suspect caught in the surveillance video.

That suspect who is 16 year old was arrested on September 27th and charged with Burglary in the second degree. On September 29th a 14 year old juvenile was also arrested and charged with the burglary. The 16 year old will be arraigned in Criminal Court and the Juvenile will be arraigned in Family Court as a Juvenile. It was apparent after reviewing the surveillance video that one suspect entered the apartment through a rear window while the other suspect stood as a lookout. The proceeds of the burglary were recovered. According to Detective Lieutenant Nagle, "It was the second time this month that surveillance cameras caught a crime in progress." The other case was the arrest last week in which the downtown video cameras caught a 69 year old Glen Cove man trying to lure a 15 year old high school student into his vehicle on School Street.

Arrests In Local Pharmacy Burglaries

The Robbery Squad reports the details of the arrest of three subjects for several pharmacy burglaries that occurred between September 23 and September 30, 2013 in Nassau County.

According to Detectives, on Monday September 30, 2013 at 12:20am a burglary occurred at Locust Valley Chemists, 60 Forest Avenue Locust Valley and a second burglary occurred at 1:10am at Glen Head Pharmacy, 669 Glen Cove Avenue Glen Head. In both incidents the subjects entered the locations by breaking the glass of the front door. Once inside the subjects removed an undetermined amount of pharmaceuticals.

Third Precinct Police Officers responding to the burglary in Glen Head observed defendant Casey Arena, 19, of 5 Cloister Lane Hicksville inside the store.

Defendant Arena attempted to flee the scene on foot but was apprehended. Defendants Steven Rose, 20, of 158 Cottage Boulevard Hicksville and Steven Cross, 21, of 1903 Lenox Avenue East Meadow fled the scene in a white auto operated by Cross. The vehicle was stopped by Old Brookville Police on Chicken Valley Road. As Officers approached the vehicle, defendant Cross in an attempt to flee, drove the vehicle again and almost struck an Old Brookville Police Officer. The vehicle was eventually stopped on Shuswamp Road and Dogwood Lane where both driver and passenger were placed under arrest by Old Brookville Police.

After further investigation, Detectives from the Robbery, 2nd and 3rd Squads were able to connect defendant Casey Arena to three additional burglaries at the following pharmacies:

Harry's Pharmacy 333 S. Broadway Hicksville on September 22, 2013
Duane Reade 1149 Merrick Avenue North Merrick on September 28, 2013
Meadow Drugs 353 Newbridge Road East Meadow on September 28, 2013

Defendant Casey Arena is charged with 5 counts of Burglary 3rd Degree and Criminal Possession of a Controlled Substance 1st and 2nd Degree.

Defendant Steven Rose is charged with 2 counts of Burglary 3rd Degree and Criminal Possession of a Controlled Substance 1st and 2nd Degree.

Defendant Steven Cross is charged with 2 counts of Burglary 3rd Degree, Reckless Endangerment 1st Degree and Criminal Possession of a Controlled Substance 1st and 2nd Degree.

All three defendants will be arraigned on October 1, 2013 in First District Court 99 Main Street Hempstead.

