School District CPR Training Saved Student's Life

What seemed like a normal day at Finley Middle School turned out to be anything but that. School Security Guard Horace Townsend was in the cafeteria one afternoon during this past school year when he saw a student choking.

Because the School District requires security and custodial staff to receive CPR and First Aid training, Mr. Townsend's skills kicked in automatically. He immediately started performing the Heimlich maneuver on the sixth grade student. After a few thrusts, the blockage in his trachea was egested.

"I was glad to have been able to jump into action and help the young

man," Townsend said. "I'm thankful that the School District provided the training that enabled me to save him. The re-certification every few years kept the skills fresh in my mind so the my immediate reaction was like second nature."

Mr. Townsend's adult son Matthew happened to be visiting the school that afternoon and was in the cafeteria when the incident occurred. He ran to the main office to get the nurse and other help while his father performed CPR.

"What an honor to have saved someone's life," Nassau County Legislator Delia DeRiggi-Whitton said. "I'm sure this is

To Debate Or Not To Debate To The Editor,

The September 3rd mayoral debate scheduled between incumbent Reggie Spinello and challenger Tony Gallo, was deliberately, knowingly and willfully sidestepped by Mr. Gallo. Simply put, Mr. Gallo just plain didn't show-up as would have been hoped for by the hundred or so concerned voters present. This debate was not a charade nor a campaign rally Mr. Gallo. Mayor Spinello's showed positive and strong personal and professional traits and characteristics whereas your absence clearly did not do the same for you.

What we saw instead was a well poised, confident and articulate incumbent Mayor at the podium. He provided CEO level quantitative and qualitative data and information to the voters on a variety of unscripted questions ranging between illegal housing, quality of life, taxes, the waterfront, water-borne taxi service, the disposition of the Coles School, senior citizens, and short / long term community development. He was clear, concise and convincing while not personally attacking Mr. Gallo in his absence.

The vacant "Anthony Gallo" podium denied voters a spirited purpose of democracy. One might think that those like Mr. Gallo hoping to win a mayoral office would do so out of a desire to be in sync with the voters at every possible public gathering. Not so in Mr. Gallo's case!!!

Perhaps your readers on both sides of the aisle might agree that Mr. Gallo's decision not to appear may have been driven by self-preservation. Is it possible he had no interest in any two-way exchanges or to be in a position where he might be challenged or face controversy on issues he created?

Your readers might agree also that Mr. Gallo's political strategists realized that such a debate would not be a situation or venue in which Mr. Gallo would be successful where unscripted questions would be posed from neutral moderator John Canning and/or from the audience. Historically and traditionally declining to debate may have worn down much of the trust and confidence supporting voters might have otherwise had for Mr. Gallo. Maybe some of your readers might see Mr. Gallo's refusal to debate as a sign of disregard for the political process we enjoy in Glen Cove???

There stood Glen Cove Mayor Reginald Spinello at his podium ready to debate on Sept. 3. Next to him was another podium reserved for City Councilman Anthony Gallo Jr. that remained empty. With an estimated 100 voters in the audience, was this an unagreed-upon date for a "debate" arranged by the mayor or a subsequent "rally" for him as his challenger termed

it? Actually, today's "primary" leading to the city's general mayoral election in November goes ahead as scheduled. It means Spinello the incumbent vs. Gallo the challenger. May the best man win, of course.

Residents are urging Mayor Spinello to intervene because negotiations between the two well-meaning organizations have faltered. But he refuses, saying "It's none of the city's business." Gallo, a physical education teacher in the Glen Cove School District, disagrees. He has stated publicly, "I want the YMCA to remain right where it is" on Dosis Lane. There you have it.

Car-less Long Island meeting on September 16



Car-less Long Island, a new pedestrian, bicyclist, and alternative transportation advocacy group founded in Long Island this summer, will hold its monthly meetings on the second Wednesday of every month at 7:30. The next two meetings are on September 16th and October 14th. Meetings will be held at the Ethical Humanist Society of Long Island, 38 Old Country Road, Garden City.

