The Glen Cove Public Library will present its Annual Budget to the citizens of Glen Cove for a vote on Tuesday, March 31st, 2015 in the Library's Community Room. Polls will be open from 9am to 9pm.

Also, on March 31st, the public will be asked to vote for one member of the five-member Library Board of Trustees for a five-year term and one member for a one-year term to fill a vacant, unexpired term. A hearing on the Library Budget and a chance to meet the Trustee candidates will be held in the Community Room on Tuesday, March 17th at 7pm. All are encouraged to attend.

During the past year, the Library purchased Kindle e-readers for teens, and twelve new public use computers. Moving forward with our dedicated effort to help improve literacy in our community, we have trained twenty volunteers for one-on-one assistance with adult literacy in English and Spanish. Additionally, over 100 patrons have taken advantage of our Introduction to Computer classes. We have supplemented our Voices of Glen Cove collection with seven new presentations from former Glen Cove Mayors and other influential residents. During the summer months, with the help of AHRC, the Library was able to provide a healthy-lunch-storytime for many of the children in our community.

We greatly appreciate those who have supported the Library in the past and will need the continued support of our community to continue providing new and exciting resources and events in the future.

A Bit of Spain in Glen Cove

A little bit of Spain is coming to the Glen Cove Senior Center on Friday, March 6 at 12 p.m. Spencer Gee, our multitalented Tai Chi teacher will pair with internationally renowned Flamenco dancer and teacher Juana Cala' to perform a fantastic program of Classical Flamenco dances.

Spencer, a master martial arts instructor, teaches Tai Chi Chuan at the senior center twice a week. He not only teaches traditional Tai Chi form like Step up to Seven Stars and Ride the Tiger, but also includes weight training and aerobics to help seniors strengthen muscles and improve memory, endurance and balance. In 1981 he represented the USA in the first Wushu tour to the People's Republic of China. Spencer owns a Tai Chi and Martial Arts Studio in East Hills and teaches Tai Chi at Hofstra University. In addition to his martial arts expertise, Spencer is an award-winning amateur ballroom dancer. He has conducted workshops at the Eglevsky Ballet Camp, Manhattan Theatre Works, the Great Neck School of Dance, the North Shore School of Dance and Two Worlds Dance and Fitness Center. He has performed key roles in the Viennese Waltz, Chinese Dance and the Party Scene in Danny Holstein's production of the Nutcracker Ballet at SUNY Westbury. He received first place in several dance styles at the 2005 Empire State Dance Sport Championship and at the Tri-State Challenge in Connecticut. In 2009 he received The Bronze International and American Cha Cha and Rhumba Exam with Honors from the US Imperial Society of Teachers of Dance. He has

been studying Classical Flamenco Dance for the past few years. Spencer sees a strong correlation between Tai Chi and dancing. Both involve choreographed graceful and rhythmic moves with each discipline refining the skill and form of the other.

Spencer will be performing with his Flamenco teacher Juana Cala'. Juana received most of her training in Andalusia, Spain and is considered among today's most outstanding Flamenco artists. She studied with some of the greatest masters, including "El Farruco," Mario Maya, Manolete, and Antonio Canales. She has been refining her style under the tutelage of Eva LaYerbabuena, Isabel Bayon, Juana Amaya, Isabel Galvan, etc.

She was a soloist with the American Spanish Dance Theatre directed and choreographed by Luis Montero and Maria Benitez Ballet Flamenco directed by Mario Maya and Maria Benitez. Juana has performed at the Kennedy Center in Washington D.C., the San Francisco Opera House, the Joyce Theater in NYC, the Kimo Theatre in Albuquerque, New Mexico and Miami's Gussman Theater. She has performed throughout Europe, including such venues as the Court Theatre at the Royal Palace of Napoli, the Santa Margherita Theatre of Genova, the Verdi Theatre in Florence, Milan's National Theatre and the National Theatre in Rome. She was the principal dancer with the Triana Flamenco Company and was co-founder/dancer/choreographer with La Moreira. She has danced with the Metropolitan Opera in NYC and the Austin Opera House. She was the choreographer and principal dancer in "Carmen," directed by Stefano Monti and performed at the Teatro Pergolese in Italy. She has conducted numerous workshops and has been a visiting professor at several universities. In 2000 she founded the Ensemble Flamenco Juana Cala', a dance troupe including fifteen international artists of Flamenco.