Pumpkin Patch Returns 10th Year Anniversary

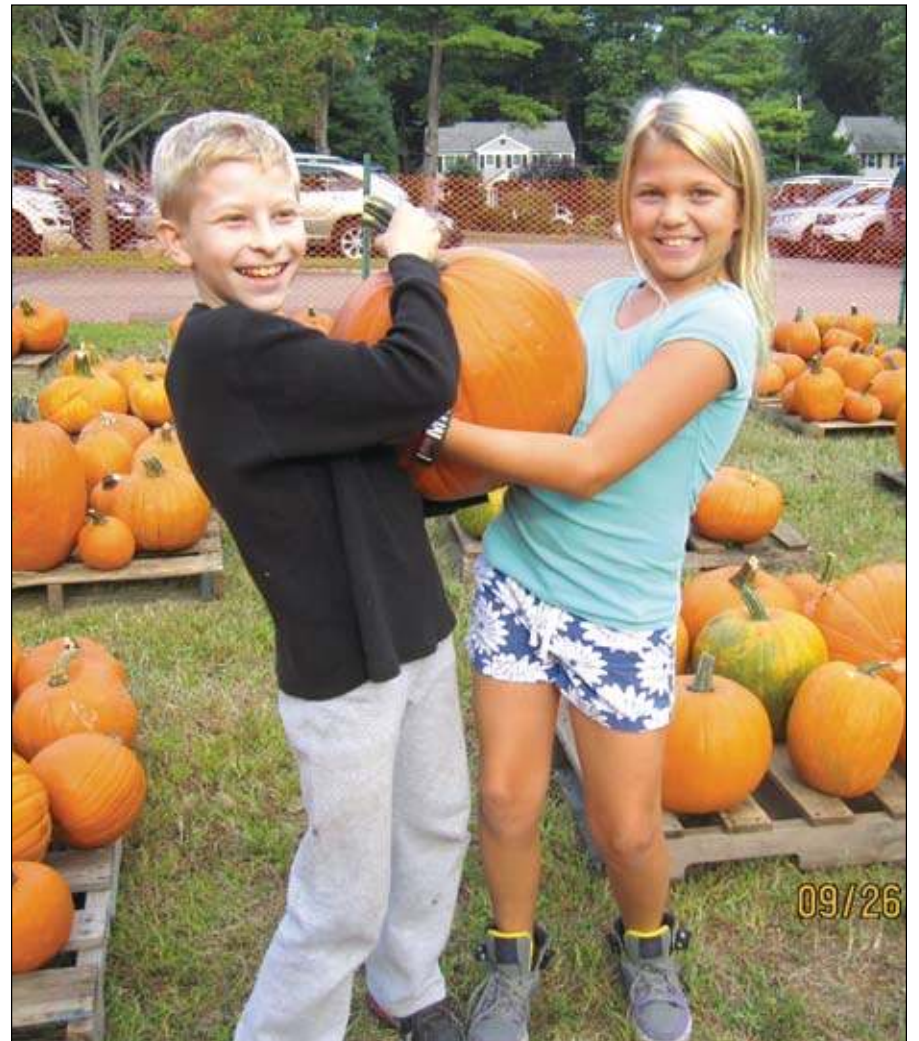

2013 STOP Program Successful to Date

On Saturday, September 21st, the City of Glen Cove conducted the S.T.O.P. (Stop Throwing Out Pollutants) Program, an annual event to collect and dispose of hazardous household waste. The event was again successful drawing over 400 cars. This year's collection included 31 tanks of propane, 34 tires, 13 car batteries, and 36 lithium batteries in addition to 2 fifty-five gallon drums of antifreeze, 250 gallons of motor oil and 215 miscellaneous light bulbs.

Mayor Suozzi said "The growing numbers prove that the S.T.O.P. program

is a very worthwhile program. The residents recognize the potential dangers of improper disposal and I thank all who participated."

Facts, Code, Law & Due Process v. Official Opinion

To The Editor,

On September 17, 2013, the Sea Cliff Zoning Board denied our code- and law-compliant subdivision application by a vote of three to two. ZBA members' "deliberation" consisted of the ZBA chair arguing to persuade the others of her personal opinions—none of them informed or supported by any code or law—while ranging far beyond the ZBA's authority and purview.

As in 2011, the ZBA, again disregarded facts, did not mention or discuss germane code and law and did not observe due process as described in the ZBA mission statement to deny our application.

Excerpt, Sea Cliff ZBA mission statement *

Prior to making its decision, all applications are discussed, meticulously weighing the facts and the law. Decisions of the ZBA are rendered, solely, by precedence and by law. Each and every decision of the ZBA is a legal document and as such must be concise, accurate and cite germane building codes in explicit language as required by state set standards.

The ZBA tries to accommodate the applicant while also trying to preserve open spaces and light and to protect all residents' quality of life.

