Building a Better World Day at Sea Cliff School

The Sea Cliff School celebrated the beginning of fall with a day dedicated to collaborative outdoor learning and school community service work on Friday, October 17th. On this Building a Better World Day, school began with an opening assembly focused on the idea that actions speak louder than words. The school reviewed the Sea Cliff School Declaration of Environmental Respect and focused on the question: How can Sea Cliff School Build a Better Earth?

Over the course of the day, each grade level spent time outdoors, engaged in hands on learning.

Kindergarten students engaged in a discussion with their teachers in the Kindergarten courtyard about how they could prepare that space for fall. Students planted mums, and engaged in station activities regarding the type of apple they liked best. They also pasted the color of their favorite apple on a class survey poster and examined class preferences.

Grade 1 students engaged in beautifying the grade 1 pond and in helping to clean up the front of the building. They also discussed the benefit of completing outdoor work and creating a plan to work as a team.

Grade 2 students were instructed by Ms. Krupin in how to plant bulbs and students planted over 60 bulbs in the front of the school. Students then engaged in a Socratic discussion and read aloud



around the topic: what is our responsibility to nature?

Grade 3 students learned how to plant bulbs and students planted over 70 bulbs in the front of the school under the direction of Ms. Krupin. Students then engaged in a lesson about composting presented by Sherry Login, a Sea Cliff parent, and Debra Dumas, Sea Cliff Environmental Committee Member. Grade

3 is launching a composting initiative this week.

Grade 4 and Grade 5 students engaged in cleaning up the front of the school and working as a team to figure out how to move leaves with using tools that are powered by gasoline or electric. Students discussed the benefit of saving energy by doing work by hand as well as the physical benefits of outdoor work. At the end

of the experience, students discussed their team strategies.

The day ended with a closing assembly in which students spoke about what they learned over the course of the day. The message of "actions speak louder than words," was exemplified by students' own reflections.

Spinello is pleased to announce that this year's City of Glen Cove Veterans' Day Honoree is Alan Frederick LaMere, a member of the VFW James Donohue Post 347 and a proud veteran who served with the United States Navy. The City's Veterans' Day ceremonies will be on Nov. 11, at 11 a.m. at the Doughboy Monument on the corner at the Glen Cove Library.

Fred, as he is known around town, joined the Navy when he graduated from High School in 1955. He served on a fleet oiler whose assignments included fueling Navy ships in any of 21 countries including Lebanon in 1958. After the

Navy, Fred was employed as an aviator at Grumman Aerospace. Among his responsibilities was testing aviation equipment as well as calibrating the computer system on the LEM. THE VILLA PROJECT PUBLIC HEARING

WED., NOV. 5TH @ 8:00 PM

STOP GLEN COVE OVERDEVELOPMENT!

At this Hearing, which is a continuation of the previous one, the public will have an opportunity to voice their opinions and concerns regarding The Villa Project. If approved, it will be located on Glen Cove Avenue, on one of our only 2 corridors, proposes 194 units, and will be capable of housing approximately 776 occupants within a narrow, 2 block curving strip of land, on a dangerously steep hill. Are you aware of the following facts?

- All legislation passed by the City of Glen Cove must be filed with the Secretary of State, by law, in order for it to become effective. It has recently been discovered by watchdog residents that Glen Cove, over a period of years, neglected to follow that procedure. Therefore, all legislation passed by Glen Cove during that time frame, which was not filed with the Secretary of State, is probably null and void. The City has been informed that the Master Plan and its associated zoning changes fall into that category.
- The administration chooses to ignore these facts and continues to allow the process to proceed, violating our rights. ***Our elected officials and members of The Planning Board*** are responsible for decisions that will transform Glen Cove forever, into the Master Plan's "new suburbia", (i.e., an urban mass of high density, housing complexes with their associated problems), which will decrease the value of our homes and destroy our quality of life.
- Do not let them remain anonymous. The community should know the names of those who disregard our wishes. It is time you became familiar with their names and how they vote on these matters! Mayor: Reginald A. Spinello; City Council: Anthony Gallo Jr., Efraim Spagnoletti, Pamela Panzenbeck, Timothy Tenke, Michael Famiglietti, name of member to be elected on Nov. 4th; Planning Board: Thomas Scott (Chairman), Michael Bellissimo, John DiMascio, Patrick Hall, John Perrone, Robert Jakobsze, and John Maccarone.
- Despite the State Environmental Quality Review Analysis's warning, the City continues to ignore the totality of the effects arising from the following projects, thereby increasing our population by approximately 6,500 residents, (approx. 25%): The Villa (194 units), The Village Square Piazza (110 units), Carney St. Apts. (50 units), The Mews (Congregation Tifereth Israel - 72 Units), Garvies Point Waterfront Project (860 - 1110 units), North Manor Estates (Glen Cove Mansion - 46 units), and Sea Isle (8 units). There are also projects currently pending, under discussion: The Triangle (STAPLES), Konica Imaging, and Photocircuits sites, and now The Coles School. Will other projects also surface?
- The City grants developers and certain selected businesses, PILOTS, (Payments In Lieu Of Taxes), for long periods of time (up to 40 years), which are drastically lower than their normal, local taxes. The shortfall must be absorbed into the annual property taxes paid by the City's homeowners during the duration of the PILOT. New developments, like The Villa Project, will ask for, and may be granted PILOTS, burdening the taxpayer even more.

