

Spinello Wins Glen Cove Primary

Voters in Glen Cove went to the polls on Sept. 10, 2015, and cast their ballot in an unprecedented three-party mayoral and city council primary. This historic primary's results as of press time are as follows: Glen Cove Mayor Reggie Spinello defeated his challenger, City Councilman Tony Gallo, Jr., to secure the Republican designation on the ballot for this November's election. Also earning a spot on the Republican line are: Councilwoman Pam Panzenbeck; Councilman Joe Capobianco; Nick DiLeo, Jr.; and Kristina Heuser. The Independence Party line includes Mayor Reggie Spinello; Councilman Joe Capobianco; Councilwoman Pam Panzenbeck, Councilmen Tim Tenke and Mike Famigliette; Nick DiLeo, Jr.; and Kristina Heuser. The Nassau County Board of Elections is still canvassing the ballots for the Conservative Party line and two positions on the Republican Party line. Mayor Spinello is the mayoral candidate endorsed by the Republican, Independence, Conservative, and Democrat parties before the September primary.

Mayor Spinello said, "I am truly grateful to the voters of our great city for giving me a resounding vote of confidence in the primary. During my first term in office, I have worked tirelessly to make our City the best place to live, work and raise a family. We have tackled illegal housing issues, brought back businesses and jobs, held the line on taxes, cut commercial taxes, and restored pride in our municipal employees. I plan to continue these efforts while keeping a close eye on taxpayer dollars. I look forward to voter support in November." Glen Cove's registered voters will head back to the polls on Election Day, Tuesday, November 3, 2015.