* In 2011, Mayor Kennedy deleted this ZBA mission statement from the Sea Cliff code and website, after we inquired at Village Board meetings why ZBA members:

a) had not meticulously weighed the facts and the law; b) had not cited germane building codes in explicit language as required by state set standards; c) had not accommodated the applicant, while reviewing our subdivision application in 2010-11.

It would have been much more constructive had Mayor Kennedy made sure to educate ZBA members about their purview and the procedural due process expected of them. As it was, a FOILED request in 2012 revealed that there was no record that any members of the ZBA had ever received the annual training as mandated by NY State since 2007. Two of the ZBA members who have since had training voted to approve our application. The two members who have never had any training both voted to deny it.

"Field of Dreams?"

To The Editor,

Two months ago the vote to sell the property known as Pascucci Soccer Field was tabled. At this time it appears the deal is dead and the proposed buyer has

moved on.

Before closing the file I reviewed Exhibit A of the contract (The Property) which lists all of parcels 1091, 1092 and 1093 and a portion of Parcel 611 which are shown as "Subject Site" on the map which is commonly known as the Soccer Field Property off Glen Street.

In checking with our assessment office I discovered that total assessed value for these lots is \$3.8 million dollars. When the Mayor spoke about the deal he stated that it would have been a great deal because the property was appraised at \$1.7 million and the city would be getting \$ 2 million for the sale of that land.

I mentioned my findings at the next council meeting and was told that the parcels listed on the contract were incorrect. We had come close to approving a contract for the sale of property that had the incorrect lots listed!

My next request was to review the written appraisal. One would assume that this document was an important part of the folder for this transaction. I requested the documents from the city attorney in front of the public and was told they would be sent to me. Two weeks later and after multiple requests I finally get the appraisal but not before the Mayor tells me that an appraisal for the exact subject site dimensions was never done. The appraisal which the city had was for lot 611 and 612 of which only parts of them would be the subject site. Let's review what we have.

A contract of sale which lists incorrect lots.

An appraisal requested by the city which did not specify the exact dimensions of the lots being sold.

The city's assessed value on lots 611 and 612 is \$4.3million.

The appraisal on these lots is \$2.72million.

In my opinion, Mr. Barnaby would like the Village taxpayers to believe that while he has been "Playing By The Rules" the "Village officials via their considerable regulatory and police powers have assumed absolute authority over the use of their property". E-Waste Recycling Program

I encourage everyone to join us this Saturday, October 5th when Glen Cove will hold its second E-Waste (Electronic Waste Recycling) Program this year from 9 AM to 4 PM at the Winters Brothers facility located at the end of Morris Avenue. First introduced in 2011, the E-Waste program addresses the growing nationwide problem of e-waste, such as computers, cell phones, pagers and VCRs. These items not only have a low level of biodegradability, but they contain materials that are highly toxic when released into the environment. This program offers the residents of Glen Cove an opportunity to dispose of these items in an environmentally responsible way. Name the Celebrity



This week's celebrity was born in Michigan City, Indiana. Her maternal grandfather was the famed architect Frank Lloyd Wright and her father was a prominent executive with the Seagram Distillery Company. She was raised in NYC, where she attended Brearley. At age 10, she attended a Broadway play starring Helen Hayes, *The First Lady of Theater*, and was so impressed that she declared to her family that she wanted to become an actress. By the age of 13, she appeared on Broadway. During this period, she learned her acting craft as a student of the famed actress and teacher Maria Ouspenskaya, who played the "Maharani" in *The Rains Came* (1939) with Myrna Loy, among other roles.