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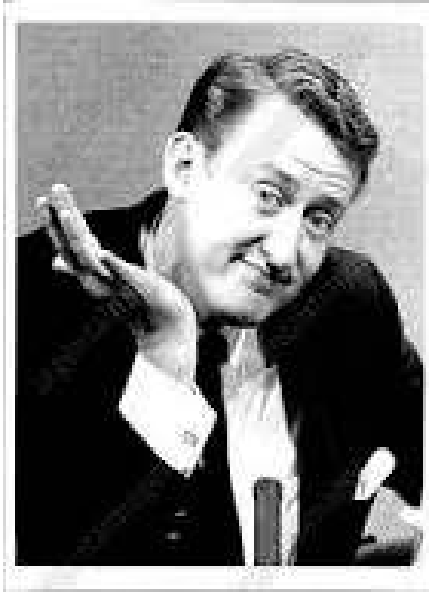
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Name the Celebrity



Meisner, Stella Adler and Lee Strasberg are generally regarded as America's three greatest acting teachers. Our celebrity made his debut in 1947 in Jose Ferrer's production of "Cyrano de Bergerac." He had the makings of a serious dramatic actor, also appearing in such classic plays as "The Barretts of Wimpole Street" and "King Lear." Despite trying his hand on the big screen in such roles as the detective in the 1953 film noir "The City That Never Sleeps" with Edward Arnold, Gig Young and Chill Wills, and as "Trinculo" in the 1960 TV movie, "The Tempest" with Richard Burton and Lee Remick, our celebrity would find that comedy would be his forte. Hosting the amusing daily TV show "Entertainment" led to his biggest break in Steve Allen's TV variety series "The Steve Allen Plymouth Show" (1956). He, Louis Nye, Don Knotts and other members of Allen's stock company became famous for their hilarious characters in Allen's famed sketch sequences. Our celebrity would be best remembered as "The Man on the Street" interviewee, who could never remember his own name. Winning an Emmy during those four seasons with the Allen Show (1956-60), he went on to host another program called "Split Personality" produced by Mark Goodman and Bill Todman with Johnny Olson, as the announcer.

This week's celebrity was a veteran comedic actor who was born on Oct. 17, 1921 in Columbus, Ohio. Along with the bugged-out eyes that commonly accentuated a vague look of bewilderment, he toned his acrobatic skills while appearing with the Flying Zebleys Groupe when he was only nine years old. He was attending Bethany College in West Virginia when WWII broke out and he joined the U.S. Army Air Corps.

He served as a pilot and his aircraft dropped paratroopers for the Normandy Invasion. He won medals for his courage under fire and rose to the rank of captain. While he never returned to Bethany College, he would later receive an honorary doctorate from the institution. Following military duty, he went to NYC and studied at the American Academy of Dramatic Art, training with acting guru and founding member of the Group Theatre (1931-41),

Sanford Meisner, among others.

Last Week's Celebrity

Born as Nusyn Glass, in Poland, to a Jewish family, last week's celebrity was known professionally as Ned Glass. He began showing up on TV in 1952 when he was cast on an episode of "The Red Skelton Show." He later was frequently seen on CBS in Jackie Gleason's "The Honeymooners" sketches. Other TV shows that he made appearances on were "Gunsmoke", "The Phil Silvers Show",

"The People's Choice", "Guestward, Ho!", "Glynis" and "The Rebel". He popped up in the 1967 "Monkees" as a fight promoter and as a convicted forger in "Get Smart".

In 1969, he was nominated for an Emmy Award for his performance in "A Little Chicken Soup Never Hurt Anybody" on the TV show "Julia" starring Diahann Carroll and Lloyd Nolan. Highlights of his film career includes playing "Doc" in "West Side Story", in Blake Edwards' thriller "Experiment in Terror" (1962) and the bad guy "Leopold W. Gideon" in Stanley Donen's "Charade" (1963) with

Cary Grant and Audrey Hepburn. He was notable in "Kid Galahad" (1962) with Elvis Presley, Billy Wilder's "The Fortune Cookie" (1966), Disney's "The Love Bug" (1961), in "Save the Tiger" (1973) with Jack Lemmon and as the railroad ticket agent in Hitchcock's "North by Northwest" (1959) with Cary Grant. His final TV appearance was as a pick pocket on "Cagney & Lacey" (1982). On June 15, 1984, at the age of 78, he passed away after a long illness.

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Glen Cove IAC Learns about the Services that are Available from The Safe Center LI

The Glen Cove IAC recently held its monthly meeting at the offices of the Glen Cove Chamber of Commerce. The guest speaker was Jean Domingo-Keogh, Education Coordinator at The Safe Center LI. Ms. Domingo-Keogh spoke about the many programs offered by The Safe Center LI to educate the public about rape, sexual violence and human trafficking and the services that The Center offers to victims of these crimes.

