Glen Cove Ave. Gun Arrest

On Monday June 22nd at 9:20 PM Glen Cove Detective's Brian Glennon and Eddy Linares observed a suspicious individual on the side of the apartment building at 135 Glen Cove Ave in Glen Cove on June 22 at around 9:20pm.

According to Det. Lt. John Nagle, When the detective's attempted to speak to the individual he allegedly ran to the back of the building and threw a 32 caliber revolver onto the ground. The man, identified as 38 year old Daniel Hall of Locust Valley was arrested at the scene. At the time of his arrest the defendant had marijuana and cocaine in his pockets.

The defendant was charged with Criminal possession of a Weapon in the third degree, Criminal Possession of a Firearm, Criminal Possession of a Weapon 4th degree, Criminal Possession of a Controlled Substance 7th degree, and Criminal Possession of Marijuana. The defendant was arraigned on June 23rd in District Court in Hempstead, and is being held on \$50,000 bail.

Detective Lieutenant Nagle said, "As a result of excellent police work, we were fortunate to get an illegal handgun off the streets. One less illegal gun out in our community is a win for the police department as well as the community at large."

Glen Cove's July 4th All-American Weekend Celebration

Downtown Sounds, Kid's Bike Parade, Northwinds Concert, Fireworks and Morgan Park Music!

June 18, 2015... The City of Glen Cove announces its annual July 4th festivities that will feature great music, fireworks and a children's bike parade. "July 4th in Glen Cove is one of my favorite hometown holidays as it offers something for everyone one in our City," said Mayor Reggie Spinello. "We've got fireworks, a classic child's bike parade, and music downtown and in the park along with beach, picnic and playground fun at Morgan Memorial Park."

Sponsored by Panera Bread and coordinated by the Glen Cove Youth Bureau, the annual July 4th Children's Bike Parade is a highly anticipated tradition for kids of all ages. Bikes, scooters, wagons, strollers and battery-powered vehicles roll down the streets at 10 a.m. from Finley Middle School as children have a great time riding through downtown Glen Cove to the Village Square with their spirited energy and patriotism in full view. Children are asked to arrive at the Finley Middle School at 9:30 a.m. to decorate their bikes/wagons etc. and the rain date is July 5.

New to this year's parade is a bike decorating contest and a chance for kids to hand print paint a unique American Flag that will be displayed at Glen Cove's City Hall. For the bike contest, winners in three categories (Most Patriotic, Most Original and Most Colorful) will be recognized with special prizes and recognition by Mayor Spinello. There will also be free refreshments, giveaways and a Patriotic singalong.

From downtown Glen Cove, the fun moves to Morgan's Memorial Park for a

7:30 p.m. concert featuring the Northwinds Symphonic Band and 9:15 p.m. Fireworks display. Under the musical direction of Helen Bauer with support from associate conductor Bradley Hartman, Northwinds Symphonic Band is committed to the performance of standard concert band repertoire including marches, Broadway and movie favorites, transcriptions, the 20th Century classics and new releases. The band is a diverse group of musicians of all ages (ages 13-83), occupations and experiences and will play a variety of America's Patriotic favorites.

The 2015 sky show will be curated by Fireworks by Grucci. Residents are encouraged to send their best Fireworks and bike parade photographs to the Mayor's office for potential use on the City's website and within marketing materials. Photographs can be emailed to July4@cityofglencoveny.org. In case of rain, the concert will be held indoors at St. Patrick's Church Parish Hall on July 4th and the Fireworks will be rescheduled for Sunday, July 5 at 9:15 p.m.

Residents are reminded that bags and backpacks are subject to search for contraband including alcohol and fireworks. Parking restrictions will be in effect in the Landing neighborhood on July 4. Starting at 9 a.m. on July 4, there will be no parking on Germaine Street, Landing Road or McLoughlin Street west of Carpenter Street. Parking for individuals with Handicap Parking Permits will be available in the Morgan Park parking lot.