At 16, she screen tested for the role of Mrs. DeWinter in *Rebecca* losing to Joan Fontaine because director Alfred Hitchcock deemed her too young for the role. However, she soon secured a seven year contract with 20th Century Fox. Her first movie role was in *20 Mule Team* (1940) with Wallace Beery. She was chosen by director Orson Welles to appear in *The Magnificent Ambersons* (1942). She co-starred with Tyrone Power and Gene Tierney in 1946's *The Razor's Edge*, for which she won the Academy Award for Best Supporting Actress. She later recounted that *The Razor's Edge* contained her only great performance which was a hospital scene where her character, "Sophie", loses her husband, child and everything else. She said she relived the death of her brother who had died at age three. She played "Mike" in the 1948 western film *Yellow Sky* with Gregory Peck and Richard Widmark.

Last Week's Celebrity

Last week's celebrity was Walter Slezak. Although he often portrayed villains or thugs, he occasionally got to play lighter roles, as in *The Wonderful World of the Brothers Grimm* (1962). He also played a cheerfully corrupt and philosophical private detective in the film noir *Born to Kill* (1947) with Claire Trevor and Elisha Cook Jr. and appeared as "Squire Trelawney" in *Treasure Island* (1972) with Orson Welles as "Long John Silver." His first American film was *Once Upon a Honeymoon* (1942) with Ginger Rogers and Cary Grant. He worked steadily and appeared in over 100 films including *The Princess and the Pirate* (1944) with Bob Hope, *The Spanish Main* (1947) with Douglas Fairbanks Jr., *People Will Talk* (1951) again with Cary Grant and *Call Me Madam* (1953) with Ethel Merman. He made numerous TV appearances which included *Studio 90*, *Batman* as the character "King Clock" (1966) and on *This is Show Business*, which entered the TV history books in Sept. 1951, as the first CBS program to have been televised live from the Atlantic to Pacific coasts. In 1955, he won a Tony Award for his role in the Broadway production of *Fanny* with Florence Henderson.

Slezak married Johanna Van Rijn in 1943 and they had 3 children. Their daughter, Erika, went on to become an Emmy-winning actress and starred as "Victoria Lord" on the long running soap opera, *One Life to Live* from 1971 to its cancellation in 2012. Her father appeared on the series as her character's godfather, "Lazlo Braedecker." On April 21, 1983, in his home in Flower Hill, Long Island and shortly before his 81st birthday, Slezak died from a self-inflicted gunshot wound. He was reportedly despondent over his advanced physical illness. As was his father, he was buried in the Bavarian village Rottach-Egern.

neither arbitrary, capricious or irrational. Accordingly, petitioners/plaintiffs' motion (Seq. No. 01), pursuant to Article 78 of the CPLR, for an order annulling the Decision of respondent/defendant Zoning Board of Appeals of the Incorporated Village of Sea Cliff ("Zoning Board"), dated May 23, 2011, which denied petitioners' application to subdivide their property into three residential lots is hereby DENIED".

Mr. Barnaby additionally claims that his applications have been Sea Cliff Village Code and Law compliant. If these applications were code and law compliant, as Mr. Barnaby publically states, then the Sea Cliff ZBA would have no basis to rule for a denial on May 23, 2011 and the Supreme Court Of The State Of New York would have no basis to support the Sea Cliff ZBA decision by also ruling for a denial. Is it possible that both the Sea Cliff ZBA and the Supreme Court Of The State Of New York missed that Doug Barnaby's application was Sea Cliff Code and Law compliant? Or

perhaps there's an individual with some kind of memory fog happening?

An applicant must appear before the Sea Cliff ZBA in order to receive variances if their application doesn't comply with the Sea Cliff Village Codes and Laws. Why then did Mr. Barnaby need to appear before the Sea Cliff ZBA with his applications if they were Sea Cliff Code and Law compliant? Is it possible this points to yet another fogged memory moment and his "modest subdivision proposals" just might not be Code and Law compliant and require several variances?