The Safe Center, located in Bethpage, came about as a result of the merger of the Nassau County Coalition Against Domestic Violence and the Coalition Against Child Abuse and Neglect. The Center provides educational programs on rape, sexual violence and human trafficking and provides emergency services to victims of these crimes. The Center runs a bilingual hotline 24/7 and has emergency room responders who will meet with victims at local hospitals and advocate for them. The Safe Center works closely with Nassau County Detectives and the District Attorney's office in assisting individuals who are victims of child abuse and rape/sexual assault. The Safe Center also offers pro-bono legal assistance for victims of domestic violence and operates Nassau County's only safe home for victims of domestic violence. It is open to mothers and children. All services are free and confidential. Victims are not asked about insurance or documentation status.

The IAC monthly meeting was hosted by the Glen Cove Chamber of Commerce.

Phyllis Gorham, Executive Director of the Chamber told IAC members that the purpose of the Glen Cove Chamber of Commerce is to enhance the health and profitability of its member businesses. It promotes businesses that are located in Glen Cove, as well as businesses that want to service Glen Cove or its

residents. The Chamber has almost 250 members and meets monthly to promote networking among member businesses.

The Glen Cove IAC includes community leaders representing a variety of human and social service agencies throughout Glen Cove. It reflects Glen Cove's rich cultural, religious and ethnic

diversity and meets regularly to identify and address changing needs in the community. This network has resulted in numerous projects and collaborations that benefit Glen Cove residents on a daily basis. For more information about IAC, please visit iacglencove.org.

Maple Sugaring at Deasy

Deasy School kindergarteners and first-graders learned about maple syrup and where it comes from when they participated in the Science Museum of Long Island's Maple Sugaring program at their school.

After the discussion, the students traveled outside to the school's maple tree and had an opportunity to tap the tree to see if any maple syrup would flow, which unfortunately it didn't because it was too cold.

Following the outside activity, students participated in a taste test partaking in three different types of syrup. The children noted differences in color, smell and consistency. According to Kindergarten teacher Nicole Crumlich, the program reinforced the students' full-year study of trees and how they grow and change.

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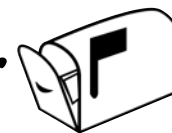
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Letters to the Editor



On The YMCA To The Editor,

Yes, I am "one of the thirteen." One of the thirteen members of the Board of Managers of the Glen Cove YMCA who were "fired" from our volunteer job for standing up for what we believe in.

I was voted on to the Board seven years ago, a somewhat junior member as compared to others who volunteered for over twenty years. I'd like to share my background at the Y to demonstrate my commitment, not only in helping to direct the future growth of the organization, but in participating to promote the health and fitness of its members.

I joined the Y seventeen years ago and, after enjoying the atmosphere and camaraderie, I became certified to teach fitness classes there. A couple of years later, I was asked to join the Board, but since it was a conflict of interest, I continued as an instructor without monetary compensation for quite some time. As a physician, I also volunteered for years at the annual Women's Wellness Fair.

On January 15th, Board members received a letter from the Chairman of the YMCA of Long Island which opened with, "Thank you for your service to the YMCA," and stated that it was "imperative" that we sign their petition. The penultimate sentence was, "It is important for you to get your responses in no later than Wednesday, January 21st." In other words, sign the petition or be fired.

So why would I subject myself to a public dismissal in my home town??? Because I want to "keep the Glen Cove" in the Glen Cove YMCA.

This majority of the 20-member Board refused to cave in to the ultimatum, even after the urging of a fellow Board member to "just sign the petition" to save our jobs. Instead, we responded with a letter reiterating our concerns regarding administrative and financial decisions as of late, as well as the recent disregard for duties previously performed by Board members. In fact, in at least three Board meetings, we were admonished and

repetitively told we were "only advisory" by members of the Long Island YMCA (though under past administrations our opinions and volunteer efforts were valued and respected.)

In our termination letter, they actually suggested that they only want people who will do what they want - that the Board would be "reconstituted immediately" with people "who are aligned with that of the mission of the Y."

Glen Cove is a unique City, and I felt I had a responsibility to members of the Glen Cove Y (who also hail from neighboring towns,) as well as to former paid and voluntary local employees who were subject to decisions made by administrators who are not from, or well-versed in, our community. Let's KEEP THE GLEN COVE IN THE GLEN COVE Y.