North Shore Kiwanis Welcomes Kamp Visitors To The Dais

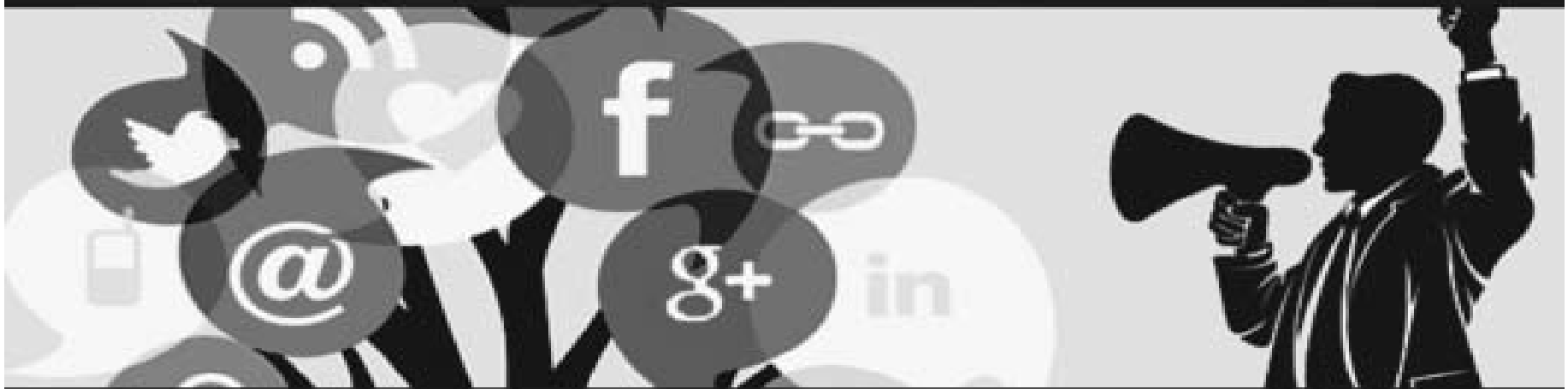

Name the Celebrity



The character was the first animated series produced specifically for television. The concept was test marketed in 1948 and that first episode was aired on KNBH now KNBC in Los Angeles on Aug. 1, 1950. The concept of an animated series made for TV came from animator Alex Anderson, who worked for Terrytoons Studios. Terrytoons, which produced cartoons for theatrical release from 1917-71 and made popular the crows, "Heckle and Jeckle" and "Mighty Mouse", turned down Anderson proposed series. They preferred to remain in theatrical film animation. Consequently, Anderson approached Jay Ward to create a partnership and they formed "Television Arts Productions" in 1947. Our celebrity was syndicated from 1950 to 1951, totaling 195 episodes. Each program began with a little sequence of a mounted knight galloping across the screen. The episodes then featured a short, usually satirical adventure in the form of a movie serial, ending with a cliffhanger.

Last Week's Celebrity

Last week's celebrity was William Conrad. As an actor in feature films, Conrad was often cast as a threatening

figure. In 1961, Conrad moved to the production side of the film business, producing and directing for Warner Bros. film studio. His notable film was "Brainstorm" (1965), a latter-day film noir that has come to be regarded as "a minor masterpiece of the 1960s" and "the final, essential entry in that long line of film noir that began at the end of WWII".

As a token of appreciation from Jack L. Warner, Conrad received one of the two original lead-metal falcon statues used in the classic film, "The Maltese Falcon" (1941). The falcon sat on a bookshelf in Conrad's house from the 1960s. Standing 11.5 in. high and weighing 45 lbs., the figurine had been slashed during the making of the film by Sydney Greenstreet's character "Kasper Gutmen", leaving deep cuts in its bronze patina. After Conrad's death from congestive heart failure, at age 73, on Feb. 11, 1994, his widow consigned the statue with Christie's Auction Gallery. They estimated the bird would bring in between \$30K and \$50K at the auction in Dec. 1994. It sold for \$398,500. In 1996, the purchaser, Ronald Winston, of Harry Winston, Inc. (jewelers), resold the prop to an unknown European collector for as much as \$1 million.

As "Bill Conrad", he narrated the animated "Rocky and Bullwinkle" series from 1959 to 1964. He starred in several TV series but is probably best remembered in "Nero Wolfe" (1981) and "Jake and the Fatman" (1987-92) with Joe Penny. He was posthumously elected to the National Radio Hall of Fame in 1997.

The brain child of Petrice Kaider, these concerts are such fun for everyone from our youngest to our oldest residents. I like to get there early, find a shady spot, and read for an hour or so before the music begins. Do you have a good book to recommend? Sunset Serenade Supporter

Dear Sunset Serenade Supporter,
 I too love those concerts and I am going to recommend a book I read a few months ago: THE ORPHAN TRAIN by Christina Baker Kline. Kline writes about an almost forgotten piece of American history: from 1853 until 1929, over 250,000 orphaned, abandoned or homeless children were placed on trains from crowded East coast cities and taken to rural towns in the Midwest where they were placed with farm families. The lives of these children were sometimes

improved, frequently not.... and this is where Kline's story begins. Vivian Daly is a ninety-one year-old Irish immigrant who rode the Orphan Train and found hardship, pain, and some kindness along the way. Her counterpart is Molly Ayres, a rebellious unhappy seventeen year-old who is aging out of foster care. The novel traces the parallel histories of these two women, and while we see the damage inflicted on both we also learn that lives can be recast. This book is a favorite with book clubs across the country for its sociological, historical and mutigenerational appeal. Highly recommended!