Founder Sylvia Silberger said she started the group in response to a 2014 report by the Tri-State Transportation Campaign indicating that half of the top 21 most deadly roadways for pedestrians are in Long Island and to trends she has observed that cut service and raise fares for the

public bus system. "The under-representative members of our society who are completely reliant on alternative forms of transportation are finding themselves facing increasingly insurmountable obstacles," says Dr. Silberger, a math professor at Hofstra University who lives in Hempstead. Car-less Long Island is also concerned with the effects of greenhouse gas emissions that are bringing about catastrophic climate change. "We need to wean ourselves from individual automobiles as our sole means of transportation," she says.

The group plans to advocate for safer streets for both pedestrians and bicyclists, to advocate for reliable and affordable public transportation options and to encourage Long Islanders to try alternative forms of transportation. Silberger says the group will design campaigns to raise public awareness and sympathies and lobby local politicians and public officials on these issues. Prior to the new school year, members of the Glen Cove Board of Education appointed Benjamin Roberts as principal of Landing Elementary School, Alexa Doeschner as assistant principal of Glen Cove High School and Allison Hernandez as the district's director of special education.

Roberts comes to the district from the Shenendehowa Central School District, where he was principal of Arongen Elementary School for five years. He also served as assistant principal of Watervliet Elementary School in the Watervliet City School District from 2007-2009. Prior to his administrative positions, Roberts was employed for seven years as a fifth-grade teacher in the South Colonie Central School District. He holds a Bachelor of Science in elementary/early secondary education with a concentration in social studies from SUNY Cortland, a Master of Liberal Studies from Stony Brook University and a School District Administrator certificate from the Massachusetts College of Liberal Arts.

Doeschner is a Glen Cove resident who most recently served as assistant principal and testing and technology coordinator at Sunset Park High School in Brooklyn. members to ensure educational success for students. Her educational background includes a Bachelor of Arts in biology from Columbia University, a Master of Science in teaching from Pace University and a School Building Leader certificate from Columbia University's Summer Principal's Academy. Contractor Agrees to Replace Track

As our community knows, we have experienced ongoing problems related to the installation of the new track at North Shore High School. During the course of this installation and subsequent to the opening of the track, district officials identified a number of unacceptable flaws that required correction in order for the track to meet expected contractual standards. In addition - and as part of its normal assessment of our facilities - the district's insurers have periodically reviewed the facilities to determine that they are safe for use by the students, staff and community. They, too, identified the same serious conditions of concern with the track.

As we previously noted to the community, these conditions were promptly brought to the attention of the

contractor responsible for installation. Counsel for the District has successfully negotiated a settlement agreement regarding the track in which Landtek, the general contractor, has agreed to replace the track at North Shore High School at no cost to the School District.

The Board of Education has opted to spend an additional \$41,200 to further upgrade the quality of track surface beyond the original project specifications in an attempt to secure the highest degree of community satisfaction for this important resource.

Work to replace the track has begun and we anticipate that the new track will be installed in time for the Spring track season. The District has made alternate arrangements for the fall sports season. We will continue to keep the public informed as to the progress of track replacement. Thank you for your continued patience.

Principal Ferris prepared them for their first year of middle school by introducing them to teachers and staff as well as explained their team colors and schedules. Additionally,

