



Commercial Property Tax Decrease in Spinello's Proposed Budget

A commercial property tax decrease is within Glen Cove Mayor Reginald Spinello's proposed 2015 budget. Commercial real estate taxes will decrease .84 percent which translates to a reduction of \$80 in taxes per \$500,000 of assessed value. The proposed budget includes a minimal increase of 1.17 percent in residential property taxes, or \$38 for a home with an assessed value of \$500,000.

"I have presented the 2015 budget to the City Council for their consideration. We will begin our discussions on the budget during the October 7 precouncil meeting. On October 10, budget books will be available to the public. A public hearing on the proposed budget is scheduled for October 14 during the City Council meeting. We will then continue our discussions until we take a final vote on the budget during the October 28th City Council meeting."


This is Mayor Spinello's first proposed budget for Glen Cove. It is the result of numerous meetings with each of the City's department heads, the City controller, and Glen Cove's first responders to discuss their needs for the coming year. Having received their input and keeping the City's taxpayers in mind, the Mayor formed the proposed budget.

NASSAU COUNTY POLICE **Telephone Scams**

County Executive Edward P. Mangano and Acting Police Commissioner Thomas C. Krumpter are urging citizens to be vigilant when receiving telephone solicitations or emails from persons identifying themselves as employees of the Internal Revenue Service.

It has come to the attention of the Nassau County Police Department that individuals are receiving calls from persons claiming that they or a family member owe money for unpaid taxes. In these cases individuals are contacted by scammers claiming that they are federal employees and that the individual called owes money. These victims are told they can avoid arrest, foreclosure or suspension/termination of services if they make payment.

The IRS does not and will not ask for credit card numbers over the phone, nor request a pre-paid debit card or wire transfer.

Other characteristics of this scam may include:

Scammers using fake names and IRS badge numbers. They generally

use common names and surnames to identify themselves.

- Scammers may be able to recite the last four digits of a victim's Social Security Number.
- Scammers spoof the IRS toll-free number on caller ID to make it appear that it's the IRS calling.
- Scammers sometimes send bogus IRS emails to some victims to support their bogus calls.
- Victims hear background noise of other calls being conducted to mimic a
- After threatening victims with jail time or driver's license revocation, scammers hang up and others soon call back pretending to be from the local police or DMV, and the caller ID supports their claim.

Residents should also be aware that there are other unrelated scams (such as a lottery sweepstakes) and solicitations (such as debt relief) that the department sees from time to time.

These scams cost honest citizens thousands of unrecoverable dollars.

This information is being provided to residents to make them aware of these ongoing scams. If you believe you may have been a victim of any of these scams, please call 911 immediately.

Growing Up in Sea Cliff

Sea Cliff Museum opened its current exhibit "Growing Up in Sea Cliff" on September 28 at the museum. Museum docents got a preview of the exhibit and then they and the rest of the community were invited to hear speakers talk about experiences of growing up in Sea Cliff. The speakers spoke about the various aspects people's lives.

Museum Director Sara Reres spoke of Sea Cliff's early history, noting Village's self sufficiency with its own movie house, two supermarkets, a post office, the beach pavilion and skating on Scudder's Pond. In a large sense people could do everything they needed to do in Sea Cliff she said. Village Historians Jean Davis spoke and relayed stories from her and Priscilla Waltz about early life in the Village. Jean herself was delivered by Dr. Bell she said. She lived on a street with 7 boys as friends. Everyone owned a dog that followed the kids to school, and spending a lot of time with a friend who lived in the old "Pinacle" that had overlooked the harbor. During the summer she said everyone went to the beach from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. The Pavilion had a food concession run by Mom and Pop Hall, Beanie who taught swimming and every family had their own locker

she continued. Each church in Sea Cliff offered the community something said Jean. St. Luke's had plays, the Methodist Church had projects and at St. Boniface is where the teenagers learned to dance. In winter everyone went sleigh riding, and skating.

Another speaker talked about Henry Hollman's essay with rules of the pavilion. "Let's go to the Beach." Old buildings like Fosters, the Cliffside Club, the two story Pavillion were noted, swimming and boating, and hurricanes, where Shore Road washed over the road to Scudder's Pond.

Another woman, Dale Napolin Bratter told about the formation of a small Jewish community with about 12 families that came together and shared and sang and had Hanukah parties. The Hunt children, still growing up, talked about appreciating things like Sunset Serenade, the library and meeting lots of other children in Sea Cliff. The closing speaker, Jennifer Dawson, read was a humorous poem "Our Times" written by Barbara Thill Schreiber about happy times in Sea Cliff in the 1950s. The reading really summed up the many happy memories growing up in Sea Cliff had and continues to offer.

The afternoon proved to a very enjoyable one for everyone who attended.

On behalf of the Glen Cove Youth Bureau, I would like to thank all of the individuals, businesses and organizations that so generously donated school supplies and monetary assistance to this year's Fill-a-Bookbag program. I would also like to thank Mayor Reggie Spinello for supporting not only this year's drive, but also for his overall and continued support of youth programming in the City.