Now ask yourself the following questions:

- We, (the taxpayers), are subsidizing the developers who stand to make mega-millions on these projects! Why?
- Will The Villa Project and others like it, make Glen Cove and its surrounding communities, a more, or less desirable place to live?
- Will market conditions force the applicant to offer the units as rentals, not condos?
- Will its expected increase in traffic cause intolerable and dangerous traffic jams throughout Glen Cove?
- Will its enormous increase in student population raise our school taxes proportionately and require new schools to be built?
- How much will our property taxes be increased, in order to build the necessary, additional infrastructure it requires, and to provide the municipal services needed to sustain this population?
- Can members of the Planning Board and City Council freely vote their conscience, without fear of reprisal?
- Why has the City accepted the Applicant's inadequate solutions to the numerous, adverse, environmental impacts, defined by the SEQRA, rather than demanding their TOTAL ELIMINATION?
- Why did the Planning Board accept the Villa Project's inadequate Findings Statement and recommend specific density bonuses for the project to The City Council, knowing that its legal basis is questionable?
- Why didn't the city stop The Villa Project from continuing the application process, knowing that the developer had not paid his local property taxes in the amount of approx. \$300,000? His finances need to be currently investigated, thoroughly documented and totally revealed before any vote on the project can be taken.

The current administration **now** has the opportunity to rectify the misguided vision of past administrations, thereby taking responsibility for its own actions, starting with **The Villa Project**. Jekyll And Hyde the Musical at Star Playhouse in Commack

Starring Chris Saltalamacchio (Hicksville), Kelsey Gronda (Glenwood Landing), Steffy Jolin (Freeport), and featuring Frank Hendricks (Glen Cove).

There are Broadway musicals that are frothy and flimsy and there are those that are thrillers and haunt you long after you leave the theater. One of the most memorable with that kind of staying power is Jekyll & Hyde the classic tale based upon the novel by Robert Louis Stevenson. Jekyll & Hyde opened on Broadway in 1997, with 1543 performances over four years and was nominated for four Tony Awards. A local production of that time honored tale opens at Star Playhouse at the Suffolk Y-JCC on November 8.

For those unfamiliar, the story centers on Dr. Henry Jekyll (played by Chris Saltalamacchio of Hicksville) an aristocratic young Londoner who is fixated on his experiment to unearth the secrets of good versus evil, both of which he believe live in the souls of all mankind. His goal, to eliminate evil. Unable to convince the Board of Governors of St. Jude's Hospital to approve experimentation on a live patient, Dr.Jekyll decides he has no recourse but to experiment on himself. As the result of injecting these untried chemicals his evil self whom he refers to as Edward Hyde comes to the forefront, taking over his will and committing despicable acts of mayhem. Jekyll's conduct endangers his engagement to Emma Carew, his lovely fiancé (Kelsey Gronda of Glen-

wood Landing). The out of control Hyde develops an uncontrollable passion for and relationship with Lucy (Steffy Jolin of Freeport) a lady of the night and entertainer at The Red Rat a bawdyhouse managed by Nellie (Patrice Richardson of Northport), and secretly owned by Jekyll's rival for Emma and nemeses Simon Stride (Adiv BenDavid of Coram) whose evil side has no kinder and gentler alter ego. The Red Rat boasts a bevy of beauties of the night whose companionship is available for a price. Jekyll's inner turmoil is riveting and results in a battle of wills that tears him apart and forsakes any possibility of a happy ending. Songs that both move and uplift include "This Is The Moment", "Someone Like Me", "One Upon A Dream", "In His Eyes", "Bring On The Men", "Facade" and "Alive".

The show is directed by Rick Grossman of Middle Island, and produced by Tina Indenbaum of Smithtown and Barbara Schuler of Huntington.. Chris Rosselli of West Babylon is music director and Leia DePaolo of Dix Hills is choreographer. As are all Star Playhouse productions, the show is performed on a Broadway style set, is elaborately costumed and accompanied by a full live orchestra, sadly something no longer the case at many Long Island theaters.

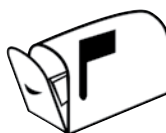

Dear Great Book Guru,

First, the Halloween Party and Parade Friday at 1pm on the front lawn of the Children's Library and then the next day- the Pet and Puppet Parade at 11am organized by Karen Kessler- what an exciting weekend here in Sea Cliff! Will I have time to read -please something short but, of course, meaningful? Lover of Pets, Puppets and Parties

Dear Pets, Puppets, and Party Lover, I have a beautifully written, very disturbing 200 page book that I highly recommend: THE CHILDREN ACT by Ian McEwan. Fiona is a highly respected English Family Court judge who deals with troubling cases of parental rights. Her own life is comfortable, but she is beginning to rethink past decisions and life choices. Her latest case involves a young man with leukemia whose treatment requires blood transfusions. He and his parents are devout Jehovah Witnesses so transfusions are out of the question.