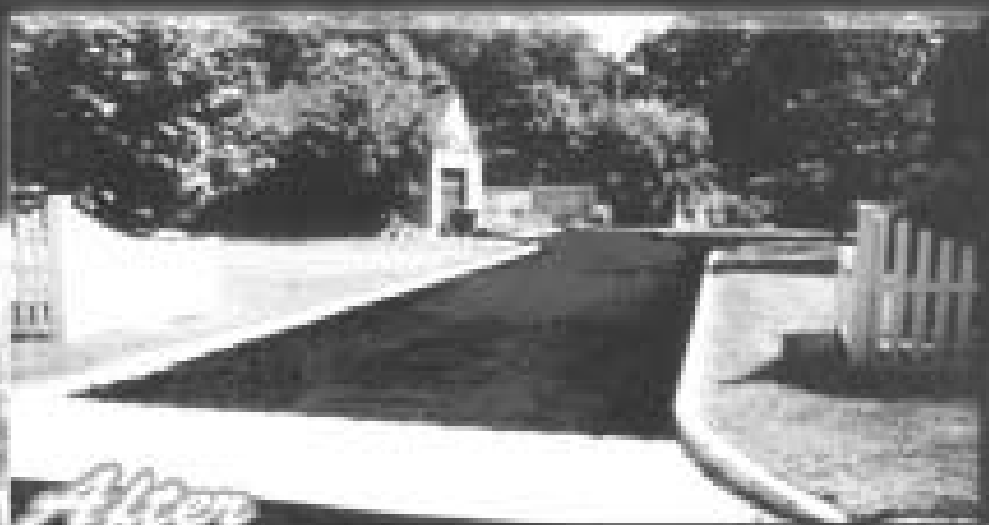

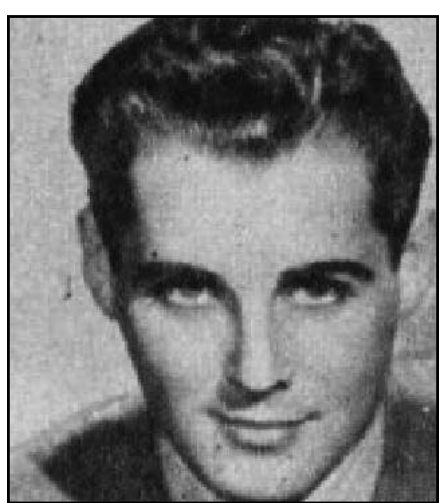

1936, he played his highest profile role, as Buffalo Bill in Cecil B. DeMille's "The Plainsman", which starred Gary Cooper and Jean Arthur.

Last Week's Celebrity

This week's celebrity was born on May 4, 1910 in Guthrie Center, Iowa. Between 1932 and 1962, he appeared in nearly 70 films. He worked for a time in a film laboratory and while there, he was offered a screen test. He developed it himself and when he saw it, he decided it was not satisfactory, so he would not show it to the editor. However, the director managed to see it anyway, and our celebrity got a contract. Despite his rugged good looks and height of 6 feet 3 inches, his limited range and somewhat wooden screen presence kept him from the first, or even second, ranks of stardom. He spent much of his career in westerns, including a stint in the mid-thirties as the sidekick of "Hopalong Cassidy", played by William Boyd, in Paramount's successful series. In 1938, he played a charming, romantic character opposite 26 year old Lucille Ball in the RKO Pictures comedy, "Next Time I Marry", a film in which Ball had her first top screen credit. Before that, in

Last week's celebrity was J. Farrell MacDonald. In 1918, when he gave up directing and was acting full-time, he predominately worked in westerns and Irish comedies. He first worked under director John Ford in 1919's "A Fight for Love" with Harry Carey, Sr. and was to make three more with the director that same year. In all Ford would use MacDonald on twenty-five films between 1919 and 1950, during the silent era notably "The Iron Horse" (1924), "3 Bad Men" (1926), and "Reilly the Cop" (1927). In the 1940s, he was part of Preston Sturges' unofficial "stock company" of character actors, appearing in seven films and directed by Sturges. Some of those films were "Sullivan's Travels" with Joel MacRea, "The Palm Beach Story" with Claudette Colbert, "The Miracle of Morgan's Creek" with Betty Hutton and "The Beautiful Blonde From Bashful Bend" with Betty Grable, Sturges' last American film. He made his last film in 1951, which was a comedy called "Elopement" with Anne Francis, Clifton Webb and Charles Bickford. He died of natural causes, on Aug. , 1952, at the age of 77.