LOCAL LAW 03-2015 of the Glen Cove City Charter, adding Chapter 1, General Provisions, Article V, §1-17, Defense and Indemnity of Officers and Employees

Add:

Chapter 1, General Provisions, Article V, §1-17, Defense and Indemnity of Officers and Employees

§1-17 Definition

As used in this chapter, unless the context requires, the following terms shall have the meanings indicated:

EMPLOYEE

Any person holding a position by election, appointment or employment in the service of the City, whether or not compensated, or volunteer expressly authorized to participate in a City-sponsored volunteer program, but shall not include independent contractor. The term "employee" shall include members of all Boards and Commissions of the City. The term "employee" shall also include a former employee, his estate or judicially appointed personal representative.

§ 1-18 City to provide defense.

Upon compliance by the employee with the provisions of §1-20 of this chapter, the City shall provide for the defense of the employee in any civil action or proceeding in any state or federal court arising out of any alleged act or omission which occurred or is alleged in the complaint to have occurred while the employee was exercising or performing, or, in good faith purporting to exercise or perform his powers and duties within the scope of his public employment, including but not limited to any action which is brought to enforce a provision of Section 1981 or 1983 of Title 42 of the United States Code. This duty to provide for defense shall not arise where such civil action or proceeding is brought by or on behalf of the City.

§1-19 Representation by City Attorney.

Subject to the conditions set forth in §1-18 of this Chapter, the employee shall be entitled to be represented by the City Attorney; provided, however, that the employee shall be entitled to representation by private counsel of his choice in any civil judicial proceeding whenever the City Council determines, based upon the recommendation of the City Attorney pursuant to his investigation and review of the facts and circumstances of the case that representation by the City Attorney would be inappropriate, or whenever a court of competent jurisdiction, upon appropriate motion or by a special proceeding, determines that a conflict of interest exists and that the employee is entitled to be represented by private counsel of his choice. The City Attorney shall notify the employee, in writing, of such determination that employee is entitled to be represented by private counsel. The City Council, upon recommendation of the City Attorney, may require as a condition to

payment of the fees and expenses of such representation, that appropriate groups of such employees be represented by the same counsel. If the City Council determines that the employee or group of employees is entitled to representation by private counsel under provisions of this chapter, the City Clerk shall so certify to the Comptroller. Reasonable attorneys' fees and litigation expenses shall be paid by the City to such private counsel from time to time during the pendency of the civil action or proceeding, subject to certification that the employee is entitled to representation under the terms and conditions of this chapter by the head of the department, commission, division, office or agency in which such employee is employed, upon approval of the City Attorney upon audit of the Comptroller. Any dispute with respect to representation of multiple employees by a single counsel or the amount of litigation expenses or the reasonableness of attorney's fees shall be resolved by the court upon motion or by way of a special proceeding.

§1-20 Determination of entitlement to defense.

Where the employee delivers process and a request for a defense to the City Attorney, as required by §1-24 of this chapter, the City Attorney shall take the necessary steps, including, if appropriate, the temporary retention of private counsel on behalf of the employee, to avoid entry of a default judgment pending resolution by the City Council of any question pertaining to the obligation of the City to provide for a defense of the employee. The City Attorney shall then undertake an inquiry and review of the facts and circumstances of the case and forward his findings and recommendations to the City Council. The City Attorney shall forward therewith estimates as to what the costs would be if defense of the case were undertaken by the retention of private counsel. The City Council shall then determine whether the employee is entitled to defense by the City pursuant to §1-18 of this chapter. If the City Council determines that defense of the case by retention of private counsel is appropriate, then said determination shall include, but not be limited to, an estimate of the costs of such retention and defense. The City Council may, from time to time, upon recommendation of the City Attorney, review and reassess determinations made under this section based on additional evidence or later developments in the case.

§1-21 Indemnification procedures.

The City shall indemnify and save harmless its employees in the amount of any judgment obtained against such employees in any state or federal court, or in the amount of any settlement of a claim, provided that the act or omission from which such judgment or settlement arose, occurred while the employee was exercising or performing, or in good faith purporting to exercise or perform his powers and duties within the scope of his public employment; the duty to indemnify and save harmless prescribed by this section shall not arise where the injury or damage resulted from ultra virus acts or recklessness on the part of the employee.

§1-22 Private counsel; proposed settlements.

An employee represented by private counsel shall cause to be submitted to

PUBLIC NOTICE

the head of the department, commission, division, office or agency in which he is employed, any proposed settlement which may be subject to indemnification by the City and, if not inconsistent with provisions of this chapter, such head of the department, commission, division, office or agency in which he is employed shall certify such proposed settlement and submit such proposed settlement and certification to the City Attorney. The City Attorney shall review such proposed settlement as to form and amount, and shall give his recommendation of approval to the City Council, if in his judgment, the settlement is in the best interest of the City. The City Council shall review such proposed settlement, together with the certification aforesaid and the recommendation of the City Attorney and shall approve such proposed settlement if it determines it to be in the best interest of the City. Nothing in this section shall be construed to authorize the City to indemnify or save harmless any employee with respect to a settlement not so reviewed and approved by the City Attorney and approved by the City Council.

