# Search Warrant Uncovers Major Illegal Housing on Landing Road

Mayor Reginald Spinello today announced a major illegal housing bust at 40 Landing Road. On May 21, the Glen Cove Police Department and the City's Code Enforcement Department executed a search warrant and found a total of 15 people living in the one-family house which also has a five-room doctor's suite. The absentee landlord, who lives overseas, apparently allowed for illegal cellar habitation, nine rooms to be converted to living areas, for plumbing to be installed without permits, and construction in the house without permits. In addition, twelve smoke detectors and three carbon monoxide detectors were missing. A total of eight vehicles were associated with the people living in the house.

Mayor Spinello said, "This is once again proof positive that this administration's steadfast commitment to crack down on illegal housing continues. This latest investigation and finding sends a message to any others participating in the illegal housing business. My administration will not tolerate illegal housing. Illegal housing puts lives at risk, disparages a neighborhood and impacts our city's infrastructure. The Landing Road case is also proof positive that our code enforcement department is acting upon residents' complaints."

Upon entering the house the following was discovered: A dining room was converted into a bedroom and subdivided with dressers and other furniture; a utility room was converted into a bedroom and the main tenants, a married couple, were living in a bedroom that was converted from two treatment rooms and the waiting area formerly part of a doctor's office. There were two adults using a study as a bedroom. The room also contained a hot plate and

# Glen Cove 2014 Memorial Day Honoree Ex-LTJG Henry K. Banach, USNR


The City of Glen Cove Memorial Day Parade Committee announced recently that Henry K. Banach, Ex-LTJG USNR, is this year's Memorial Day Parade honoree. Mayor Reginald Spinello and the City Council invite everyone in our community to join our proud veterans this weekend and pay tribute to our nation's fallen heroes.

Henry K. Banach is a true Glen Cover. He is a graduate of Glen Cove High School, Class of 1942. Henry enlisted in the United States Navy in January, 1943. His military service began when he served as an apprentice seaman at Georgia Tech and he later qualified as Engineering Officer and Supply and Commissary Officer in 1945, having attended General Line School at Brooklyn Navy Yard. Henry was commissioned on Nov. 19, 1945 as Ensign (D) L USNR at USN-PSC (0) 3ND. On January, 2, 1946 he was transported on troop ship to Manila and reported for duty on the USS PC 1120 as Third Officer. In April, 1946 Henry left Manila and sailed to Pearl Harbor. Transferred to the USS LCI (6) 1090, he left Pearl Harbor for Shanghai. He served on a transfer ship for river/ocean pilots. In August, 1946, Henry left Shanghai for San Diego and came home to Glen Cove in September. Henry received an Honorable Discharge from the US Naval Reserve in December, 1955. His commendations include being awarded the American Theatre Ribbon, the Asiatic Pacific Theatre Ribbon, and the Victory Ribbon.





# Portledge Student Wins Gold Medal in Al Kalfus Long Island Math Fair

On May 2nd students from all over Long Island gathered at Hofstra University for the final round of the Al Kalfus Long Island Math Fair. Portledge School ninth grader Ruiwen Fu, a member of the Portledge Math Circle, received a gold medal, the highest award given, for presenting her Proof of the Rule for Divisibility by 7.

The competition required students to present their research on a variety of mathematics topics and to defend their work before a panel of judges. According to Portledge Math Coach Helen Oehrlein, Fu used the divisibility rule for 7 to solve a problem at one of the Portledge math circle's meetings and her curiosity was sparked. Why, Fu wondered, did the rule work? She was not able to find the proof in an online search, and

so she used examples of other divisibility proofs supplied by Ms. Oehrlein to create her own original proof of the rule --something that set her apart from the other competitors in the math fair.

Portledge School encourages students to use curiosity and creativity to explore problems for themselves. Fu has been at Portledge for just one year, but says she already appreciates the access she has had to her teachers, and the freedom at Portledge to investigate problems that interest her.

This is the first year that Portledge has competed in the Al Kalfus Long Island Math Tournament. Ms. Oehrlein says, "We are thrilled that Portledge's first math project was such a great success!"