- 7) Both sides of Sea Cliff Avenue from Locust Avenue to Prospect Avenue;
- 8) Both sides of Ninth Avenue from Summit Avenue to Roslyn Avenue and be it further

RESOLVED, that parking shall be prohibited from the hours of 6:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. on the date of the Mini-Mart on the South side of Glen Avenue between Main Avenue and Prospect Avenue; and be it further

Hempstead Harbor Sewering Study Begins

Nassau County Legislator Delia DeRiggi-Whitton is pleased to announce that Nassau County has finalized a contract with the chosen consultant, D & B Engineers and Architects (formerly Dvirka and Bartilucci), to begin a Sewering Feasibility study for eastern Hempstead Harbor. The study will cover unsewered areas of Glen Cove, Sea Cliff, Glenwood Landing and Roslyn Harbor. The study is expected to take six to eight months to complete.

Legis. DeRiggi-Whitton said, "This is step in the right direction to reopen Crescent Beach. The study will give us the information and designs to begin

attaching those unsewered homes in Crescent Beach area to the Glen Cove sewer system. This is a harbor-wide problem - over 70% of the land area around the Harbor contains homes that are not connected to a central sewer system. These homes have individual onsite systems, mostly cesspools. Nitrogen and pathogens from old, failing, or unmaintained systems are sources of pollution not only to the Harbor but to our drinking water aquifer. Finding solutions to this problem has been a focus for me. I look forward to participating in this study."

The Pym conference is always a highlight of the year for the many Sea Cliff Pymians and this year was no exception. Meeting up amidst the spires of Oxford with friends from around the world and listening as scholars and fans discuss the finer points of a beloved author's works- what can be better than this? Today I am going to recommend one of her lesser known novels: NO FOND RETURN OF LOVE. Set in post World War II London, the book tells the story of Dulcie Mainwaring, a thirty year-old woman working for the pompous albeit handsome academician Alywin Forbes. While she is gently obsessed with him, we the readers quickly realize he is a

tediously arrogant philanderer - certainly not worthy of the lovely Dulcie. As in all Pym's novels, the plot is secondary to her cleverly humorous descriptions of people, places, and custom. Those wonderful distractions that fill our lives are presented here in exquisite detail. As the noted attorney Paul Marchese remarked- this is a perfect title for a perfect Pym piece. Highly recommended as are all twelve Pym novels!

the New York State Board of Regional Association President's (BRAP) Vice President.

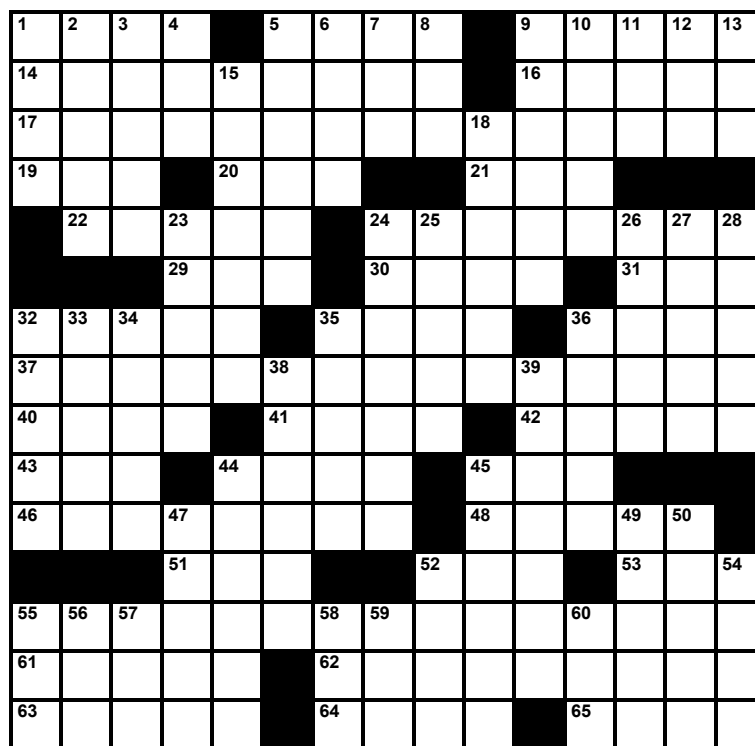