Because he is a few months short of his eighteenth birthday, the court can supersede his wishes and it does. The transfusions take place, he recovers, his parents are secretly jubilant, and all is well....or so it seems. When he becomes estranged from both his religion and his parents, he reaches out to Fiona as a beacon of beauty and wisdom. While she tries to maintain a professional distance, she finds it more and more difficult as her affection grows. Yeats's "I was young and foolish, and now am full of tears" becomes the youth's refrain, and Fiona, while neither young nor foolish, is indeed full of tears by the end of the novel. Thought-provoking and highly recommended!



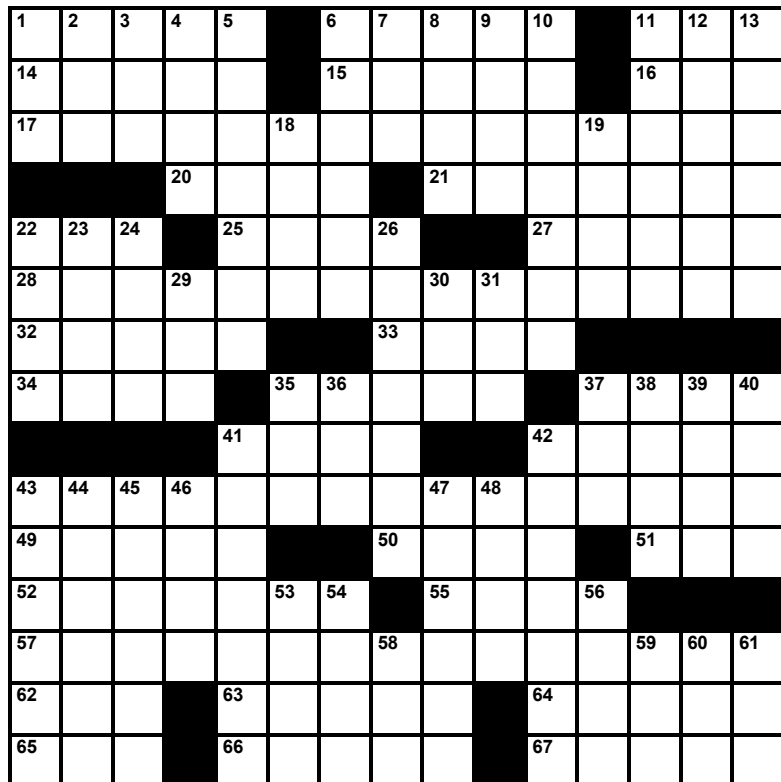

Last Week's Celebrity

This week's celebrity was an American dance, actor and politician. He was a true Yankee Doodle Dandy born on the 4th of July, in 1902, in New Haven, Connecticut. Before his film career began, he worked as a tool maker for the Ford Motor Company, a miner, a real estate agent and a night club dancer. In movies, he was famous as a song-and-dance man, from 1932 to 1952, appearing in many big-budget musicals as "Broadway Melody of 1938" with Eleanor Powell and Robert Taylor, "Broadway Melody of 1940" with Fred Astaire and Eleanor Powell and "For Me and My Gal" with Judy Garland and Gene Kelly. He danced his way through "Little Miss Broadway" (1938) with Shirley Temple, Jimmy Durante and Edna Mae Oliver. He was never nominated for an Oscar in any competitive category, but was awarded an honorary Academy award in 1951. He was the President of the Screen Actors Guild from 1944 to 1946. He was Vice-President of Lucille Ball's and

Corra Witherspoon. John Springer and Jack Hamilton, authors of "They Had Faces Then: Super Stars, Stars and Starlets of 1930" (1974), wrote that "Witherspoon was blessed with a face that might have been drawn by one of those cartoonists who specialize in dealing with the war between men and women." She played her patented society snoot to perfection in the Shirley Temple vehicle "Just Around the Corner" (1938) and was unequally unpleasant in "Dark Victory" (1939) with Bette Davis and George Brent. She was "Mrs. Van Adams" with Norma Shearer in George Cukor's "The Women" (1939). According to Tennessee Williams' 1975 autobiography, "Tennessee Williams: Memoirs", in 1941, he was a night shift operator at the Old Jacinto Hotel in Manhattan. At the time, Witherspoon was a guest and employed him to pick up her morphine prescription from the drugstore. A habit that apparently continued throughout her life. Though her home base was in NYC, where she continued to perform in the theater, she made her living commuting to Hollywood in the post-war years, ending her career with brief appearances on TV. She died in New Mexico, at the age of 1967, on Nov. 17, 1957.