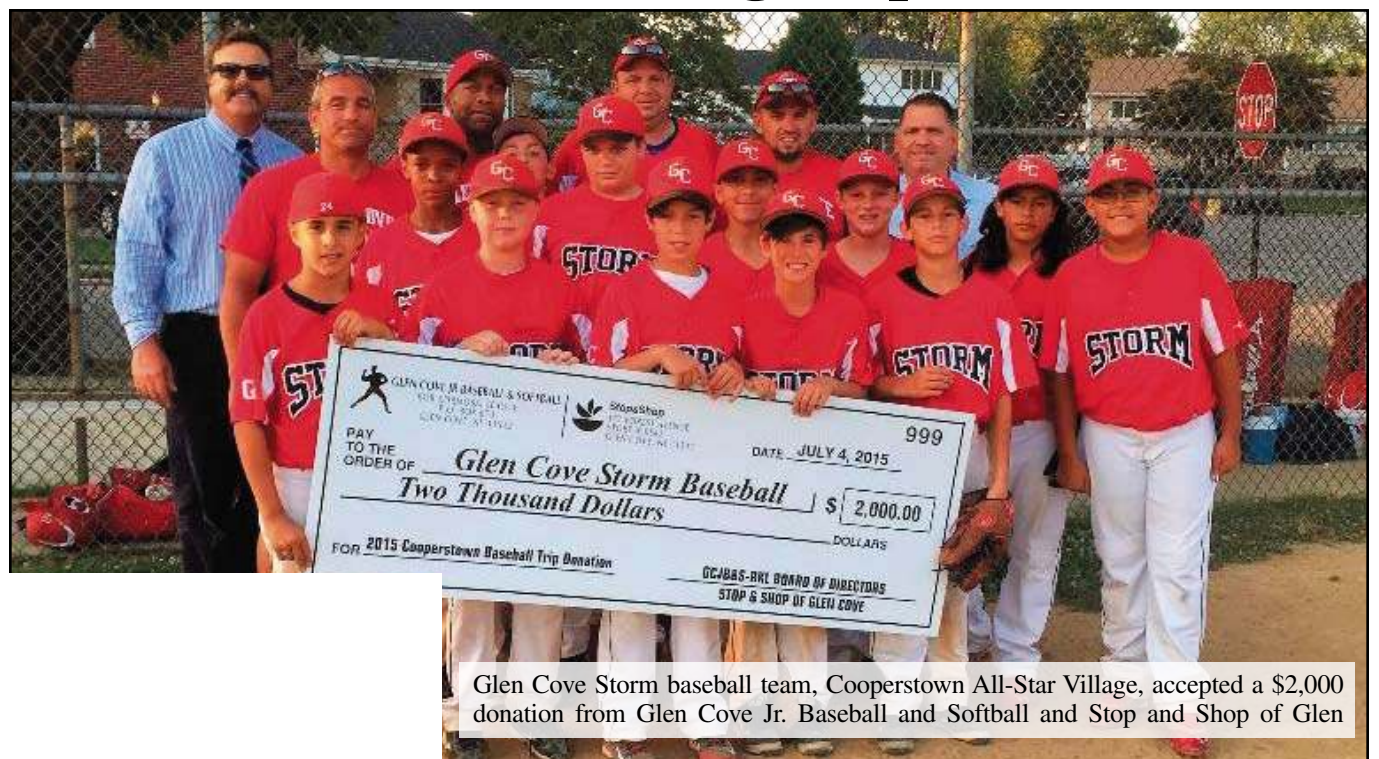

Primary Results To The Editor,

Many people have been asking me the outcome of the primary held on September 10th-

Only 989 Republicans, 129 Independents and 38 Conservatives came out to vote of the more than 15,000 registered Glen Cove Voters. However,

it bears noting that more than half of the 15,000 couldn't vote because they were either unaffiliated or registered Democrats and therefore did not have a primary in which to participate. Team Gallo's candidate for Mayor - Tony Gallo - received, in the former order, 42.16%, 38.6% and 50% of the vote - and our slate for City Council (Team Gallo) received 41.5%, 41.02% and 47.22% of the vote: a very respectable showing... particularly when you consider that our slate of candidates were write-ins on the Independence and Conservative ballots. THIS MEANS THAT THE CURRENT MAYOR -REGGIE SPINELLO- WILL BE RUNNING AS A DEMOCRAT, A REPUBLICAN AND AN INDEPENDENT ON ELECTION DAY- NOV 3rd, and perhaps for the Conservative Party line as well depending upon how their bylaws choose to break the tie.

Two of our City Council candidates were selected (by those that voted) for the November 3rd General Election Republican ballot, - current Councilman Efraim Spagnoletti and Roderick Watson.

In an effort to allow all of the voters in Glen Cove to have a choice for their City Government, regardless of the Primary outcomes, in early August Team Gallo submitted a petition for the forming of our own party, GLEN COVE UNITED, to the Nassau County Board of Elections (BOE) with well more than the signatures required by law. However, in yet another lawsuit, the opposition has sued us and the BOE to stop us from being on the ballot. This lawsuit goes before the judge on Sept 22nd. I and my running mates, Tony Gallo, John Perrone, Roderick Watson, Efraim Spagnoletti, Carlos Shimabukuro, and Flip Pidot are confident the Judge will yet again rule in our favor, as he has each and every time, and "Glen Cove United" will be a line on the November 3rd General Election Ballot. Current Mayor Spinello and his team submitted a similar petition to form their own party line with less than the required signatures and it was challenged as insufficient. This too is awaiting a ruling.

I think it bears mentioning that I am disgusted with the flagrantly illegal behavior exhibited by members of the opposition and/or their supporters during the entirety of the Primary. Starting at 6 am, September 10th I received a text alerting me to the fact that members of the opposing team had gone to vote and decided to stay and chat with their friends while in the polling places. (Everyone knows that electioneering is illegal and must be conducted a minimum of 100 feet from the polling places) but our lawyers had to complain to the BOE headquarters who then informed the BOE poll watchers to remove the other candidates from the polling places... This occurred all day long... as well as other disturbing lapses of acceptable

behavior. BOE poll workers at multiple locations told members of our legal team that they'd been instructed by the GOP chairman to withhold legitimate ballot instructions and/or to inform voters (inaccurately) that there were no eligible write-in candidates.

Our lawyers were kept very, very busy. This entire process has been marred by illegal behavior: Repeatedly stealing and destroying our signs while the opposition's signs remain put. Some might find that laughable. I think the law finds it to be grand larceny as well more than \$1000 worth of materials have been stolen. Stealing our signs and placing them on unsupportive properties so that Team Gallo would garner negative publicity was also a tactic. I guess some people feel it's ok to lie and cheat and

steal... whatever happened to honor, fair play and being able to win on your merits? This is not a Third World military junta where the voting process is subverted to achieve a victory for the current administration. As American Citizens and registered voters it is our Constitutional right to vote without interference or subversion. This process and our City can only be fixed from the inside. I hope the voters of Glen Cove agree with me and vote for the GLEN COVE UNITED line on November 3rd.

