Glen Cove City Council Celebrates Black History Month

Sheryl Goodine, the president of the Glen Cove Martin Luther King Jr. Commemorative Birthday Celebration Commission, opened the Feb. 14 city council meeting with a special presentation on the history and importance of Black History Month. “The only time that I as a student in the Glen Cove public school system read about black people throughout history was the mention of them as slaves,” Goodine said assertively. “How embarrassed I was.”

Goodine went on to explain that black history month was the brainchild of Dr. Carter G. Woodson, one of the first historians to study African-American history. It was Woodson, who in 1916 founded the Journal of Negro History, that first implemented Negro History Week in 1924. Woodson would later advocate for Black History Month. According to Goodine, Black History Month is celebrated in February because it is also the month in which both Frederick Douglas and Abraham Lincoln, two very famous abolitionists, celebrate their birthdays. To remember, she reasoned, is to rise up and honor.

“American history is full of the deeds of

CBS hit “Kevin Can Wait” films in Glen Cove

Watch out Hollywood as the City of Glen Cove may be vying for equal billing as a destination of choice for movies and television shows. Two weeks ago Kevin James and his cast and crew were in Glen Cove to film their hit television series, “Kevin Can Wait,” at the Church of St. Rocco.

A group of Glen Cove High School TV Production students, along with Media Communications teacher Christopher Barry and TV studio assistant Pasquale Iannelli, then attended the taping of the sitcom.

The show stars Kevin James, known for his roles in “The King of Queens” and “Paul Blart: Mall Cop,” who was born and raised on Long Island. As soon as Barry heard the show would be taping nearby, he reached

out to CBS for tickets.

“This is the first network primetime series to be recorded completely in a Long Island studio,” said Barry. “It’s history being made practically in our backyard and it will have a major impact on the Long Island TV and film business. I wanted our students to be a part of it. It also shows them firsthand the huge career possibilities that exist in this industry and reinforces what we do in the TV studio.”

The students sat through a taping of an upcoming episode, previewed an episode that hadn’t been shown to the public, and each left with a script cover sheet autographed by Kevin James.

heroes,” Goodine went on to say. “Some of the most inspiring heroes in history are African American.”

Goodine spoke of some of the most influential African-Americans throughout the history of the city of Glen Cove. Goodine mentioned former Tuskegee Airman, William Joe Johnson, from the 106th Rescue Wing was one. Johnson moved his family to Glen Cove in 1929 and went to work at Grumman after the war. Another was Howard Davis Jr., an Olympic boxer who grew up in Glen Cove, fought and beat the likes of Sugar Ray Leonard and Leon Spinks. Davis went on to train both amateur and professional boxers until his death in 2015. Goodine’s husband, Jerome Goodine Sr., was one of the first black members of the Glen Cove Fire Department and her father, Jimmy Davis, was the leader of the Glen Cove NAACP who worked to break down the walls of racism that existed in the Glen Cove schools, fire department, and other places during the 1950s and 60s. Goodine also praised Roderick Watson, the city council’s only current black member, calling him “a hero in his own way.”

Goodine ended her impassioned speech with her favorite quote from Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., “We may have come here on different ships but we’re all on the same boat now.”

Members of the audience gave Goodine a standing ovation.

The meeting continued with the first of two public hearings. Ann Fangmann, executive director of the Glen Cove Community Development Association, informed the community that suggestions for proposed activities for inclusion in the Community Development Program would be heard by her office until Feb. 28. Federal Regulation dictates that the committee holds an open hearing and provides a detailed timeline of projects already proposed by the committee. Those projects are currently available on the committee’s website. Comments from the public will be taken until Feb. 28 and community members may email their suggestions to afangmann@glencovecda.org or visit www.cdsglencovecda.org.

The second and final public hearing involved proposed increases to the city’s summer day camp rates. The summer day camp program runs for six weeks and there are three programs. Darcy Belyea from the city’s Parks and Recreation Department laid out some of the program details as well as the proposed increases for each program.

Pee Wee camp, for four and five year old Glen Cove residents, is asking for a \$20 increase, from \$440 a season to \$460. The regular day camp, which includes programs for ages six through 13, is proposing a \$25 increase, from \$490 to \$515. And a travel day camp for teens is also asking for a \$25

increase, from \$605 to \$635.

“In 1997, the program served 220 children and hired 60 employees,” Belyea explained. “Last year we served 540 children and hired 116 seasonal employees, 90 percent from the Glen Cove community.”

The increase in tuition for the programs will help decrease the amount that the city subsidizes to the program through residents’ tax dollars. Mayor Reggie Spinello said that the city paid approximately \$100,000 for the summer camp programs last year. One member of the community, Cheryl Hallenbach, spoke during the hearing about her positive experiences at the camp when she was a child and asked what the extra money would be used for. “For some parents, that’s a big jump in fees,” Hallenbach said in an interview after the meeting. “Some people use that money for groceries or car payments, a lot of low-income kids go to city camp.”

Belyea said that they would be adding an additional physical education teacher, and adding more programs geared toward improving reading skills. The camp day includes nine, 42-minute periods of structured and unstructured activities. The hearing was closed and the proposed fee increases were unanimously approved. Hallenbach said she was satisfied with the answer she received. “I feel like I got an answer as best as I could get.” Hallenbach concluded.

