Landing Students Shine at Science Fair

Fifth-graders at Landing School demonstrated unique scientific experiments to schoolmates and family members at a Science Fair on March 17. Prior to the fair, students researched different experiments using a variety of Internet sources and selected an experiment they hoped to complete. Once they had their teacher's approval, students were guided step-by-step on the scientific method and how to create their desired experiment. Students tested their experiments at home and created poster boards, which reflected their work.

Fifth-grade teacher Denise Reynolds said participation in the Science Fair enhances self-esteem, while giving students an opportunity to practice public speaking. She also indicated that the process allow students to think more critically.

"By testing different variables, they are going to see some type of reaction, which will show them that there's a scientific reason for whether or not their experiment worked," she said.

All three officers completed the required 99 hour basic course for peace officers

and the 47 hour initial firearms training course. In the basic course the officers learned about the criminal procedure law as it relates to their duties, along with the penal law. Additional topics covered during training included interacting with the public, traffic / boat stops, defensive tactics, arrest procedures and others as required by the state Municipal Police Training Council. "We support the Glen Cove Harbor Patrol's efforts to pursue the most effective officer training programs so our officers we can continue to expand and improve upon the critical services provided to Glen Cove residents," said Mayor Reggie Spinello.

Glenwood Landing First Graders Learn Lessons on "School Long Ago"

The first graders of Glenwood Landing have been immersed in a Social Studies Unit, School Life Long Ago. First Grade Teachers in conjunction with the GWL Collaboration Team, comprised of the librarian, Enrichment Specialist, music, art, and physical education teachers developed a unit of study revolving around the CCLS, the new Social Studies Standards, and Social Studies Understandings., Time appeared to stand still as Glenwood Landing teachers came to school fully dressed as "School Masters" from "School Long Ago" and their students could be seen in elaborate garments from the 1800's!

On March 10, 2016, the first graders rotated to various hands-on workshops throughout the day to get a glimpse of a typical school day long ago. At Glenwood Landing School, this handson educational experience enabled the first graders to duplicate lessons from many years ago utilizing similar tools and teaching methods. To practice their penmanship, students were given a slate and a slate pencil. In addition, mathematical skills were practiced utilizing a math game called 'Shut the Box,' while students played with an oldfashioned 'Cup and Ball' held together by a string to practice their hand-eye coordination. They were reminded how strict the classroom environment was and how all of the children had to be attentive and respectful to their teacher in the one-room school house. Often they had to sit up straight and behave during the whole school day, approximately 8 am to 4 pm. If they did not, they might have to sit in the corner with a dunce cap! In addition, over the course of the week leading up to the day, as students went to their art, music, gym, and library classes, each child engaged in a series of interdisciplinary lessons to further deepen their understanding of the time period and foster critical thinking skills.

At the end of this exciting unit, first graders participated in small reflection groups where they explored answers to questions including: "How do the people of long ago use natural resources to meet their needs and wants?," "How do the people of long ago show resourcefulness? How were they problems solvers, thinkers and innovators?," "How has technology changed school over time?," "How did students long ago collaborate? Communicate?," and "How does life ago impact us today?"

In addition, first graders will journey to the one-room school house built to replicate the one in Glenwood Landing located today on the North Shore High School campus. Many thanks to all of the Glenwood Landing students and their teachers who participated in these authentic interdisciplinary lessons from "School Long Ago." Please be sure to ask your children all about these incredible learning experiences.

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Kick Butts Day

To The Editor,

In celebration of the "Kick Butts Day 2016" the Glen Cove High School partnered with SAFE, Inc., and The SAFE Glen Cove Coalition in a youth directed activity to help our peers learn about the dangerous impact of tobacco marketing in stores on teens, and we took a stand against "Big Tobacco". The Campaign for Tobacco-Free Kids sponsors "Kick Butts Day" each year as part of this national day of youth activism nationally, and around the world. Today, we are adding our voices to those other youth from around the country to voice our concerns about tobacco marketing and the impact it has on our Glen Cove and surrounding Community.