For me, knowing the actual result of the past Article 78 appeal from the Supreme Court Of The State Of New York (DENIAL), I find it amusing that Mr. Barnaby wants to expose what the costs are to the taxpayers for the Village's opposition to his substandard development applications. It appears to me that if Mr. Barnaby were "Playing By The Rules" it wouldn't cost the taxpayers a dime and he would be well on his way with his

Sears's ability to describe financial intricacies so that the lay reader can understand is astonishing but even more astonishing is his ability to describe of the world of an autistic child - the sub plot of the book. The Kid, as Jason calls his son, and many other characters- ex-wives, barroom buddies, taciturn bodyguards, Swiss bankers, terrified babysitters- are all colorfully described and hugely likeable. A very fast- moving tale, this book is highly recommended!



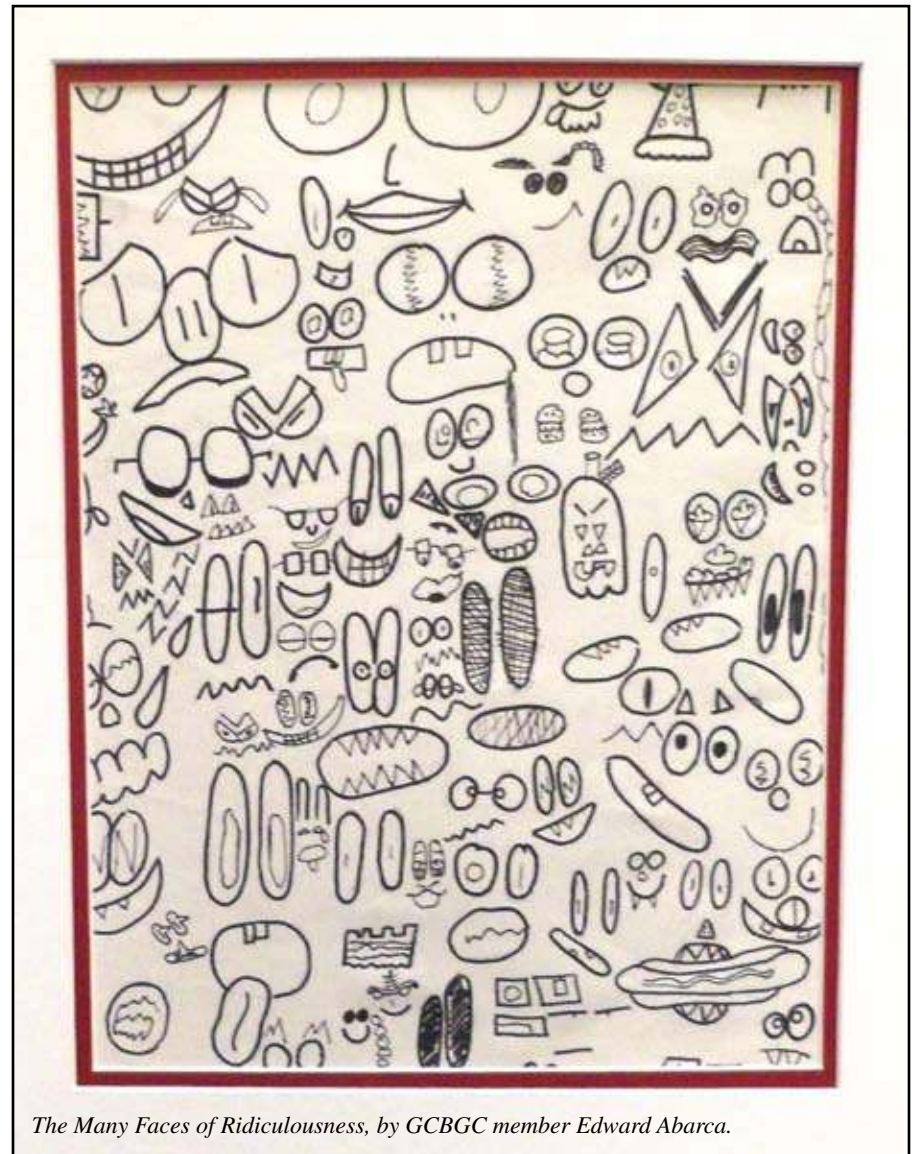
