

As part of the Glen Cove's Single Stream Recycling program's "All In. One. Bin." City residents can now recycle more items and the holidays are the perfect time to take advantage of this new effort. "In the first four months of our Single Stream Recycling program we have seen a 30% increase in our City's commitment to recycling," said Mayor Reggie Spinello. "With the holidays upon us it's a great time to be on Santa's nice list by thinking green.3


"When unwrapping holiday gifts, keep your recycling bin nearby to collect all of the wrapping paper (paper not metallic), cardboard boxes and paper gift bags and tags," said Doug Poncet, Department of Sanitation Supervisor. "I call it Santa's Blue Bin and we can each do our part to recycle not only the holiday paper goods but also all of the cans, bottles and aluminum trays used in holiday entertaining."

To stay on Santa's nice list this season, consider recycling the following holiday items: cards and envelopes, gift and cardboard boxes, non-metallic wrapping and tissue paper, paper bags and nonmetallic gift bags and old plastic toys. Santa's Naughty list which features non-recyclable items which should be disposed of with regular garbage; those items include plastic wrap, bubble wrap, packing peanuts, ribbons and bows, and metallic bags and wrapping paper.

And, don't forget that Glen Cove Beautification also sponsors free Christmas Tree mulching at our Chip-A-Tree Event which will be held on Saturday, January 9th from 8:30 am until 12:00 noon at the Morgan Park parking lot. The first 50 residents will receive free evergreen saplings to plant at their homes and everyone can enjoy free coffee and donuts. ## **Deasy School Students Learn to Code**

Glen Cove students at Deasy Elementary School received a lesson in coding during their recent STEM classes.

During the second-grade lesson, which was taught by STEM teacher Jessica Cialeo, students learned that computers and electronic devices do not have a brain and cannot think for themselves. Therefore, people called computer scientists need to "write" directions for the devices so they can perform tasks. The children were then introduced to coding and given guided practice using Code.org and the iPad applications Kodable and Daisy the Dinosaur. The students thoroughly enjoyed using the apps to create block coding, which allowed them to move BB8, a Star Wars: The Force Awakens character on their iPad screens.

Cialeo's lesson was coordinated as part of Computer Science Education Week and the Hour of Code, which is a global movement that reaches tens of millions of students in more than 180 countries. Deasy Principal Ken Craft and Assistant Superintendent for Curriculum, Instruction and Technology Dr. Michael Israel attended the lesson and assisted the children in their assignment.

District elementary students in Ken Altamirano and Cheryl Carmody's STEM classes also participated in grade level appropriate coding lessons as part of the Hour of Code celebration.



### Leg. DeRiggi-Whitton Hosts Narcan Training.

Whether peer pressure, curiosity or boredom is to blame is irrelevant. What is relevant and critical is the fact that heroin addiction, overdoes and heroinrelated deaths are a result of an epidemic that is growing on Long Island faster than many other areas of our country.

Heroin-related deaths are growing the fastest among those under age 21 and this drug knows no social, economic or other barriers. Honors students, athletes and even children as young as 12 are experimenting with this highly addictive drug that costs less than a pack of cigarettes to purchase.

Narcan, or naloxone hydrochloride, is an opiate antidote injection that reverses an opioid overdose. Emergency medical professionals have used Narcan for decades. Now, every Nassau County police officer is trained to administer this live saving medication.

To help save the lives of people who are overdosing from heroin, Nassau County Legislator Delia DeRiggi-Whitton is cohosting a Narcan training session with fellow Legislator Don MacKenzie. The session is scheduled for Wednesday, January 27, 2016 from 7:00 – 9:00 p.m. in the North Shore High School auditorium, 450 Glen Cove Avenue, Glen Head. Note that all attendees must pre-register by emailing elaikin@nassaucountyny.gov. Anyone age 18 or older can register for the training, which also covers warning signs of drug addiction, treatment options, personal stories of recovery and administering life-saving Narcan injections. There is no fee and each trainee will receive a free Narcan kit, which contain two prefilled syringes of naloxone (Narcan), two atomizers for nasal administration, sterile gloves and a booklet on the use of the drug. A 2006 New York State law allows citizens to administer Narcan without fear of liability.

The County has provided Narcan training for over 4,000 people in the past three years. Dozens of these trainees have already saved lives of overdosing people. While the program is clearly not the same as stemming the epidemic, it is certainly a step in the right direction.

Nassau County and the Long Island Crisis Center offer a mental health substance abuse helpline that operates 24/7. Call 516-227-TALK (8255) if you or someone you know has substance abuse concerns. 


## IAC Celebrates the Holidays at The View Grill

"An exceptional educator with 30 years in diverse teaching and leadership positions in both public and independent education, Andrea brings a rich understanding of the educational landscape and the learning needs of today's students," Del Vecchio added.

For Kelly, the rigorous interview process ultimately reinforced her belief that Friends Academy was the next step of her journey, as well as theirs. "In my short time on campus, I felt an immediate and positive connection to the many people I met, including students, parents, faculty, staff and school leaders," she recalled. "As I made my way through more than 30 meetings, it became abundantly clear that the members of the Friends community had a strong sense of the kind of leader their next head should be, on a personal level and for the school."

