Glen Cove Keeps MLK Dream Alive

This Monday the 30th Annual Martin Luther King Jr. Commemorative Program was celebrated to highlight messages of peace, love, and acceptance to the citizens of Glen Cove. The theme, "Glen Cove: Keeping the Dream Alive For 30 Years!" rang true throughout the ceremony as thoughtful speeches, poems, and music all brought a community together to celebrate the legacy of Martin Luther King Jr. and the late Nelson Mandela.

The events began at First Baptist Church of Glen Cove, where a procession including citizens and police singing "We Shall Not Be Moved" made its way through the streets of Glen Cove to Finley Middle School's Wunsch Auditorium to continue the program. Marchers were greeted by the Glen Cove High School Select Chorale and Ms. Sheryl Goodine, Chairperson of the MLK birthday celebrations.

Assistant Superintendant Dr. Michael Israel introduced a new tradition to the ceremony, as people were invited to write down one instance of prejudice or discrimination they have felt in their life on an index card, which were collected as a group and then disposed of at a later date to go up in flames. The tradition is a powerful symbol of the abolishment of hate and anger to give way to peace and acceptance.

A variety of personal speeches were

given at the ceremony by Assistant Principle of Glen Cove High School Mr. Alan Hudson, Superintendent of Schools Maria Rianna, Retired Sergeant Jack McDougal, Reverend Roger Williams, and newly sworn in Mayor Reginald Spinello.



Once each class dropped their paper into the hole, the maple Peace Tree was planted, in hopes that all of their wishes, hopes, and ideas for peace will grow through the roots of the tree. The tree will serve as a constant and ongoing reminder of Dr. King's legacy and that peace can begin with the children.

Another interesting fact: Martin Luther King, Jr. began attending Morehouse College at the early age of 15.



Their winning design was chosen from numerous student drawings by Principal Cousins along with many administrators and faculty at the high school.

Background: Last year, Kevin and Nick were ninth graders in Laura Green's Design and Drawing for Production class when they utilized interdisciplinary skills

The students also had to create a landscape design of the memorial site by measuring the dimensions of the entire location behind the high school.

The Artifact:

under the direction of teacher Laura Green.

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In January 2013, teacher Dr. Rob Gerver was able to get the artifact from the Port Authority after many months of discussions. The artifact is 69 inches long and weighs about 400 pounds. It is a twisted piece of a box beam that was a window frame of the World Trade Center. Dr. Gerver said, "We need to preserve this special artifact so it doesn't erode; as a piece of American History, it has a chance to be around for hundreds of years!" Upon its arrival to the North Shore Schools, students engaged in many discussions about the tragedy of 9/11 since they were very young when the actual events took place.

The Lesson Objective:

"In this project, my students explored their knowledge of the design process." said teacher Laura Green. "They utilized drawing and computer software skills to create a 'student' design project with a real-life application." She added, "My students were thrilled to be involved in this type of interdisciplinary lesson which applies lessons learned in the classroom to real-world situations."

An Open Letter to the North Shore School Community

Happy New Year. May 2014 bring you better tidings and joy!

But for some members of our community, 2014 will be a period of difficult choices and discernment. For you see, there are members of our community that continue to struggle financially in an economy that remains fragile. There are more of these families than we are aware of; many of whom suffer quietly; or share their anxieties quietly with their closest friends.

2014 will be the year in which the tax burden of the Glenwood Landing plant will start to shift to the residential members of the community. And for those families that are just getting by, this property tax shift will be the difference between be able to stay in a community that they love; and making the hard decision to sell their house and leave.

There are more than a dozen homes in foreclosure / pre-foreclosure in our community. This is not only an issue for those living on a fixed income; but rather for the young families with children that have moved here within the past few years – unaware that the tax burden would shift so rapidly and so quickly. Some of us have already seen our tax burden increase 20% or more in the past two years, and the LIPA tax shifting has yet to begin.

