m For}$ those of us of a certain age, November 22nd comes to us each year pretty much the same way the phrase 9-11 has lately. Each of us knows where we were on the fateful day and what we were doing when we found out what

Fifty years ago in November, Americans were just getting used to the presidency of John Fitzgerald Kennedy. Our young president had been through an eventful first three years, hardened by a near-nuclear confrontation with the Soviet Union over missile placements in Cuba. In matters of race, our nation was coming to grips with an issue still not resolved. John F. Kennedy guided us through these troubled waters with what most of us felt at the time to be a very skillful leadership. In mid-November of 1963, Mr. Kennedy seemed poised to launch a bid for a second term, riding a wave of personal popularity.

To be sure, the Cold War, civil rights, Vietnam and national economy were all challenges that our young chief executive faced moving forward. The mindset in those days in the Kennedy White House was simple: American leadership, smart people and hard work would solve most problems. A recent visit to Berlin in June of 1963 provided JFK with the opportunity to electrify hundreds of thousands of German citizens. Within view of the infamous Berlin Wall, Kennedy reminded the world that... "all free men, wherever they may live, are citizens of Berlin and, therefore, as a free man, I take pride in the words 'Ich bin ein Berliner'." A half million Germans in attendance gave our president their overwhelmingly positive response.

Of course, all of the Kennedy promise came to a tragic halt shortly after noon on Friday, November 22, 1963. In New York, radio station WABC broke into its Top 40 music format to announce that something tragic was unfolding during the presidential motorcade in Dallas. Shortly thereafter, on CBS television, a visibly emotional Walter Cronkite swallowed hard, removed his glasses and told America that its president had died, the victim of an assassination.


Spinello received a total 3,433 votes to Suozzi's 3,359, according to the Nassau County Board of Elections.

Our nation came together for the next several days in a ritual of mourning and reflection— a national wake and funeral for a president that had captivated most Americans with his charisma, energy and youthful promise for the future.

It is fair to say that the Kennedy legacy has been tarnished by sensational and salacious postscripts to the Kennedy life and legend. It is perhaps a mark of the current age that we do not treat our heroes with blind loyalty; that they have

Fifty years ago this week we lost our president-and we are, even now, trying to come to grips with what effect it has had on the days since. Those of us alive that day were emotionally jarred by what was then perceived by each of us as a painful personal loss. It is a loss that haunts us to this moment.

The Journey Home Continues

This is truly a great story. Glen Cove resident Rocco DiLeo was a decorated WWII vet who was captured and sent to a German POW camp on Sept 8, 1943. When captured, he lost his helmet.

Upon the war's end and his release on January 31, 1944 Rocco literally walked through Poland, Russia and Turkey to reach freedom, then arriving back home in Glen Cove in April 1944.

Two years ago his son Michal lo-

cated his helmet, with his name written in it, on line and arranged to have it returned to Rocco's still living (91 years old) wife. 
Sister Theresita visits Portledge to speak about WWII

utes from Utah Beach and the first town to be liberated during WWI, is the sister city to Locust Valley. In this tiny town on the coast of Normandy the French citizenry will hold a pro-American rally, as they do each and every year in June, to give thanks for the bravery of the American troops who freed them, and for the citizens of Locust Valley, who beginning in 1947, helped to rebuild their city. That's right. Through a grassroots effort that supplemented the Marshall Plan, Locust Valley adopted Ste. Mere Eglise and under the banner of "Operation Democracy" gave generously to rebuild the city where so many Allied troops are buried.

The special relationship between these two towns has survived to this day due in large part to the continuing efforts of Operation Democracy, now an educational organization, to pass the lessons of history on to children. Portledge School in Locust Valley supports the educational mission of Operation Democracy and embraces opportunities for cross-cultural exchange as part of its educational philosophy, and so the school was thrilled to welcome Sister Theresita, visiting from France, to Portledge School to attend classes. Sister Theresita is a German nun who resides in the "House of Peace" in Sainte-Mere-Eglise alongside two French nuns (and it is hoped an American will join them) as part of an international trifecta created

in 2012 by the local bishop intended to promote peace. On October 29th and 30th she participated in Upper School French, Music, and History classes at Portledge and was able to share a unique perspective with students. As a German, Sister Theresita was able to relate the story of WWII from the German and French viewpoint, and speak about the challenges of reconciliation in Germany. She also spoke about her dedication to the mission of promoting peace after the terrible suffering in Europe after the war. In an age of terror cells and drone attacks, the visit from Sister Theresita helped Portledge students understand, in a very personal way, why her mission of peace and understanding is so critical.