Andrea began her career as a Special Education teacher, which became an important factor in her understanding of the different ways in which students learn. After additional experience as a public elementary school teacher, she became the Director of Maple Street School in Brooklyn, and in 1996 began what has become a 20-year tenure at The Packer Collegiate Institute in Brooklyn, a Pre-Kindergarten through grade 12 school of 1,028 students. A graduate of the State University of New York at Geneseo, where she earned a bachelor's degree in Special Education, Kelly went on to Nazareth College where she was awarded a Master of Science degree in Education. She and her husband, Tim, are the parents of two children, a daughter, Julia, age 23, and a son Daniel, age 21. Kelly will begin her term on July 1, 2016.

"I am proud to serve Friends Academy for this reason – holding true to the Quaker testimony of equality, Friends Academy has taken an important step in selecting a female head as the next leader for the school. Just as the men who have come before me, I intend to serve as a strong, just and caring leader for the entire community.



## Name the Celebrity



This week's celebrity name may not come quickly to the reader's mind, even though her face may be familiar, such is the fate of the character actor. She was an English stage and screen actress, born in London on July 25, 1863. Her first stage appearance was at London's Daly's Theatre in 1894. Her first American performance came the following year at the NYC Broadway Theatre where she sang in a light opera "An Artist's Model". She traveled back and forth between England and the U.S. over the next few years and performed on both stages. Her first American film was in 1912, a short, "A Mardi Gras Mix-Up". After several "silents", she successfully joined the "talkies" in such roles as "Lady Kitty Melrose" in Samuel Goldwyn's 1930 Pre-Code comedymystery version of "Raffles" starring Ronald Coleman. She was "Countess" in "Madame Racketeer" (1932) with George Raft and as the "Duchess" in the 1933 version of "Alice in Wonderland" with a parade of notables including Cary Grant, Edna Mae Oliver, Gary Coper and Edward Everett Horton. She was "Miss Crawley" in "Becky Sharp" (1935) starring Miriam Hopkins, who received an Academy Award for Best Actress in her role. This film was the first feature film to use the three-strip process, which created a separate film register for each of the three primary colors. As an aside, "Becky Sharp" was the second to last film that John Hay "Jock" Whitney and Cornelius Vanderbilt, who together had formed Pioneer Pictures, specifically to

produce color films, produced before teaming with David O. Selznick to form Selznick International Pictures. The first two films (both in 1937) of that collaboration were "A Star is Born" with Janet Gaynor and Fredric March and "Nothing is Sacred", with March and Carole Lombard.

As a last clue, our celebrity played "Madame Barabas" in "Satan Met a Lady" (1936) with Bette Davis. This film was the first adaptation of Dashiell Hammett's "The Maltese Falcon" and, also, the first film of many that caused Bette Davis to revolt against Warner Bros. for roles she considered "tripe".

#### Last Week's Celebrity

Born Jessie Ralph Chambers, last week's celebrity was known professionally as Jessie Ralph. Although she made her Hollywood debut in 1916, she only became a permanent Hollywood actress in 1933, when she left Broadway behind. She was nearly 70, at this time, so her roles were restricted to those of dumpy old ladies, but her expertise at stealing scenes captured the imagination of cinema-goers of the time. Her best-known roles as Greta Garbo's maid in "Camille" (1936) and as W.C. Fields' battleax of a mother-in-law in "The Bank Dick" (1940). She was "Mrs. Barlow" in the 1935 B/W Errol Flynn swashbuckler "Captain Blood" and "Katharine For-rest" in "After the Thin Man" (1936) with William Powell and Myrna Loy. She was the "Applewoman from Brooklyn" in "Little Lord Fauntleroy" (1936) with Freddie Bartholomew. This was the first film produced by David O. Selznick, by himself, as Selznick International Pictures and was the studio's most profitable film until "Gone With the Wind" (1939).

She starred in 55 movies altogether, 52 between 1933 and 1941. She retired from Hollywood in 1941, after her leg was amputated. She died on May 30, 1944, in her hometown of Gloucester, Mass, at the age of 79.

#### Dear Cookie Swap Connoisseur,

I just finished a very short, very touching semi-autobiographical novel (146 pages) by a young Italian physicist Paolo Giordano: LIKE FAMILY. A young husband and wife hire Mrs. A, a middleaged widow as an aide, then housekeeper, and eventually nanny for their young son. She quickly becomes the center of their family life with her quirky steadfast devotion to each of them. When she

falls ill, the couple are confronted with their own mortality, their commitment to one another, and their diminished expectations for themselves and their child. The husband/narrator brings us effortlessly from past to present as we see Mrs. A- their Babette from "Babette's Feast, "cope with life's cruel challenges. The four members of this "family" share much, defining themselves in relation to each other so when one is removed, all must be reexamined. Beautifully written and very compelling- recommended!

needs: Apple Bank, Locust Valley Reformed Church, Congregation Tifereth Israel, and Grace's Market.