Local singer songwriter, Vinny St Marten was seven years old when he lost his sight. Vinny was the youngest of sixteen children, in a family which was in his words "riddled with violence, abuse and alcoholism."

Vinny was born with glaucoma, which caused him to gradually lose his sight, but today Vinny describes his blindness as a gift that allows him to not prejudge people by what they are wearing, the

color of their skin or other outward appearances, but to accept them for who they really are inside.

He wants to teach this hard earned message to everybody, but especially to youth, so Vinny and his fellow musician, Elysa Sunshine, a bass player, have developed a program called The Blind Truth, A Musical Journey, a multi-media motivational program.

Sea Cliff in the Sixties by Sara Reres, Museum Director

The Sea Cliff Village Museum will host a 1960s party on Friday night, October 9, 2015 to celebrate the opening of a new exhibit, Sea Cliff in the Sixties. From 7 to 9 pm with wine, cheese and music the public is invited to wander through the clothing, art, photographs and artifacts from the Sixties. Featuring color and black and white photos from former Sea Cliff resident photographer, Bertram W. Scholes, the times are brought to life with his photos of the streets of the village and the people of half a century ago. Put on your old bell-bottoms and fringed vests and join the museum staff for a nostalgic trip back in time.

Sculpture and collage from Sea Cliff artist Katie Seiden, capture the spirit, color and turbulence of the 1960s. In a 1969 pastel of the harbor, the artist's portrayal of the tranquil side of the village is an interesting contrast.

The exhibit includes original Rudi Gernreich clothing, and black and white photos of 1966 hurricane, Esther that was the first hurricane to be discovered by satellite imagery. Before and after photos of Sea Cliff's Bathing Pavilion show the devastating effects of the fire that destroyed it in 1965.

Original posters from the first art shows

and Minimart and color photos of the art displayed in shop windows and street corners are an interesting complement to the pill box hats, tie-dyed shirts, dashikis and other paraphernalia from the times.

Glasses, original postcards, and plates from the 1964-65 World's Fair in Flushing New York are also on display. Life Magazine covers reflect the times with articles on RFK and the Vietnam War.

Many of us remember the days when bomb shelters were being stocked and built and radiation and protection from it were frequent topics of discussion. The exhibit has many original pamphlets that warn citizens of the danger of radiation and how to protect themselves from its harmful effects. Instructions for building a family bomb shelter and fallout protection are frightening reminders of the past.

The photos of the streets of Sea Cliff are adorned with the colorful classic cars of the 1950s and 1960s, which were the cars we all drove every day.

Assemblyman Lavine Presents Program on Ethics and Policy at Glen Cove Public Library

On September 30th at 7pm, Assemblyman Charles Lavine will be at Glen Cove Public Library at 4 Glen Cove Ave, to give a presentation on lawmaking and ethics in New York State Government.

The Program entitled "Albany 101," is an educational presentation about New York State Government that is broken into two parts: How a Bill Becomes a Law and Ethics in the New York State Legislature.

The first part of the program will describe the process in which legislators introduce bills and pass laws. Assemblyman Lavine will take his audience to the very inception of the legislative process, by describing how ideas for new legislation come about, how to engage other lawmakers to generate interest in a bill, the committee approval process and how a bill is brought to the floor for a vote.

The second part of the program, entitled "Ethics in the New York State Legislature" describes the various entities that have been created to monitor the ethical conduct of legislators. Assemblyman Lavine will rely on his insight as Chair of the Assembly Standing Committee on Ethics and Co-Chair of the Legislative Ethics Commission. The Assemblyman will field questions at the conclusion of his presentation, and each participant will go home with an informational packet detailing the inner workings of Albany.

"It is my belief that the more citizens know about the functions of state government, the better equipped they will be to participate in and influence the policymaking process," said Lavine.

Currently Lavine has been scheduled to present the program in 11 libraries across Nassau County.