Sister Theresita is in the US as part of a French delegation currently working with Operation Democracy on a D-Day Theatrical Production which will perform in France as part of the D-Day Commemoration in June. Students from Portledge School and Friends Academy, as well as French and German students their age will perform in the tri-lingual Performance of Peace, written by Laurence Bohec, Drama Teacher at College Saint-Exupery. In addition to a performance in the town center of Sainte-Mere-Eglise on the 6th of June, there will also be performances in a local theater and on Utah Beach itself. Dignitaries from all over the world are expected to be in attendance



Yelena Vladimir and Concert Festival

On October 20, 2013 at 2:00 pm, a packed auditorium of the Jericho Public Library was treated to the inaugural performance of the Concert Festival Orchestra under the direction of Maestro Vladimir Polezhayev.

The concert began with an elegant rendition of Mozart's Eine Kleine Nachtmusik and ended with a rousing performance of Johann Strauss' Tritsch-Tratsch Polka. In between, seven soloists ranging in age from 9-16 showcased their abilities on violin, flute, and voice with the orchestra as Gran Prix Winners of the Concerto Competition 2013. 10 year-old violinist Marco Motroni performed Vivaldi in a forceful and dramatic style. Kyoko Saito, a 10 year-old violinist, born in Tokyo, gave a fluid performance of a Mozart's Concerto#3.

16 year-old flautist Yuri Kim showed good attention to contrasting phrases and dynamics in Mozart's Flute Concerto. Michele Ripka,15, performed a violin concerto by J.S. Bach with strong rhythmic impulse and attention to dynamic contrast. 13 year-old violinist Eunice

Park gave a spirited performance of Mozart's Concerto #4.

Within this sea of talent two performers stood out. 9 year-old violinist Serin Park, performing a Haydn Concerto, had a big warm sound, perfect intonation, and a sophisticated bow technique beyond her age.

Vocalist Gwyneth Campbell sang arias by Handel and Vivaldi. Aside from vocal quality, projection, and musicianship unexpected at age 14, her endurance was stunning, particularly in long legato coloratura passages in the Handel, and the final note of the Vivaldi.

Overall, Concert Festival was ad-

mirably successful in its first orchestral/ Gran Prix concert, both with the ensemble itself and quality of the young winners it chose to feature.

Friends Academy 'Blasts Hunger off LI!' with annual Canstruction

Junior Engineering students create third sculpture from nearly 4,000 community-donated cans

Stacking nearly 4,000 cans of Hunt's Tomato Sauce and Green Giant cans, a team of nine Friends Academy engineering students, completed their third consecutive stand-alone sculpture of a rocket ship, entitled "Blast Hunger off LI!" for the international design competition and community service group CANstruction.

"Enthused by our prior two year's of successful CANstructions, "Take a Bite out of Hunger" and "United, We CAN," the whole community was excited to participate in this year's event again," said CANstruction advisor and Physics teacher Mary Ann Vascotto.

While CANstruction challenges engineers and designers to erect the most out-of-the-box free-standing sculptures, community service is at its core. Since 1992, CANstruction has contributed over 17.5 million pounds of food to community food banks. Following the build, Friends Academy's team will

donate its 4,000 cans, contributed from three-year-olds to 12th graders, to LI Cares and the Harry Chapin Food Bank.

In designing this year's CANstruction, the student team of Aidan Vascotto



(Huntington), Cameron Hellerman (Great Neck), Perry Gordon (Sands Point), Jack Statfeld (Melville), Tim Ingrassia (Lattingtown), Ian D'Silva (Dix Hills), Alex Storch (Woodbury), Jack Viener (Upper Brookville) and Nate Hogg (Laurel Hollow), considered nutrition implications, as well as design. "While color, shape and design were paramount in choosing which cans to use, we all wanted to be sure we were selecting healthy food for our sculpture," said advisor Vascotto. "In

addition, we faced many design challenges as we adjusted the placement of the different sizes of cans to ensure stability," she added.

Students pre-built their sculpture in advance of the competition to test it and then spent 5 hours on Wednesday, Oct. 23rd at RXR Plaza duplicating their efforts. Friends Academy caught the eye of CANstruction judges as they were given the award for Juror's Favorite.

Friends Academy is now accepting applications for the 2014-15 school year and will hold a Lower School Open House on Monday, December 9 at 8:30 a.m. Call (516) 676-0393 for more information and to schedule a tour of the campus. Enrolling 779 students from age 3 through Grade 12, Friends Academy is guided by its Quaker heritage and the principles of integrity, simplicity, patience, moderation and a peaceful resolution of conflict.





