

Residents Call For Removal of Rubber Mulch

Through a grassroots effort spearheaded by Sea Cliff resident Dr. Nick Virgilio, the North Shore Central School District is contemplating the removal the rubber mulch from school playgrounds within the North Shore Schools.

Dr. Virgilio said, "The rubber mulch is toxic. There are 96 known chemicals present in the mulch, 1/2 of which have never been tested for human exposure. 20% of these chemicals are known carcinogens such as phthalates and PAH's. A California study tried to mimic skin exposure by doing what they termed as a 'wipe test.' On the samples of wipes there were carcinogens present. Standards for these carcinogens are set by OSHA for a 160 lb male. Children are of course much smaller therefore increasing the exposure level. The children ingest it, place it in their eyes, ears, nose, roll in it and come home with it in their shoes, hair and clothing, all of which of course increases the exposure."

Elizabeth Yaachos and some concerned Glen Head mothers contacted Dr. Virgilio after seeing the online petition he started over 3 weeks ago, which now has well over 500 signatures. After presenting to Dr. Melnick and the BOE

at the March 31st meeting the group has been sending numerous research articles and information proving the toxicity of the mulch and its effect.

At the April 14th meeting Dr. Herman Berliner, Board President, invited a toxicologist, Dr. Kenneth Spaeth to speak on the matter. Dr. Spaeth reiterated information that was presented at the March 31st meeting by Dr. Virgilio. He also added, "Rubber is rubber. The toxins are there. Pound for pound the exposure is going to be greater for children".

Dr. Virgilio stated, "There are safe, non-toxic, eco-friendly alternatives that are available. These include virgin hard wood chips and poured in place rubber. The research proves the presence of these hazardous chemical in the rubber mulch. Lets get this out of the playgrounds as soon as possible. I hope the Board moves swiftly and makes a favorable decision to remove this toxic material as soon as possible for the health of our children." The Board will make a decision regarding the rubber mulch after the issue has been discussed and a recommendation is made by the district Construction Steering Committee. That group will meet on

Diabetes Fundraiser Helps DRIF Get Closer To Cure

The Diabetes Research Institute Foundation (DRIF) held its 13th Annual "Cooking For a Cure" fundraiser on April 11. Co-chaired by Nassau County Legislator Delia DeRiggi-Whitton and Rebecca Castronovo, the event was a huge success. Both women have daughters who were diagnosed with type 1 diabetes when they were very young and have been deeply involved with DRIF for well over a decade. "I would like to thank the committee and all those who support the DRIF, especially Stacy Sissons McKenna and Sue Herbst for helping to organize this great event," event co-chair Delia DeRiggi-Whitton said.

The DRI runs the largest and most comprehensive research center dedicated to finding a cure for diabetes. In type 1 diabetes, the immune system mistakenly destroys insulin-producing islet cells in the pancreas. The DRI's focus is to develop a biological cure by replacing those cells.

A very promising study for which the DRIF recently received FDA approval to conduct in clinical trials is their BioHub. This bioengineered "mini organ" contains thousands of insulinproducing cells that sense blood sugar levels and release the precise amount of insulin needed, thereby mimicking the function of a normal pancreas. The BioHub containing the donor islet cells is transplanted into the omentum, which is an apron-like lining covering the abdominal organ. The BioHub acts as a "scaffold," holding the cells in place until they naturally adhere to the wall of the omentum, after which point, the BioHub naturally dissolves.

"We know that transplanted islet cells have already functioned in some patients for more than ten years," DRIF Long Island Regional Director Anthony Childs said. "THE DRIF is building on that progress by developing the BioHub, a bioengineered min-organ, to reach a biological cure for type 1 diabetes."

"The BioHub is the most promising clinical trial yet for a biological cure for diabetes," DeRiggi-Whitton added. "I am so proud to be part of an organization that can help potentially the 29 million Americans and 370 million people worldwide with diabetes to live longer, healthier lives."



Suozzi Raises \$450K In First Quarter

The Suozzi 2016 campaign filed it's first quarter campaign finance report and report that Tom Suozzi has raised over \$450,000. The contributions were raised between January 19, 2016, when Suozzi filed his congressional campaign committee, through March 31, 2016. Suozzi, the former Nassau County Executive and Glen Cove Mayor, is running to replace Rep. Steve Israel (NY-3), who is retiring from Congress at the end of the year.

"People are investing in my campaign because I have a proven record of going up against the status quo to get things done," said Suozzi. "They know that's what Washington, DC needs these days."

In the filing with the Federal Election Commission (FEC) the campaign will report contributions of \$451,306.07, expenditures of \$76,960.09 and will have \$374,345.98 cash on hand. Approximately \$50,000 can only be used for a general election campaign.