Name the Celebrity



This week's celebrity was born on March 3, 1913, in New York City, to a Jewish acting family. He began his career on Broadway in 1939 and appeared in five plays in the next six years, including "One Touch of Venus", a musical, loosely spoofing the Pygmalion myth and "Stalag 17" before the film adaptation was made. He made his motion picture debut in the Alan Ladd film noir classic "The Blue Dahlia" (1946), co-starring William Bendix and Veronica Lake. In 1949, he co-starred in the short lived live TV sitcom "The Hartmans". He then went on to work in small memorable roles in such films as "The Harder They Fall" (1956) with Humphrey Bogart, in Alfred Hitchcock's "The Wrong Man" (1956) with Henry Fonda and Vera Miles, "Spartacus" (1960) with Kirk Douglas and "The Greatest Story Ever Told" (1965) with Max von Sydow, Dorothy McGuire and Claude Rains in his last film appearance.

for the role of "Bart Maverick" in the TV series "Maverick" which ran on ABC from 1957 to 1962. Kelly shared the series, rotating as the lead from week to week, first with James Garner, as "Bret Maverick" (1957-1960), then with Roger Moore as "Beau Maverick" (1960-61) and Robert Colbert as "Brent Maverick" (1961 for two episodes), before becoming the only "Maverick" (alternating with reruns from the Garner era in the fifth season).

When "Maverick" ended in 1962, Kelly continued acting with roles in a number of films and TV shows. In 1962, he played the lead in "Red Nightmare" (also known as "The Commies Are Coming, The Commies Are Coming" in its derivative 1985 video re-release incarnation), a Cold War film narrated by Jack Webb, in which Kelly's character wakes up one morning to discover that America has been taken over by Communists. He appeared on TV's "Wagon Train", "Mission: Impossible!", "The Hardy Boys/Nancy Drew Mysteries" (1978) and reprised his role as "Bart Maverick" one last time in the TV movie, "The Gambler Returns: The Luck of the Draw", a Kenny Rogers vehicle.

As the roles became less frequent, he became involved in real estate and politics. During the 1980s and early 1990s, he served as councilman and mayor of Huntington Beach, California. On May 28, 1992, he suffered a heart attack and on Nov. 7, 1992 of a stroke.

This chapter shall be known as the abandoned, lost and stolen property ordinance of the City of Glen Cove. §72-2 Property Clerk.

The Chief of Police of the City of Glen Cove shall appoint a Property Clerk. The Property clerk shall take charge of all property:

- (1) Alleged to have been lost or abandoned;
- (2) Alleged to have been stolen or suspected to have been stolen;
- (3) Suspected of being the proceeds of crime:

- (A) Which shall be delivered into the custody of the police department;
- (B) Which shall be ordered into the custody of the police department by any court.

§72-3 Recording of Abandoned, Lost and Stolen Property.

- (1) All property that comes into the custody of the Glen Cove Police Department shall be duly indexed by a reference numbering system that shall be created and implemented by the Property Clerk.
- (2) All property that comes into the custody of the Glen Cove Police Department shall be duly recorded by the Property Clerk in a dedicated book, which shall contain:
 - (A) The name and address from whom the property was taken;
 - (B) A description of the property;
 - (C) The time and place of the seizure and

the circumstances;

- (D) The name of the police officer or public servant who delivered the property.

§72-4 Advertisement. Every three (3) months the Property Clerk shall publish in the official newspaper of Glen Cove a list of the property held for the benefit of all persons interested and for the information of the public.

§72-5 Sales of Property at auction. All property, in the custody of the Property Clerk for longer than six (6) months, over which no ownership has been established by the Glen Cove Police Department, shall then be sold at auction upon ten (10) days notice. Said notice shall be advertised to the public, clearing stating:

- (1) The location of the auction;
- (2) The time of the auction;
- (3) A description of the property to be auctioned;
- (4) If the property is offered for sale on an Internet auction website the Uniform Resource Locator (URL) of the online auction website shall also be published. What is deemed as a successful bid is at the discretion of the Chief of Police or his designee. In the event the Chief of Police determines the winning bidder failed to comply with the terms of the sale, he may reject the bid.

