Glen Cove Volunteers Battle Blaze

At 5:30 a.m. on September 22, Glen Cove Fire Department received a call from Fire Com reporting a house fire at the corner of Glen Street and Elm Avenue. Initially, the police responded and called it a working house fire. First Assistant Chief Phil Grella was the first chief to arrive on the scene, followed by 3rd Assistant chier Marvin Tate. Shortly thereafter, Chief Joe Solomito arrived at the location taking over the command post.

Departments called on for mutual aid were Sea Cliff, Locust Valley, East Norwich and Oyster Bay Co #1, Glenwood Fire Company FAST Team, Locust Valley

When firemen first arrived, the whole front of the building was engulfed in smoke with fire blowing out of the front of the building, Initially it was reported that two people lived in the house which turned out to not be true.

Truck # 528 was the first engine to arrive. They hooked up to a hydrant and stretched lines for the first attack. Later Glen Coves #521 arrived and stretched their ladder to the roof of the building to vent the fire. Truck #521 and 524 also arrived

Departments called on for mutual aid were Sea Cliff, Locust Valley, East Norwich and Oyster Bay Co #1. Glenwood Fire Company FAST Team was sent in to search the building. Later, Locust Valley replaced the Glenwood fire-fighters.

The fire was knocked down within an hour said Solomito.

Fire Marshals arrived to search the building. The fire is still under investigation said Chief Solomito.

Solomite also said, "everyone who helped fighting the fire did a good job."




Gold Coast Auto Concours Draws Thousands With A Focus On Supporting The Diabetes Research Institute

Glen Cove Senior Center Visits Sweetbriar

It was a glorious early autumn kind of day when 25 members of the Glen Cove Senior Center were greeted by their guide Nancy at the Sweetbriar Nature Center in Smithtown. Nancy related that she had just taken a call from someone who needed help with an injured bird. This is what can be done here.

Sweetbriar Nature Center, a not-forprofit located on 54 acres in a residential area of Smithtown, serves to educate and protect the environment, and to rehabilitate wildlife. Animals are returned to health and released to their natural habitat. Those that remain because they are unable to function in the world are helpful for the children's educational programs, and the children learn not to be afraid of animals in the wild. The Nature Center is a venue for rock-climbing, canoeing and other outdoor activities for the older children, scout projects, programs for the disabled and social events for all ages.

A red-tailed hawk was in the flight cage getting ready for his return to the wide open skies. Lilly and Daisy are great-horned owls who can live out their days happily at the Center, along with goats, rabbits, chinchillas, hens, more hawks and owls, cockatoos and parrots.

Upstairs in the Blydenburgh House is the simulated rainforest which plays an incredible role in sustaining life as a habitat for plants and animals. When you don't have the privilege of visiting the real thing, what could be better than experiencing it this way?

At last this wonderful tour took us to the Butterfly House, closing for the season at September's end. We learned that, for example, the showy orange Monarch butterfly gets nectar from the butterfly bush but needs the common milkweed as a host plant to lay its eggs for the coming year. Parsley and dill are the host plants for the black swallowtail, hollyhock and sunflowers for the painted lady, and the exquisite 'eastern-tailed blue' butterfly enjoys the nectar of milkweed and zinnias!

So, if you see a September butterfly in the sky, chances are it mysteriously has a longer than usual lifecycle and is wintering in Mexico! And that's a fact!

LEGAL NOTICE
PLEASE TAKE NOTICE THAT the Glen Cove City Council adopted the following Ordinance at the City Council Meeting of September 23, 2014:

BE IT ORDAINED, that Section 168-60 (Presumptions) is hereby added to Code of Ordinances as follows:

§168-60 Presumptions

A. In connection with the investigation and prosecution of violations of this Chapter related to occupancy, it shall be a rebuttable presumption that a building or dwelling unit zoned for single-family occupancy is occupied by more than one family if one or more of the following features are found to exist on the premises of that building or dwelling unit:

(1) More than one gas meter, electric

meter, or water meter.

More than one connecting line for

cable or satellite television.
(3) More than one doorbell or doorway on the same side of the building or dwell-

ing unit.

(4) More than one mailbox, mail slot, or post office address, or any combination thereof.

(5) That there exists permanent partitions or "key locked" internal doors which may serve to bar access between segregated portions of the dwelling, including but not limited to bedrooms, or the inability of any occupant or person in possession thereof to have unimpeded and/or lawful access to all parts of the dwelling unit.

(6) That there exists two or more kitchens, each containing one or more of the

following: a range, oven, hot plate, microwave, or other similar device customarily used for cooking or preparation of foods, unless the existence of additional kitchens has been approved by the City

(7) Separate written or oral rental agreements or leases or the payment of rent for portions of the building or dwelling unit among the owners or residents, or

any combination thereof.