"Tom's numbers are impressive because it was such a short fundraising period," stated Mike Florio, Suozzi 2016 campaign manager. "More importantly, he is one of the few candidates in this race who has not loaned or given his campaign money. This bodes well for the support that Tom will need to win the Democratic primary on June 28th and the general election."

The 3rd Congressional District covers northern portions of Queens, Nassau and Suffolk counties. A primary for the Democratic nomination will be held June 28, 2016.

My friends and I are thinking of starting a monthly book club focusing on non-fiction. Do you have any suggestions for a good book we could begin with- something short, something compelling?

Reality Reader

Dear Reality Reader,

I have a wonderful book for your group: WHEN BREATH BECOMES AIR by Paul Kalanithi. Kalanithi was a brilliant scientist, writer, and linguist with advanced degrees in medicine and literature. Then at age 36 he received what was basically a death sentence: a diagnosis of advanced lung cancer. This slim (240 pages) volume details his last years as he tries to answer a question he has been obsessed with his entire adulthood: "given that all organisms die, what makes a virtuous and meaningful

life?" We learn about his parents, his large family of cousins, siblings, aunts and uncles, his wife, his many friendsall who play a part in his quest for understanding. We see as he goes from powerful physician to contemplative patient and are with him as he decides to have a child so that he can experience the joy and pain of loving and leaving something of himself. Beautifully written, this book with its poetry and carefully crafted prose is not so much sad as instructive, offering profound insight into human mortality. Highly recommended!

Name the Celebrity



This week's celebrity was born in New York City on August 8, 1930. She began her acting career appearing as a model in the 1949 film "It's a Great Feeling" with Doris Day, Jack Carson and Dennis Morgan. She signed a Warner Bros. Studio contract at the age of 18. She was afforded a wealth of varied screen roles from the love starved switchboard operator in a "Very Special Favor" (1965) with Rock Hudson and Leslie Caron to the brassy Madame Esther in "Buck and the Preacher", a 1972 American western film starring Sidney Poitier as "Buck" and Harry Belafonte as the "Preacher". She also appeared in such films as "Bright Leaf" (1950) with Gary Cooper, Patricia Neal and Lauren Bacall, the title coming from the type of tobacco grown in North Carolina after the American Civil War and "This Could Be the Night" (1957) with Jean Simmons, Paul Douglas and Anthony Franciosa.


A TV series mainstay, she was seen as "Mabel Spooner" opposite Larry Blyden's "Joe Spooner" in "Joe & Mabel" (1956), "Iris Anderson" in the 1958 "Perry Mason" episode "The Case of the Pint-Sized Client" and con-woman/ struggling actress "Susan Reed" in the first season of "Mickey Spillane's Mike Hammer" (1958-59). She also played a nurse friend of Anne Francis, who played another nurse, in the second season, in an episode on "Columbo" with Peter Falk, called "A Stitch in Crime" with guest star, Leonard Nimoy. She may also be remembered playing the slim, street wise character, "Blondie Collins" om the NBC TV series "The Thin Man" starring Phyllis Kirk and Peter Lawford, as the famous sleuthing couple, "Nick & Nora Charles", and of course, "Asta".

Last Week's Celebrity

Tough, virile, wavy-haired and ruggedly handsome with trademark forlornlooking brow that added an intriguing touch of vulnerability to his hard outer core, actor Howard Duff and his wifeat-the-time actress Ida Lupino, were one of Hollywood's premiere film couples during the 1950s "Golden Age". Prior to that, Duff had relationships with a number of the cinema's most dazzling leading ladies, including Ava Gardner (just prior to her marriage to musician Artie Shaw) and Gloria DeHaven. Along

with "Woman in Hiding" (1950), Duff co-starred with Lupino in four hardboiled film dramas during the 1950s: "Jennifer" (1953), "Private Hell 36" (1954), "Woman's Prison" (1955) and "While the City Sleeps" (1956). The demise of the studio-guided contract system had an effect on Howard's film career and offers started drying up in the late 1950s. Fortunately, he found just as wide an appeal on TV, appearing in a number of dramatic showcases for the "Science Fiction Theater" (1955), "Lux Video Theatre" (1950) and "Climax" (1954). In a change of pace, the married couple decided to go for laughs for starring together in the TV series "Mr. Adams and Eve" (1957). Other TV roles included "The Lucy-Desi Comedy Hour", "Bonanza", "The Twilight Zone", Burke's Law" and "Combat".

The marriage of Ida and Howard did not last, however, and the famous married couple separated in 1966 after 15 years of marriage, They didn't officially divorce until 1984. Towards the end of his career, he had a few memorable roles such as the sex-minded, booze-swilling relative in "A Wedding" (1978) and as Dustin Hoffman's attorney in the Oscarwinning drama "Kramer vs. Kramer" (1979).