Do we as a community have a moral obligation to do all that we can to lessen the burden of this historic shift in property taxes? Do our elected officials have a moral obligation to spend only that which is ABSOLUTELY NECESSARY, so as to minimize the impact of the shifting tax base? We use the words – moral obligation – because that is exactly what is required of us and our leadership – to do all that we can to minimize the impact of the shifting tax burden, so that those families that have lived in this community, can remain in this community.

On January 30th, the North Shore Board of Education and the Administration will give a presentation on the International Baccalaureate ("IB") program that is slated to be introduced next year. This IB program will cost hundreds of thousands of dollars and will benefit 5%+ of the student population. Lawrence School District recently voted NOT to implement IB stating that its' expense is too high relative to the proportion of students that would benefit. Garden City, who spends thousands of dollars less per pupil than North Shore did not implement IB because they could not afford such an expense during these financial times, and that their resources were better spent elsewhere. How can we afford to do so?

Please come to the January 30th School Board Meeting and tell the School Board and the Administration that enough is enough. At a time when people are losing their homes and struggling in the face of the largest shift in the tax burden yet to come; IB is a program that does not need to be implemented. IB is not a program that is ABSOLUTELY NECESSARY.

Last year, we started to spend hundreds of thousands of dollars teaching mandarin to 6, 7 and 8 year olds; and people moved out of the community or lost their homes in foreclosure. This year, it will be IB, and more people will leave or lose their homes.

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
Scholastic Recognizes Connolly Writer

Name the Celebrity



This week's celebrity was born in Quincy, Mass. on Dec. 14, 1935. She studied acting at Barnard College and the Actors Studio, founded by Elia Kazan and others, making her Broadway theatre debut in 1953 in "Be Your Age". She made her film debut in Kazan's "A Face in the Crowd" (1957) with Andy Griffith, Patricia Neal and Walter Matthau. While filming the movie in Arkansas, she lived with a local family and practiced baton twirling so that she would be believable as the teenager who wins the attention of "Lonesome Rhodes" played by Griffith. After appearing as "Eula Varner", the hot-blooded daughter-in-law of "Will Varner" (Orson Welles) in 1958's "The Long, Hot Summer", she appeared in "These Thousand Hills", as a dance hall girl with Don Murray and Richard Egan. She came to prominence as a rape victim whose husband is tried for killing her attacker in Otto Preminger's "Anatomy of a Murderer" with Jimmy Stewart, Ben Gazzara and Eve Arden. In 1960, she made a second film with Kazan, "Wild River", which co-starred Montgomery Clift and Jo Ann Fleet. In 1962, she starred opposite Glen Ford in Blake Edwards' suspense thriller 'Experiment in Terror" with Stefanie Powers and Ross Martin

Last Week's Celebrity

Born Jacques Haussmann, last week's celebrity is better known professionally as John Houseman. He is perhaps best known for his role as "Professor Charles Kingsfield" in the film "The Paper Chase" (1973), for which he won a Best Supporting Actor Oscar. He reprised his role as "Kingsfield" in the subsequent TV series of "Paper Chase". Houseman was also known for his commercials for the brokerage firm Smith-Barney. Do you remember the old catchphrase "They make money the old fashion way.....they earn it"? In 1937, Houseman and Orson Welles founded the acclaimed New York drama company, the Mercury Theatre. Beginning in the summer of 1938, the Mercury Theatre was featured in a weekly dramatic radio program on the CBS network, initially promoted as "First Person Singular" before gaining the official title "The Mercury Theatre on the Air". This company, subsequently, became famous for its notorious 1938 Halloween night radio adaptation of H.G. Welles' "The War of the Worlds", which had put much of the country in a panic. There is such a long list of his accomplishments. Orson Welles and our celebrity had "artistic" differences over the screenplay of the movie "Citizen Kane". After they went their separate ways, Houseman went on to direct "The Devil and Daniel Webster" (1939) along with other films. He became Vice-President of David O. Selznick Productions. However, when Pearl Harbor was attacked, he quit his job and became the head of the overseas radio division of the Office of War Information (OWI), working for the Voice of America. Between 1945 to 1962, he produced 18 films for Paramount, Universal and MGM. In the 1980's, he played the grandfather in TV's sit-com "Silver Spoons" which starred Rick Schroder. He was the founding director of the Drama Division at the Julliard School, when his first graduating class included Kevin Klein, Patti LuPone, Christopher Reeve and Robin Williams. He became a U.S. citizen in 1943. He died of spinal cancer at the age of 86 on Oct.31, 1988, the 50th anniversary of the radio broadcast of the infamous "War of the Worlds".