§72-6 Unsold Property at auction. In the event that the property is not successfully sold at auction the Property Clerk may:

- (1) Offer the property for sale at a subsequent public auction;
- (2) Offer the property for sale privately;
- (3) Dispose of the property for public purposes in the best interests of the city;
- (4) Dismantle or destroy the property.

§72-7 Disposition of funds. All proceeds derived from the sale of the property at auction shall go to the City Controller accompanied by a report stating the sales price and any reasonable expenses incurred by the city in the preservation and disposition of the property.

§72-8 Notice to known owners or claimants.

- (1) Three months before the expiration of the period applicable to the property in question, as specified in subdivision seven of Article 7-B. Lost and Found Property, §253, if the property has not been delivered to the owner as provided in §254, the police shall give notice to the owner, if known, and to any person they have reason to believe has an interest in the property, if the address or a former address of such owner or person is known, and to all persons who have made claim to the property, and to the finder and any person who has filed notice asserting the right of the finder as provided in Article 7-B §256.
- (2) Such notice shall be in writing and shall be served personally or sent by certified mail to the last known address of the person to whom it is sent and shall state, in substance:
 - (a) that if within three months after the date of personal service or mailing of the notice the owner does not claim the property, and if at the end of such three months no action is pending to determine rights to such property, written notice of which action was served upon the police having custody of the property, the property will be delivered to the finder or, if he establish his right, to a person entitled to assert the right of the finder as provided in Article 7-B §256; and
 - (b) that if at the expiration of three months and ten days after the date of the personal service or mailing of the notice, the owner has not claimed the property and the finder, or a person entitled to assert the right of the finder as provided in Article 7-B §256, has not demanded delivery of it, and no action is pending to determine rights to such property, notice of which was served upon the police having custody of the property, it will be sold at public auction.

§72-9 Exceptions. The provisions of this chapter shall not apply to property within the custody of Nassau County Police Department. Tina Pemberton City Clerk