Name the Celebrity



This week's celebrity was born on the Ides of March, March 15,1907, in Wheaton, Illinois. This corpulent, booming-voiced actor's name may not be on the tip of your tongue but you will say, "I know that guy!" He has been in films and TV from 1941 until 1962. He was often cast as the obstreperous villain and was given sizeable roles, in every sense of the word, in such "B" movies as "Sky Dragon" (1949), Monogram Production's final entry in the "Charlie Chan" series, "The Narrow Margin" (1952), and "Father Steps Out" (1941) with Frank Faylen (Regis Philbin's first father-in-law), which was a remake of Monogram's 1934 "City Limits" . After appearing as the composer, Victor Herbert, in MGM's Jerome Kern biopic "Till Clouds Roll By" (1946) with Robert Walker Sr. as Kern, he was kept on MGM's on-call list for quick walk-ons in quite a few uncredited roles in such movies as "Showdown at Boot Hill" (1958) with a presuperstardom Charles Bronson and "All the King's Men" (1950) with Broderick Crawford.

Last Week's Celebrity

Last week's celebrity was Wally Cox. Widely remembered as "Mr. Peepers" and a regular of the original "Hollywood Squares" with Square-Master, Peter Marshall, Wally was also the original voice of the TV animation cartoon of "Underdog". During the 1960's and '70's, Cox became frustrated by being typecast as a prim, bookish, "Casper milk-toast" character and protested in vain to reporters and interviewers that he was nothing like "Peepers". He was physically quite strong, hiked, and rode a motorcycle and was a master electrician. In fact, Peter Marshall in his memoir, "Back Stage With the Original Hollywood Squares", he wrote that Cox installed and maintained all the wiring in his own home. A rare glimpse of Cox's athletic build can be seen in the original CBS pilot of "Mission Impossible", when he works as a safecracker in a tight, sleeveless t-shirt. On Feb. 15, 1973, he died of a coronary occlusion. A report indicated his ashes were put with those of his very close, good friend, Marlon Brando, when he died years after Cox. Former roommates as young performers, Brando had encouraged Cox to take acting lessons with Stellar Adler. Together, their ashes were scattered in Death Valley and Tahiti.



7th Graders at NS Middle School Learn about the Physics of Flight! **How Do Planes Fly?**



On November 4th, seventh graders got a special treat when guest speaker Captain Wile, a pilot with Southwest Airlines (and a father in the community) visited North Shore Middle School to teach about the Physics of Flight!

As part of the Forces unit in science, the students eagerly listened to Captain Wile as he explained how airplanes fly by utilizing the Four Forces of Flight including lift, gravity, thrust, and drag. Captain Wile discussed Bernoulli's Principle and Newton's Law in relation to flying Boeing 737 airplanes.

Bernoulli's principle helps explain that an aircraft can achieve lift because of the shape of its wings. They are shaped so that that air flows faster over the top of the wing and slower underneath. Fast moving air equals low air pressure while slow moving air equals high air pressure. The high air pressure underneath the wings will therefore push the aircraft up through the lower air pressure. Captain Wile demonstrated this principle utilizing a hairdryer and a ping pong ball. The thrust of air from the hairdryer enables the ping pong ball to float or lift through

the air! He also experimented with a piece of paper involving the students. Everyone put a piece of paper to their lips and blew causing the paper to lift rather than go down!


In addition, Captain Wile discussed Newton's Law by summarizing, "For every action there is a reaction." In the case of flight, Captain Wile said, "The action is the movement of the airplane as it is thrust through the air. The reaction is when the plane is lifted or propelled up during takeoff." He said, "Most Boeing 747's go 140-160 miles per hour during takeoff which is referred to as Weight on the Wings." The four forces react with one another asthrust overcomes drag as the plane speeds down the runway creating lift during takeoff, overcoming the pull of the earth's gravity.

Many thanks to Captain Wile for providing such an educational learning experience for our seventh graders at North Shore Middle School. His presentation included many demonstrations and examples which engaged the seventh graders in an exciting lesson on the Physics of Flight.



Glen Cove Students Named All-State and All-National in Music



The Glen Cove High School Music Department is proud to announce that eight students have been selected to participate as All-State musicians in the 78th Annual New York State School Music Association Winter Conference in Rochester, N.Y., on Dec. 5-8. Additionally, one student has been named to the All-National Choir, the first student at Glen Cove High School to achieve this honor.

Claudia Kolanovic has been selected to perform in the American Choral Directors Association All-National Choir. The ACDA Conference, which will be held in Baltimore on Feb. 5-8, brings together the most talented choral students in the country to perform before the nation's most esteemed choral educators, professionals and adjudicators.