It shall be presumed that a dwelling which has been advertised in any newspaper, magazine or local advertising publication as being available for sale or rent, which advertisement expressly or implicitly provides that such dwelling contains rooms for rent, more than one separate dwelling living unit, or may be occupied by more than one separate family, is being used as a dwelling containing the number of rooms for rent, dwelling units or families stated or implied in such.

The presumption raised by proof of the existence of any such conditions set forth in paragraphs A and B of this Section may be rebutted by conclusive evidence that such conditions do not in fact exist, or conclusive evidence that the existence of such condition(s) is for a lawful purpose and do(es) not relate to

illegal occupancy of said dwelling. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Name the Celebrity



This week's celebrity is one of modern TV and moviedom's most sturdy and reliable character actors who dreamed of being in actor from early childhood. Born on Aug. 30, 1954 in Oceanside, Long Island, he came from a traditional middleclass Jewish family, that urged him, by his own admission, to become a doctor or a lawyer. However, he felt more at home in the world of the thespian. At 14, he used a fake I.D. to see Dustin Hoffman's "The Graduate" (1968), when they actually checked I.D. His father was in the scrap metal business. His mother, a homemaker, had fled Belgium, with her family, to escape the Nazis. When his father quit the scrap metal business to pursue music, it inspired our celebrity to give his dream a try. His aborted big break came when he was cast in the NBC TV series "St. Elsewhere", as "Dr. Wayne Fiscus". Then he was promptly dumped and replaced by Howie Mandel. Luckily, his real break was destined to be on the big screen, as "Ira Shalowitz" in the Billy Crystal vehicle, "City Slickers" (1991). Crystal was so pleased with our celebrity's work that he wrote the part of "Stan Yankleman", beleaguered brother of the titular character in the movie "Mr. Saturday Night" (1992), especially for him. The part earned him an Oscar nomination in 1993.

Last week's celebrity, born Emma Matzo, adopted her stage name after reading for Maxwell Anderson's "Mary of Scotland", a play about Mary, Queen of Scotland and Elizabeth I. She took "Elizabeth Scott" and later dropped the "E". Other films she appeared in were "Dead Reckoning" (1947) with Humphrey Bogart, "Desert Fury" (1948) with John Hodiak and "Too Late for Tears" (1949) with Don Defore. No other actress has appeared in more film noir. Of her 22 feature films, she was leading in all but one, which was "The Strange Love of Martha Ivers" (1946), her second film, starring Barbara Stanwyck.

As mentioned in last week's tease, Scott was hired by producer Michael Myerberg to understudy Tallulah Bankhead in Thornton Wilder's new play, "The Skin of Our Teeth". Bankhead had previously signed a contract forbidding an understudy for the "Sabrina" role, which Myerberg breached when hiring Scott. He did this because Bankhead tried to control the production by not showing up. Scott had always acknowledged that Myerberg used her to keep Bankhead under control. Broadway legend has it that Bankhead was being victimized by Scott, who was the reallife "Eve Harrington" and referred to in Mary Orr's short story, "The Wisdom of Eve" (1946), the basis of the 1950 film "All About Eve" with Bette Davis and Anne Baxter. The irony is that Scott never substituted for Bankhead, as Scott's presence guaranteed Bankhead's!

brother was Rear Admiral W.R. Shoemaker and her father, Captain Charles Shoemaker, was head of the U.S. Revenue Cutter Service. She retired from film/stage, more or less, by 1950, but returned to acting following the death of her husband, actor Henry Stephenson. They had one daughter Ann Hall, who was a song lyricist. She is fondly remembered for playing FDR's mother, Sara Delano Roosevelt, after replacing Anne Seymour on the Broadway stage. She also played her in the film version of "Sunrise at Campbello" (1960) with Ralph Bellamy and Hume Cronin. She also portrayed Harry Truman's mother in the TV movie "Collision Course: Truman vs. MacArthur" (1976). She was 85 at the time. She died of cancer, on Sept. 18, 1978, at the age of 87.

Dear Great Book Guru,

After the last couple of fun-filled weekends here in Sea Cliff, it is sad to realize Summer is really over and Fall is about to begin, but I can seek comfort in a good book, right? Any suggestions? Adjusting to Autumn

Dear Adjusting to Autumn,

I just finished a very interesting book- a book that reminded me in some ways of Sea Cliff: PERFECTLY MISERABLE: GUILT, GOD, AND REAL ESTATE IN A SMALL TOWN by Sarah Payne Stuart. A descendent of a wealthy, literary family, now married to a mattress salesman, she never had the money or grace to live as she wanted. But the book is much more than a family memoir- it is also a story of zoning battles, architectural review boards, tear downs, landmarks, preservationists versus modernists... Sound familiar?