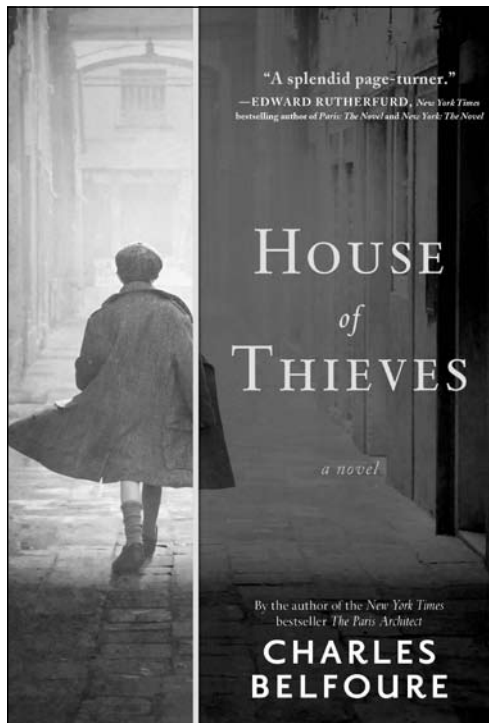

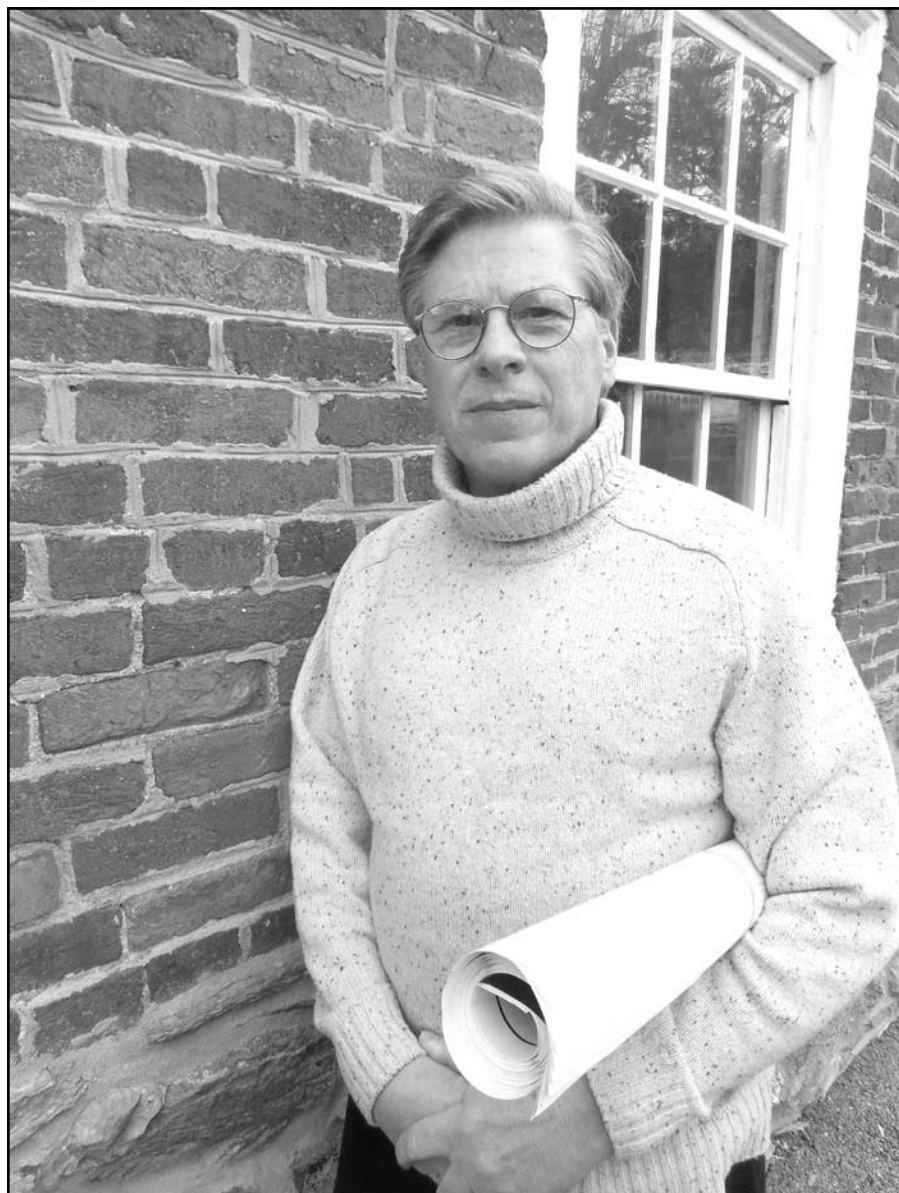

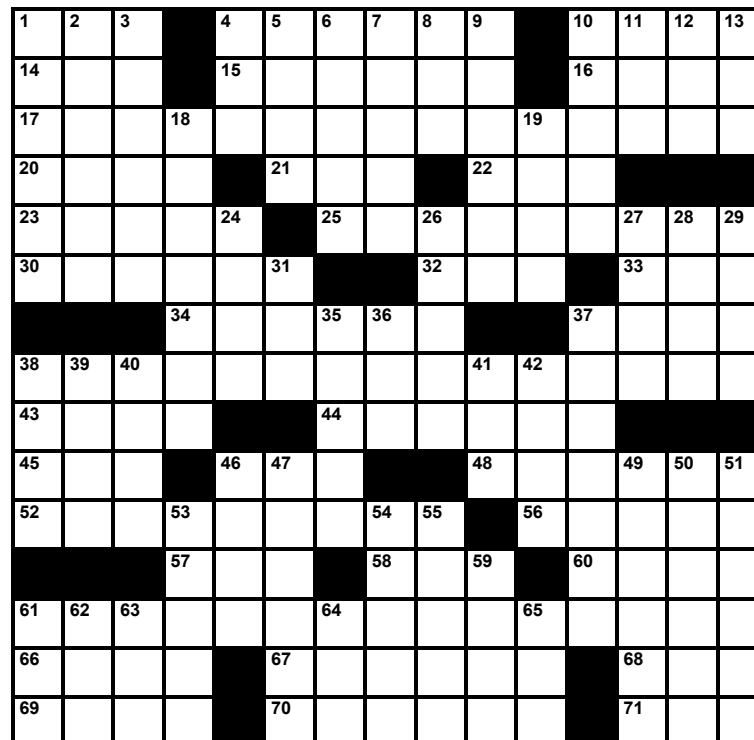