Other agendas items of interest to the

community were the approval of a new agreement between the city and the Glen Cove Police Benevolent Association. The memoranda of agreement included a 2 percent yearly salary increase starting in 2018. According to Mayor Spinello, the previous agreement included a 2.75 percent raise for police annually. “This is a 3 year amendment to the current contract,” the mayor explained. “Additionally, determination pay will be paid out over a two-year period rather than a lump sum, which is helpful to the city.”

Sandra Clarson, the city’s newest hire to the assessment department, said that Glen Cove residents now have the option of paying taxes online. She also suggested to the board that the city payment center remain open beyond regular office hours a few nights during tax season so that residents have an opportunity to pay their taxes after work. Clarson also informed the council that the department has acquired a machine for remote deposits to cash checks instantly. Councilmember Pamela Panzenbeck thanked Clarson for her work and for “bringing us into the modern day.”

The city council will be holding a pre-council meeting at 6:30 p.m. Feb. 21, 2016 in the second floor conference room at city hall. A City Council meeting will follow at 7:30 p.m. The public is invited to attend both.

Dear Book Lover-Movie Goer,

Yes, this award-winning movie is based on a novella which appears in a collection of eight short stories: "Stories of Your Life and Others" by Ted Chiang. In "Story of Your Life" the piece "Arrival" is based on the story of a young linguist who is taught the language of an alien culture allowing her to think beyond the normal constraints of time — its beginnings, endings and all that

comes in between. Throughout the story we, like our linguist narrator, experience time in a totally different dimension. By the end of the story, we realize how limited our approach to existence might very well be. The other seven stories are also mind-bending as we explore possibilities we might never have considered. This is science fiction without battles or technical jargon. Chiang was born in Port Jefferson, Long Island. How great it would be if his writings were chosen for the prestigious annual Long Island Reads event!

Why are these changes being made?

Heroin arrest in Glen Cove

Gerald Marichal, 25, of Valentine Ave, Glen Cove, was arrested on Feb. 11 for possession and sale of heroin. The Glen Cove Police had previously received numerous complaints regarding suspected drug dealing in this area.

Detectives Brian Glennon and Eddy Linares began investigating the problem arresting Marichal. He was arraigned in First District Court and is being held on \$50,000

bail. Marichal has been charged with criminal sale of a controlled substance 3rd degree and criminal possession of a controlled substance 3rd degree.

"The heroin epidemic on Long island cannot be understated or overlooked," said Additional statement by Detective Lieutenant John Nagle. "Persons who deal heroin or any illegal drug need to be identified and arrested. The Glen Cove Police department will use all of its available tools to identify and arrest persons dealing drugs in our community."

Nagle went on to say that partnerships with the community are an extremely important asset in helping police to identify and arrest those who sell and abuse illegal drugs. He recommends that residents call the Glen Cove police at (516) 676-1000 if they suspect criminal activity of any kind in their neighborhood. The Glen Cove Police also have set up an e-mail for this purpose at tips@cityofglencoveny.org where tips can be left anonymously.

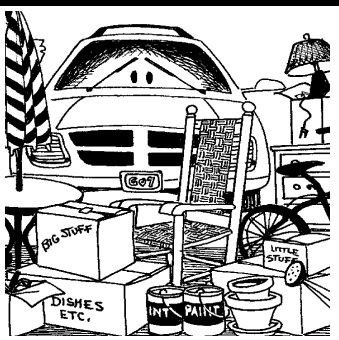

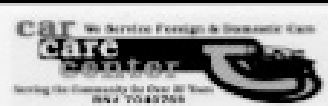

SAFE and Glen Cove School District mark National Drug and Alcohol Facts Week

National Drug and Alcohol Facts Week was originally launched in 2010 by the National Institute on Drug Abuse as a prevention awareness campaign aimed at educating youth on the facts about drugs and alcohol. Students are given facts related to substance use in an effort to counteract myths they may have learned from movies, the internet, social media or friends.

When it comes to teens and drugs it is all about choices and consequences. In honor of National Drug and Alcohol Facts Week the SAFE Glen Cove Coalition's School Committee, Chaired by Denise Kiernan, Director of Health, Physical Education and Athletics, participated in a week-long campaign by creating a program for students at Glen Cove Finley Middle School and Glen Cove High School. The school committee's efforts were targeted at arming students with the facts to help them make the right choices surrounding drugs and alcohol.

The campaign included the announcements of drug facts every morning during the traditional morning announcements. During health classes at Finley and at GCHS students in health classes played the WreckEd Card game — an educational game that is designed to teach teens to think more introspectively about their decisions regarding drugs and alcohol. This program not only encourages youth to look at their own behavior, but also to reach out and look out for their friends who may be making the

wrong unhealthy decisions.

Substance Abuse Free Environment (SAFE, Inc.) formed a community based coalition in 2003 to change societal norms about alcohol and substance abuse and to address the risk factors that contribute to them. The Coalition is overseen by SAFE's Board of Directors and Co-chaired by SAFE Executive Director, Dr. Sharon Harris and Glen Cove School District health teacher Tony Gallo. It is composed of 12 sectors of the community: Youth (an individual 18 or under), Parents/Youth Caregivers, Business

Community, Media, School, Youth-serving Organization, Law Enforcement, Religious Organizations, Civic Organizations, Healthcare Professionals, and Local Agencies with Expertise in the Field of Substance Abuse and associated issues.

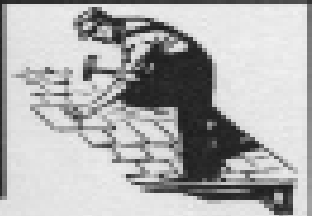