A most profound message was delivered to us by Sea Cliff Civic Association president Ann DiPietro at the Independence Day (July 4) celebration to the estimated crowd of 150 people who packed the Library Green before marching to the dedication of a new pocket park called Lincoln Plaza at the corner of Sea Cliff and Roslyn Avenues. Ann

peered over her eyeglasses and slowly scanned the gathering with her eyes, as if addressing each individual personally, before paraphrasing a favorite author: "I believe that Sea Cliff is a community of Poets and Saints." More than a few people reported goose bumps at the moment she made that proclamation.

A similar opportunity to show off Sea Cliff"s tremendous heart a few Thursdays ago instead became a sparsely attended memorial trribute to those victims of 9/11. 


Ella's Esthetics Opens in Glen Cove

Inference through art in Glen Cove

The interpretation of a work of art is in the eye of the beholder; a lesson recently experienced first hand by firstgrade students at Deasy School in Glen

The children enjoyed a classroom visit from Nassau County Museum of Art representative Rebecca Hirschwerk as a precursor to an upcoming field trip to the museum itself.

"I love these visits because it gives students an understanding of what we do," Hirschwerk said. "They recognize us and feel comfortable."

Hirschwerk met with students in Diane Depietro and Jen Russo's classes, showing them several works of art and asking them to describe what they thought was going on in each picture. Students participated with enthusiasm, excitedly raising their hands while offering interesting explanations.

This process makes the students feel safe because there's never a right or wrong answer," Principal Nomi Rosen stated.

According to Rosen, the visit bolsters students' visual thinking strategies and serves as a lead-in to close reading and textual evidence. In addition to the classroom and museum visits, students will also be asked to write about the works of art and to describe what they

Eyewitness News reporter visits Glen Cove

Kristin Thorne, a Long Island correspondent for WABC-TV's Eyewitness News, visited students in Glen Cove's TV Production 1 and Broadcast Journalism classes offering career advice to the budding communication arts students.

Thorne's visit, orchestrated by media communications teacher Christopher Barry, marks the first in a series of professionals who will visit the high school classes, providing students with insight on what it takes to do certain jobs and how to achieve their career goals.

"They can hear me talk until I'm blue in the face, but to actually sit with someone in the television business, it registers differently," Barry said.


Thorne provided students with specific information of what her job entails, including writing, long hours and the importance of her appearance. She also indicated her love of breaking news and storm coverage, telling students she has been fascinated by storms since she was a young girl.

Students were completely engaged throughout the visit, especially when Thorne spoke of how she secured her first reporting job out of college. She explained that she had emailed and phoned a news director in Connecticut and when she didn't hear back, she decided to take a "road trip" to the newsroom. Once there, she met with the news director and convinced him to give her a chance.

"You have to put boots on the ground," Thorne said. "You will not get a job from an email. You have to set up an informational meeting."

During her meeting with Broadcast Journalism students, the WABC-TV correspondent reviewed footage of students' classwork, giving them tips on framing shots and how to hold a microphone. She also told students it didn't matter what career path they chose, as long as they had passion for it.

"Don't be afraid," Thorne said. "Find what you like, what makes you happy and go for it."



Name the Celebrity



This week's celebrity was born in Columbus, Ohio on March 29, 1889. He claimed to have an early pre-disposition towards show business "I discovered a boy a block away who would eat worms and swallow flies for a penny. For onethird of the profits, I exhibited him in a tent." When he was 9, his widowed mother moved to San Francisco where following the earthquake of 1906, his family lived in a tent for two weeks "in mortal terror of the fire." By 1910, he was in vaudeville and from there went on to Broadway plays and movies. A matinee idol in the silent films, he came to prominence as the "Cisco Kid" in "In Old Arizona" (1928), for which he won an Oscar. He went on to star with Myrna Loy in "Penthouse" (1933) and to what many considered his best role, that of the doctor who treated President Abraham Lincoln's assassin in "The Prisoner of Shark Island" (1936). That year his \$284,000 income topped the industry.

Last Week's Celebrity

Last week's celebrity was David Paymer. He has mentioned that he felt as though "his passport was stamped" after his two big breaks in "City Slickers" and "Mr. Saturday Night" both with Billy Crystal. He was quickly in demand by directors such as Steven Spielberg ("Amistad", 1997), Robert Redford ("Quiz Show", 1994), Oliver Stone ("Nixon", 1995), David Mamet ("State & Main", 1999), Steven Soderbergh ("Ocean's 13", 2007) and Sam Raimi ("Drag Me to Hell", 2009). Chameleonlike in his portrayals, Paymer has since starred in hundreds of roles in films and TV, notably "The American President", "Get Shorty", "Payback", "The Hurricane", "In Good Company", Francis Ford Coppola's "Twixt", "Taxi", "L.A. Law", "Happy Days", "Ghost Whisperer", "Law & Order: SVU" and Kenneth Branagh's "Jack Ryan: Shadow One". Paymer received Golden Globe Award nominations for "Mr. Saturday Night" and for HBO's "Crime of the Century". He became a hyphenate...now there's a 50 cent word... in 2002, directing the acclaimed comedy short, "Candor City Hospital" for Showtime. He has since directed over 60 episodes for broadcast TV, including such hits as "Grey's Anatomy", "The Mentalist", "Brothers & Sisters", "Medium", "The Unit" and "Gilmore Girls". He is also a producer and director in the CW series "Hart of Dixie". Paymer lives in Santa Monica, Calf. with his wife and two daughters.