In New York State the Tobacco Industry spends approximately \$1.1 million per day to market its products. This is of great concern to our Student Body because studies show how exposure to cigarette advertising cause non-smoking adolescent to initiate smoking and move to regular smoking, and the more tobacco retailers are near schools the more likely children are to smoke.

Health education student, Brayan Villatoro states that big tobacco companies don't value a person's life and they only care about their profits. Students like Brayan strongly urge tobacco users to continue to try and quit and is frustrated that big tobacco targets young people.

"It is exciting to see the knowledge SAFE Inc. has imparted on Glen Cove Youth through our educational workshops, presentations and Life Skills training be put into action. The goal of SAFE Inc., is early intervention and prevention in an effort to teach kids how to make healthier decisions in the future. SAFE's Life Skills Program and Student Athlete Leadership Team works with youth to help them understand the harmful side effects of tobacco use while developing peer resistance skills needed to resistance engaging in unhealthy behaviors including smoking" stated Ashley Ferrufino, SAFE Coalition Liaison.

"It has been very rewarding to have worked with the SAFE Glen Cove Coalition over the past several years. It is exciting to see the students take the initiative to stand up against the tobacco industry. I believe that the Glen Cove youth are playing a very important role by asking our trusted faculty, adult community and peers to set a quit date and end their use of tobacco products said Anthony Gallo, High School Health Educator and Chairman of SAFE's Community Coalition Committee.

We hope that youth together across the State will ban together in order to demonstrate how important it is send a unified strong message that We've seen enough tobacco marketing, and we are banding together with the same message that we want to be the first generation to be tobacco free.

Munda has proceeded to make a group centered on the idea and within a few hours close to 400 people either accepting his invitation or asked to join the group.




took place on Thursday afternoon. This gave students the chance to showcase not only their physical attributes, but their academic knowledge as well.

Diabetes Research Works Towards a Cure

During a recent broadcast of Dr. Deb Carlin's radio show, Nassau County Legislator Delia DeRiggi-Whitton and Diabetes Research Institute Foundation's (DRIF) Long Island Regional Director Anthony Childs Delia were interviewed. First, Delia discussed having a child with Type 1 Diabetes. Then, she and Mr. Childs spoke about the breakthrough research being done to work towards finding a cure for diabetes.

In type 1 diabetes, the immune system mistakenly destroys insulin-producing islet cells in the pancreas. The DRIF's focus is to develop a biological cure by replacing those cells. The organization is working on the creation of a BioHub, which is a "mini organ" that mimics the native pancreas. The BioHub contains thousands of insulin producing cells that sense blood sugar levels and release the precise amount of insulin needed in real time. "For the millions living with diabetes, the DRIF BioHub brings the promise of natural insulin production and normal blood sugar levels one step closer to reality," Childs said.



IN THIS CASE, THE COST AND ARRANGEMENT THE COST AND ARRANGEMENT FOR TRANSPORTATION WILL BE PARENTAL RESPONSIBILITY. THE STATE EDUCATION DEPARTMENT AND THE BOARD OF EDUCATION REQUIRE THAT A SEPARATE AND THE BOARD OF EDUCATION REQUIRE THAT A SEPARATE APPLICATON BE FILED EACH YEAR EVEN IF THE STUDENT IS ALREADY RECEIVING TRANSPORTATION. A KINDERGARTEN PUPIL MUST BE FIVE (5) YEARS OF AGE NO LATER THAN DECEMBER 1, 2016. In accordance with New York State Education Law, transportation requests received after the above date will not be accepted unless a reasonable explanation

accepted unless a reasonable explanation is given for the delay or the District can provide the transportation under existing arrangements without additional expense. A belated decision to enroll a student into school is not a reasonable explanation for late submission of a transportation

request. Those students who move into the District after the expiration of the deadline can still submit a written request for transportation provided such request is made within thirty (30) days after establishing residence in the district.