Kids learn what happens to the brain when attacked by drug and alcohol abuse

The School Committee of SAFE's PRIDE Coalition sponsored a visit by Dr. Stephen Dewey, a neurologist and neuroscientist, on Friday, Jan 10. He spoke to a packed assembly at Finley Middle School of sixth, seventh and eighth graders on "The Teen Brain: Still Under Construction," which delved into how alcohol and drug use affect the developing adolescent and adult brain. The information he shared appeared to stun the middle school students who were, for the most part, silent for most of the assembly and totally engaged in the presentation.

"Heroin is now cheap and we've seen use of it go up more than any other drug," Dewey said. "In 2013 we saw more kids die from heroin than alcohol. This has never happened before."

Dewey works at North Shore Hospital in Manhasset where he conducts studies on the brain. He brought along a Power Point presentation that included many slides from PET scans of the brain which helped to visually give credence to what he was sharing with the students.

"I'm not here to say no to drugs," he said. "I'm here to talk about what I see everyday.'

Some interesting facts shared by Dewey included:

If you don't use drugs by age 22 there is less than a 1 percent chance you will become addicted to a drug.

Marijuana is now being laced with methamphetamine.

The number one cause of seeking out drugs is the environment. When you use drugs your brain will become activated. But the feeling you get

from taking drugs does not last as long as the way it affects your brain.

Dewey said his purpose in speaking to middle school students was to arm them with the facts before they make the mistake of getting involved in taking drugs. His hope is if younger students see how drugs and alcohol affect the brain they

will not even try them

"When you get drunk from alcohol it takes your brain four to five days to go back to normal." Dewey said. "At some point when you drink your brain will not go back to normal.

The only way to get it back to normal would be to drink like an alcoholic does. They don't drink to get drunk, just to feel normal."

He told students that chronic marijuana smoking changes the blood flow in specific brain areas. "Smoking pot is the number one cause of injuries for athletes and for household accidents like falling down the stairs," Dewey said. "The brain changes dramatically, and these changes are permanent."

Students had plenty of questions for Dewey and talked amongst themselves as they exited the assembly, no doubt sharing what they had heard. It's one thing reading about drugs and alcohol, but another much more powerful lesson to see what drug and alcohol abuse can do to your brain.

Rachel Joyce wrote "The Unholy Pilgrimage....and PERFECT is her second and latest novel. PERFECT has an interesting premise: it is 1972 and two seconds are to be added to the world's clocks to compensate for variations in the earth's rotation (apparently this actually did happen and over the years since, twelve more seconds have been added). While scientists insist this necessary adjustment will have no ill effect, eleven year-old Byron and his friend James are very concerned. As it turns out, they were right: their entire lives and those of - Ann DiPietro

their friends and families were changed by the addition of those two seconds. In alternating chapters, the reader experiences the summer of 1972 and the winter of 2012. Always there is the question: how will these two time periods intersect? The 1972 piece is set in a lovely English suburb with a beautiful moor, a lush pond, and told from young Byron's perspective. In 2012, the perspective is that of a very damaged middle-aged man living in an abandoned van and working in a failing shopping mall. Each of these stories could stand alone, but Joyce links the two in a devastating conclusion. A very thought-provoking book!



Glen Cove Boys & Girls Club Youth of the Month Debunk Science Myth



As a collaborated effort the kids, prepared the sandwiches and assembled the bags with the items that they purchased/donated. Once completed the bags were delivered to the shelter.