§1-23 Actions upon judgment or settlement.

Upon entry of a final judgment against the employee or upon the settlement of the claim, the employee shall cause to be served a copy of such judgment or settlement, personally or by certified or registered mail within 30 days of the date of entry or settlement, upon the head of the department, commission, division, office or agency in which he is employed; and if not inconsistent with the provisions of this chapter, such judgment or settlement shall be certified for payment by such head of the department commission, division office or agency. If the City Attorney concurs in such certification, the judgment or settlement shall be paid upon the audit by the Comptroller.

§1-24 Conditions for defense or indemnification.

The duty to defend or indemnify and save harmless prescribed by this chapter shall be conditioned upon delivery to the City Attorney by the employee of the original or a copy of any summons, complaint, process, notice, demand or pleading with 10 days after he is served with such document, and the full cooperation of the employee in the defense of such action or proceeding and in defense of any action or proceeding against the City, based upon the same act or omission, and in the prosecution of any appeal. Such delivery shall be deemed a request by the employee that the City provide for his defense pursuant to this chapter.

§1-25 Applicability; construal of provisions; effect on statute.

A. The benefits of this chapter shall inure only to employees as defined herein and shall not enlarge or diminish the rights of any other party nor shall any provision of this chapter be construed to affect, alter or repeal any provision of the Workers' Compensation Law.

B. This chapter shall not in any way affect the obligation of any claimant to give notice to the City under §50-e of the General Municipal Law or any other provision of law.

C. The provisions of this chapter shall not be construed to impair, alter, limit or

modify the rights and obligations of any insurer under any policy of insurance.

D. The provisions of this chapter shall apply to all actions and proceedings pending upon the effective date thereof or thereafter instituted.

E. Except as otherwise specifically provided in this chapter, the provisions of this chapter shall not be construed in any way to impair, alter, limit, modify, abrogate or restrict any immunity available to or conferred upon any unit, entity, officer or employee of the City or any other level of government or any right to defense and/or indemnification provided for any governmental officer or employee, by, in accordance with, or by reason of, any other provisions of City, state, county or federal statutory or common law.

§1-26 Severability. If any provisions of this chapter or the application thereof to any person or circumstance be held unconstitutional or invalid, in whole or in part, of any court of competent jurisdiction, such holding of unconstitutionality or invalidity shall in no way affect or impair any other provision of this chapter or the application of any such provision to any other person or circumstance.

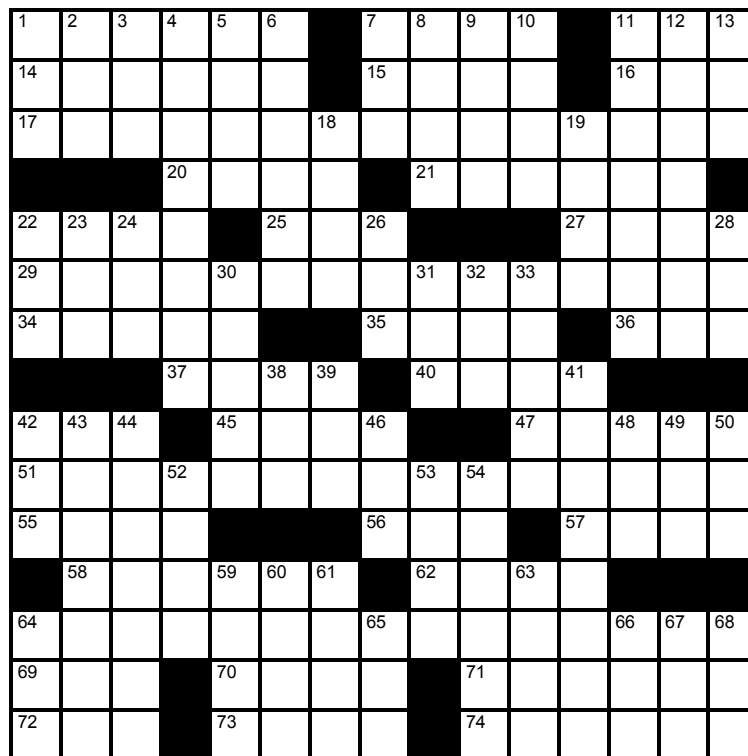