This Friday, March 25 at 10:30am in Spooky Park, Mike and Gwynn Lennon will be hosting their 21st Annual Egg Hunt. Afterwards I will be meeting up with friends to celebrate Daniel DiPietro's birthday and I would love to have a thought-provoking book to discuss. Any ideas? Egg Hunter Extraordinaire

Dear Egg Hunter Extraordinaire,

I just finished a very interesting but troubling book: A LITTLE LIFE by -Hanya Yanagihara. I couldn't decide whether it was a moral fable, a Dickensian melodrama, or a serious study of human suffering.... but definitely a very disturbing read. Four young men meet in a small, elite college, form a deep friendship, and move to New York City where most of the story takes place. The thirty year time span is hard to place but probably mid- century to the present. All four achieve fairytale successes in their careers: prominent attorney, celebrated

actor, renowned artist, awarding-winning architect. While we learn much about all four, it is the physically and emotionally scarred Jude who remains center stage throughout. The author's description of luxurious apartments, manor homes, travels abroad, drivers, servants, fine restaurant dining, beautiful clothes- all fueled by an endless supply of money and well-connected caring friendsimbues the novel with a sense of magical realism. Nominated for both the National Book Award and the Booker Prize, this book has many fans and equally as many detractors. The amount of obligations authorized to be issued is \$2,835,000. The period of probable usefulness for the \$2,800,000 bonds is forty (40) years.

This week's celebrity was an American TV, film and stage actress. She was born Shirley Grossman in Philadelphia, Pa. on Sept. 18, 1922. Her father was from Latvia, and her mother, who had acted in the Yiddish Theater, was from South Africa. When she was eight, her parents separated but never divorced. She became interested in acting, as an escape from a painful childhood, and auditioned for plays in NYC, while she was attending high school. She enrolled at Temple University, but did not matriculate. She landed her first professional job doing

summer stock in Long Island in 1942. As time went on, she began to have guest appearances on various TV programs during the mid-1950s. She made her film debut in 1961 in "Run Across the River" with a less than stellar cast. She also made "Satan in High Heels" (1962), starring Meg Myles, later known as "Joanna Yeager", "Stuart Chandler's" secret wife on the TV soap-op, "All My Children". In the film, our celebrity portrayed a cabaret club owner named "Pepe". She later disavowed the film. In Sept. 1963, she traveled to Puerta Vallarte, Mexico to play the role of "Judith Fellowes" in John Huston's version of "The Night of the Iquana", based on the original play by Tennessee Williams, also starring Elizabeth Taylor and Richard Burton. Interestingly, James Garner says he was offered the role played by Richard Burton, but he turned it down as "it was just too Tennessee Williams for me". Our celebrity was nominated for an Academy Award in the category of Best Supporting Actress for her performance as a latent lesbian women's college instructor. In the original play, the character was not sympathetic but Huston rewrote the character wanting more complexity and sympathy. She was featured as a kidnapped bank teller in Walt Disney's "That Darn Cat" in 1965. In 1967, she played a THRUSH agent on the TV series, "The Man from U.N.C.L.E.".

Last Week's Celebrity

Last week's celebrity was born Sydney Woodrow Parfey but dropped his first name and was known professionally as Woodrow Parfrey. His many film credits include parts in "Cattle King" (1963) with Robert Taylor and Robert Loggia, "The War Lord" (1965), directed by Franklin J. Schaffner, and starring Charlton Heston and Richard Boone, "Madigan" (1968) with Henry Fonda and Richard Widmark, "Bronco Billy" (1980) with Clint Eastwood and "Jinxed" (1980) with Bette Midler and Rip Torn, to name a few. Parfrey's frequent association with film director Franklin Schaffner, who also directed him in "Papillion", led him to his role as "Maximus", one of the three "See No Evil" orangutan judges in "Planet of the Apes" (1968) with another favorite actor of Schaffner, Charlton Heston. Parfrey would also don the prosthetics again for the pilot of the TV series spinoff.

Some of his TV credits were "Combat!", "Police Story", "Get Smart, "I Dream of Jeannie", "Lost In Space", "Remington Steele", "Room 222", and "Eight is Enough". Parfrey died suddenly, at the age of 62, on July 29, 1984 from a heart attack. His gravestone simply reads "Pfc. U.S. Army, World War II"