# Name the Celebrity



This week's celebrity was born Owena Wolcott, on June 16, 1903, in Portland, Oregon. She first came to fame on Broadway as the singing and dancing ingénue in the original production of "No, No, Nanette." From this, she had a very successful stage and radio career in the 1930s in New York. She introduced the song "You're the Cream in My Coffee" in the 1927 Broadway musical "Hold Everything" which included in its cast, Bert Lahr and Victor Moore. This production was the beginning of Mr. Lahr's career and in a few years, he and our celebrity would again share the film stage in a very popular 1939 movie. Our celebrity's first starring role was in Warner Bros. talkie called "Going Wild" (1930) with Joe E. Brown and Frank McHugh. Originally, this film was intended as a musical but all the song/dance numbers were removed prior to the release due to the public's growing distaste for musicals which had virtually saturated the cinema in 1929-30. The following year, she appeared in a comedy called "Hot Heiress" in which she sings several songs along with her co-star, Ben Lyon, of "Hell's Angels" (1930) fame, which had just brought Jean Harlow to film prominence. In 1941, our celebrity played a hugh role as a madam, albeit a Chinese one, "Mother Gin Sling", in "The Shanghai Gesture" with Walter Huston and Gene Tierney. Tierney's role in this film, as a drug and alcohol addicted heiress, was none like Tierney had ever done before or after this film, with the help of our celebrity.

Last Week's Celebrity

Last week's celebrity was born Oliver Peter Heggie and was professionally known as O.P. Heggie. In the early 20th century and after several years of playing some of the best known London theater stages such as the Hippodrome, the Centurion and the St. James, Mr. Heggie headed for the NYC Broadway stage. He performed in many successful plays, including "A Midsummer Night's Dream", "Minick", and "The Merchant of Venice", to name a few. His last work on Broadway was as "William Owen" in "The Green Bay Tree" (1933) with Leo G. Carroll, Laurence Olivier and Olivier's pre-Vivien Leigh wife, Jill Esmond. A year later, this play was produced at the Northhampton Repertory in England with Errol Flynn. Mr. Heggie appeared in at least 27 films, including those mentioned last week and "The Count of Monte Cristo", "The Letter" (the first one, not the Bette Davis version), "The Mighty", "The Bad Man", and "Peck's Bad Boy", all between 1928 and his death from pneumonia, at the age of 58, on Feb. 7, 1936. He is probably best known for his role as the blind hermit in Mary Shelley's "Bride of Frankenstein" (1935) with Elsa Lanchester. Isolated in the woods, he befriends the injured monster (Boris Karloff), only for two hunters to intrude and destroy the friendship, and his home.

# Glen Cove School District, **Teacher's Association Agree to New Pact**

The Glen Cove School District has reached a new agreement with the Glen Cove Teachers Association through June 2016 that compensates instructional staff members fairly and helps sustain the district's present and future fiscal health.

"After close to three years of collective bargaining, we are please to have reached an agreement that is acceptable to both sides," said Glen Cove Superintendent of Schools Maria Rianna. "During the budget development process, the Board of Education and administration had to make some tough choices to maintain a quality educational program and uphold our fiscal responsibility to the Glen Cove taxpayers. This agreement will allow us to preserve opportunities for students while addressing the cost-of-living needs of our teachers. On behalf of the Board of Education, I commend the GCTA leadership for their cooperation throughout this process. It is because of their commitment to the children of this community that concessions

Through the duration of the 2013-14 school year (which ends June 30, 2014), teachers will receive a salary increase of 1.5%, pro-rated from May 1, 2014. This amounts to a 0.3% increase for the entire 2013-14 school year. Full-time GCTA unit members who have been employed since the beginning of the school year also agree to a two-month freeze of their applicable incremental step increase, running through the remainder of the

For the 2014-15 school year, teachers will receive a 1% increase in salary and one-half of their applicable incremental step increase. The same 1% salary and one-half incremental step increases will apply for the 2015-16 school year, with the new agreement expiring on June 30,


All other wage rates (non-full-time GCTA members) and stipends will remain frozen through the remainder of the current school year. Beginning in July 2014, all other wages and stipends will increase by 1% for the 2014-15 school year. A 1% increase will also be applied to these wages and stipends for the 2015-16 school year.

Provisions are also included in the new pact that set the number of hours for professional development time, ensure eligibility for the New York State retirement incentive and uphold priority status for excessed teachers wishing to return to the district. The agreement also includes a stipulation that governs the eligibility of health insurance opt-out payments.

This is a good compromise, taking into consideration the economic times and knowing how challenging it is for school districts to maintain programs under the tax levy cap," said GCTA President Karen Ferguson. "The GCTA values the support of the Glen Cove community, appreciates the collaboration of the Board of Education and administration, and recognizes the importance of a fair agreement for all."




